FACULTY DISMISSED 466 A. AND M. CADETS

MEMBERS OF JUNIOR, SOPHOMORE, FRESHMEN CLASSES GUILTY OF HAZING.

GOVERNOR SUSTAINS FACULTY

Better to Close College, He Says, Than to Fail to Enforce Discipline—Bill to Prohibit Hazing Introduced.

Bryan, Tex.—An order striking the names of 466 students from the rolls of the A. and M. College was entered on the faculty minutes of the institution Saturday.

The 466 students are charged with insubordination as defined in the blue book—the college rule book. Wednesday twenty-two students were dismissed for hazing. They strapped freshmen, it is charged, because the freshmen refused to give a Christmas tree to the upper class men. Friday five more students were dismissed. The students dismissed were sophomores and juniors.

A petition demanding the reinstatement of these was presented to the faculty. This was signed by 466 students who admitted they were guilty of hazing and who said if their fellows were not reinstated that they would attend no academic duties.

The faculty Saturday ordered the dismissal of all who signed the petition.

President Milner issued the following statement:

"On January 28, 1913, twenty-two cadets of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas were dismissed for hazing. On January 31 five others were dismissed for the same offense. Today, February 1, members of the junior, sophomore and freshman classes, 466 in all, demanded of the faculty that the cadets so dismissed be reinstated and declared that they would attend no academic duties until the faculty complied with their demand. Believing that the cadets making this demand had acted hastily and in some cases under coercion, the faculty did not dismiss them at once, but after a statement of the facts gave them ample opportunity to reconsider. They declined to reconsider and they were dismissed for insubordination.

As a consequence of the trouble at the college, a bill to prohibit hazing is to be offered in the senate by Senator Nugent of Montgomery County, and it will probably also be offered in the house.

The telegrams interchanged by Chairman Peteet and Governor Colquitt Saturday read as follows:

Chairman Peteet Reports.

"College Station, Tex., Feb. 2.—Hon. O. B. Colquitt, Governor, Austin: I have the honor to report that on Saturday 466 underclassmen presented to the faculty a preemptory demand that twenty-seven students dismissed for hazing be reinstated, and refused to attend classes until this action was taken. In this communication they confessed themselves guilty with the dismissed students. The faculty refused the demand and dismissed all who participated. Nineteenth of the boys are acting under coercion of a few leaders, and many will return as soon as they have reflected. Many are now applying to the faculty and others will do so as soon as they hear from their parents."

"Austin, Tex., Feb. 2.—Hon. Walton Peteet, Chairman, College Station: Telegram received. I fully indorse action of the president and faculty. Unless they enforce respect and discipline the school had better close and the student body should be made to know that they must yield to the college authorities and obey the rules."

Germany Says "Hands Off."

Constantinople.—"Hands off all the Turkish possessions in Asia" was Germany's pointed notification to all concerned. It was given by the German ambassador to Turkey in the course of a speech at the Teutonia Club's annual dinner in honor of Emperor William's birthday.

"The future of Turkey lies in Asia Minor," Baron Hans von Wangenheim told an enthusiastic gathering of his compatriots. He continued: "German interests in Asia Minor are very great and are bound up with those of Turkey. The recent note of the European powers promises that Turkey would be aided in her future development. Germany will lend powerful assistance in this cause."

"In any case, however, to all the Turkish possessions in Asia Germany will attach the label 'touch me not.'"

Cotton Seed Oil Plant for Angleton.
 Angleton, Tex.—The board of directors of the Angleton Cotton Gin Company has decided to put in a cold cotton seed oil press at Angleton. It will be completed in time this spring to encourage farmers to cultivate a greater acreage of cotton.

Evidences of Oil in Well.
 Appleby, Tex.—Hunt & Trautman accepted the deep well drilled by Mr. Lestergett. This well is 500 feet deep, and splendid indications of oil were brought in. The water is fairly good.

CASTRO GETS TO SEE NEW YORK, ANYHOW

Had Been Ordered Deported From United States as an Undesirable Citizen by Secretary Nagel.

New York.—The right to go and come, a free man, through the streets of New York was Saturday granted General Cipriano Castro. He was released under \$500 bail pending argument on a writ of habeas corpus after his month of confinement at Ellis Island.

General Castro's week of freedom was granted by Judge Holt after it had been agreed to postpone argument on the writ until February 7. The document compels the government to show legal cause why Castro, who was ordered deported Friday by Secretary Nagel of the department of commerce and labor, should not be admitted.

Washington—Cipriano Castro, former president of Venezuela, was Thursday denied admission to the United States as a visitor, by Charles Nagel, secretary of commerce and labor. The Venezuelan's wavering refusal to answer the question whether, while president of his country, he was a party to the killing of General Paredas, was the cause of Secretary Nagel's order for his deportation.

The cabinet minister sustained the adverse report of the immigration authorities against Castro on the ground that his declination to answer "may in itself constitute an admission by conduct of the commission of a felony." The immigration law bars from entry any person convicted or admitting the commission of a crime involving moral turpitude, providing it is not purely a political offense. The killing of Paredas was not this.

The secretary decided that an alien was compelled to answer questions regarding his admissibility. If permitted to refuse, he maintained that "the immigration service might just as well adjourn."

The alleged information against Castro was furnished the department of commerce and labor by the state department, and Secretary Nagel, in his decision, frankly admits that but for the state department's action Castro probably would have been admitted without question. "Cipriano Castro's former position as president of Venezuela," he added, "would, under ordinary circumstances, have furnished further inducements for such action." The immigration bureau, he declared, had followed the same course in this case as that pursued in any other case where official warning had been given.

"It is officially charged," said Mr. Nagel, "that Castro, while president of Venezuela and in full possession of the authority of that state, directed the killing of Paredas without trial or hearing of any kind, Paredas at that time having been made a prisoner while engaged in a revolt against Castro."

The information that Castro ordered the killing of the general under these circumstances, Mr. Nagel declares to be specific and confirmed by authenticated copies of original telegrams.

The secretary admitted the decisions in extradition cases seem to hold that such a crime would be political, "although this view has been questioned by high authority." Consideration, however, he added, must be given to the fact that the alleged offense was not committed by a person engaged in a revolution against constituted authority, "but by the president of the republic in full control of the authority of the state, who denied the benefit of the very law which he was charged to preserve." Also the secretary pointed out that the immigration law was amended in 1903 so as to exempt offenses "purely political and not involving moral turpitude."

INDIANA CORN GETS FIRST PRIZE

Ten-Ear and Single Ear Trophies of \$1,000 Captured—Other Winners in International Exposition.

Columbia, S. C.—Corn from Indiana was awarded two first prizes Wednesday by the judges in the fifth international corn exposition. Chas. Short, Greensburg, Ind., won the Indiana ten-ear trophy, valued at \$1,000, and Joe Helms, Richmond, Ind., was awarded the Kellogg single-ear trophy, also worth \$1,000. The only other prize was the Colorado trophy, valued at \$1,500, for the best peck of oats on exhibition. This went to J. C. Hill & Son, Lloyd Minster, Sask., Canada.
