

CHAPEL BUILT BY TRAMPS

New York Monks' Monument to the Industry of Hoboes Who Apply to Them for Assistance.

New York.-There is one monument to the industry of the tramp that can be pointed to with pride by the wandering fraternity as long as stone withstands the elements. It is a handsome and commodious chapel in the hills near Garrison-on-the-Hudson and it was built entirely by hoboes. The building is now in the almost finished state shown in one of the accompanying photographs, taken a few days ago, and it is soon to be dedicated with a service of thanks for the work done by the heretofore despised knights of the road.

They are not called tramps by the monks who have used their services

at this mountain retreat. The hoboes have a very dignified name. They are called by the monks "Brother Christophers," after the walking Saint Christopher. The idea of utilizing the services of the wanderers in return for bed and breakfast originated with Father Francis, one of the monks of this community. The colony foregathered in the hills at Graymoor, near Garrison, Ky., two years ago. They were looking for a convenient place to establish a chapel which would serve the Friars of the Atonement as an oratory. At the head of the pilgrimage was the Rev. John C. Hawes, an Anglican missionary from the Bahamas who had been received into the Catholic church. The capital of the friars amounted to nil, but they set to work with enthusiasm that poverty could not dampen.

A sand pit was discovered close to a quarry and water and building material was at the disposal of the monks. They established a temporary home by felling trees and building a log hut, sleeping in bunks built tier above tier. Sympathizers in the neighborhood supplied the monks with a few blankets. These who had no blankets slept as they could without them.

Most of the contributions, however, went to the wayfarers who were guided to this spot by a series of rough crosses placed from the base of the summit of the Mount of the Atonement. At first the tramps were given thought of return, but the happy thought of making them work for their board came to one of the friars and when the next tramp arrived he was told that the time had come for him to break the rule of the hobo frafed and lodged and the next day he worked it out on the new chapel.
