**JUDGE HANFORD RESIGNS SEAT**

**IMPEACHMENT PROCEEDING COMES TO A SUDDEN CLOSE.**

**Lauds Record as He Falls—His Health Given As Cause for His Resignation.**

Seattle, Wash.—United States District Judge C. H. Hanford, the first federal judge appointed when Washington was admitted to statehood twenty-three years ago, sent his resignation Monday to President Taft while the last witnesses were waiting to testify before the house judiciary subcommittee which has been hearing evidence relative to charges of misconduct filed against Judge Hanford.

At the time set for the hearing a series of conferences between the committeemen and Judge Hanford's attorneys were begun. The proposal that the judge resign and the hearing be discontinued was submitted by Judge Hanford's attorneys and accepted. The judge sent his resignation by telegraph to President Taft. At the same time Chairman Graham of the subcommittee sent a telegram to Chairman Clayton of the house judiciary committee telling him of the changed situation and recommended the hearings be discontinued. This was done by a message from Chairman Clayton.

Judge Hanford's chief counsel, E. C. Hughes, said after the resignation that the judge has desired to resign for several weeks, but could not well so do with no evidence heard.

Judge Hanford's statement was as follows:

"The almost constant strain under which I have worked for more than twenty-two years has taxed, but not exhausted, my power of endurance. I am not likely to have a vacation or rest, but a change of occupation will be a welcome relief. I intend to practice law in Seattle.

"In the investigation which has been conducted by a subcommittee of the house of representatives much testimony has been given by witnesses who knew me, and others who do not. I am grateful for the commendation of those who have spoken and written in my favor, and as for those who have maligned me I only wish to say that I would be ashamed of myself if I had not incurred the enmity of such people as they are.

"A judge is never so sure of being right than when his work has been criticised as unfair. Without boasting, in view of all that has been and may be said, and concerning myself and my work, I am glad that my record is what it is."

Eight supplemental charges against Hanford were filed directly with the judiciary committee of the house by a Seattle attorney. The house unanimously referred Berger's charges to the house judiciary committee, and that body appointed a subcommittee to take evidence in Seattle.

This subcommittee began its proceedings June 27 and continued its sessions steadily. The committee called everyone who offered evidence.

Dozens of witnesses testified they had seen Judge Hanford apparently intoxicated in the streets, and a few swore they had seen him apparently intoxicated in the court room. Many of Judge Hanford's friends testified that his peculiarities and mannerisms had been misunderstood.

Judge Hanford, 63 years old, has lived on Puget Sound fifty-nine years. He was appointed supreme justice of the territory of Washington in 1888, and on the admission of Washington to statehood became a district judge.

**Great Naval Plans.**

London.—The speech of Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, in introducing the supplementary naval appropriation of \$50,000,000 in the house of commons Monday, fully endorsed as it was introduced by the prime minister, will cause graver concern to the country than any warnings which have gone before. Without the least offensiveness, the first lord of the admiralty sketched the "unprecedented" rise of the German fleet which he described as "extremely formidable." To emphasize its magnitude to his hearers, Mr. Churchill likened it to the great fleet which all saw at Spithead a short time ago. His text was "Build, Build Untringly," through successive years as the only means of meeting the menace in the North Sea.

**Meeting of Texas Seed Crushers.**

Houston, Tex.—With an attendance said to be considerably larger than that of any preceding gathering of its kind, the eighteenth annual convention of the Texas Cotton Seed Crushers' convention opened for a three days' session on Monday morning. Over 350 delegates had registered before noon and others continued to arrive all through the day. So large was the attendance that the supply of badges and programs, which was thought to be more than adequate, became exhausted early and an emergency order for more programs was placed with a printing establishment.

**Peace for Another Year.**

Pittsburg, Pa.—Peace for another year in the Pittsburg coal fields was assured Monday when a special convention of district No. 5, United Mine Workers of America, approved a new wage scale.

**Heavy Snow Over the Alps.**

Geneva, Switzerland.—Snow fell all over the Alps Monday. It lies to a depth of eight inches on the six principal passes. A number of American motorists are snowbound.




