According to all reports there seems to be no doubt that the passage of the Webb Law by Congress, prohibiting the shipment of intoxicating liquors into prohibition states, and carrying with it the possibility of state legislatures passing similar laws relative to parishes and counties, will be one of the biggest boosts that has ever been given the prohibition cause. For years territory, towns, counties, parishes, and states have voted out the liquor traffic, only to have the same continued by mail and express-order establishments outside of the territory so effected. This has proven one of the most discouraging features of the prohibition movement, as it was maintained by those interested in the liquor traffic, and many others, that as long as the "wet" goods could be shipped in from outside territory, they might as well have the open saloon, and have it under the authority of the law, and derive the accompanying revenues from the same. This new law, it is believed, will make it possible to keep "dry" territory "dry" in fact, as well as in name. Strong pressure will be brought upon the Legislators of this state to induce them to pass a law similar to the Webb Law, at their next regular session.

Representative Chappelle, of Cincinnati, has just introduced a bill in the lower house of the Ohio Legislature providing for the appointment of a commission (of men) "to prescribe the fashions for women to be worn in the state of Ohio." Under the provisions of this bill the commission will be compelled to fix the limit of décolleté dresses so that "no more than two inches of the neck below the chin shall be uncovered." "Transparent stockings must not be displayed or worn in public." And the peek-a-boo waist must be carefully overlaid with some substantial opaque material other than the human dermis. This bill also goes so far as to prohibit department stores displaying undraped artificial figures.

Owing to favorable crop and weather reports from the wheat belt of the southwest, and the statistical estimates that the visible supply of wheat is 70,000,000 bushels in excess of last year's supply of this cereal, the Chicago wheat market dropped to the lowest level known for sometime last Saturday. While the price of wheat is going down, and it is estimated that the United States will have to export at least 80,000,000 bushels before the first of July, in order to restore the country to normal conditions, it is of vital interest to the millions of bread eaters of the country to know whether the price of bread will show a like decrease.

The men of the south can remove the shackles from the live stock industry within a twelvemonth, if they so desire it, and when that shall be done southern stockbreeding speedily will take its place at the head of the industry in this country. The agricultural industry in the south lacks proper balance, because its twin industry--stock breeding--has been so much neglected. Indeed, stock breeding is a part, and a very necessary one at that, of the agricultural industry, for without it soil building and the maintenance of soil fertility become practically impossible. Therefore the re-establishment of the proper balance between agriculture and live stock production becomes a matter of the first importance among a people who are essentially agricultural. The people should understand that the cattle tick is the obstacle that has prevented the maintenance of this balance, and that his presence is costing the farmers of the south untold millions each year. Confronted by such a situation, the call is for immediate action, through the county and parish boards and by private citizens in the work of tick eradication.--Country Review.

Police Jury Ordinance No. 43.

AN ORDINANCE levying a ten mill tax for general Purposes for the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, for the year 1913, and Budgeting and ordering same set apart to the various funds and purposes as herein provided.

Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, That a ten mill tax on all the property within the Parish of Jefferson Davis, subject to taxation that is not located within the limits of an incorporated town or village, be and the same is hereby levied for general purposes for the year 1913.

Section 2. Be it Further Ordained, Etc., That a two (2) mill tax on all the property within the Parish of Jefferson Davis, located within the limits of all incorporated towns or villages, be and the same is hereby levied for criminal purposes for the year 1913.

Section 3. Be it Further Ordained, Etc., That the Assessor of the Parish of Jefferson Davis is hereby authorized and instructed to extend said tax upon the assessment rolls for the current year, 1913, and the Sheriff and ex-Officio Tax Collector is hereby instructed to collect same for the account of the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis.

Section 4. Be it Further Ordained, Etc., That the proceeds of three mills of the tax levied under Section One of this Ordinance shall be collected for the benefit of and turned over to the Parish Board of Directors of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, for the support of the public schools of said parish, as provided by Act No. 257 of the Acts of the General Assembly of 1910.

Section 5. Be it Further Ordained, Etc., That the proceeds of the remaining seven mills levied under Section One and the two mills levied under Section Two of this Ordinance be and the same is hereby appropriated and set apart to the payment of the various expenses for the current year of 1913 and budget to the respective funds as herein provided, to-wit:
