Shutting Down of Gulf Coast Rice Mill Only Temporary.—May Run a Little This Week.

The Gulf Coast mill, which is one of the mills operated by the Louisiana State Rice Milling Company, has been for several weeks past engaged in milling rice "in the brown", or simply taking off the hull, and not taking the inside skin off the berry, leaving it in what is known as the "paddy" stage, in which condition it is shipped to eastern countries, where that style of milling is preferred, to the highly polished rice of the Western Hemisphere. Having completed their portion of a number of large foreign orders recently secured by the Louisiana State Company, the mill is temporarily closed down but will resume operations in a day or two, again milling on Brown rice. The Louisiana State Rice Milling Co. has received another large order for export and this will keep the wheels turning for some time to come.
