Mr. W. R. Kennedy Trying Something New in Agricultural Lines.

The versatile, fecund fertility of Welsh country soil is well evidenced by the garden and truck patch of Supt. W. R. Kennedy, out at the Rio Bravo refinery. He has tall tasseled earing corn, Indian and pop, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, peanuts and many other products, the most interesting of which is about an acre of Calabash gourds, from which are made that premier of all cool, sweet, smoking pipes, the Calabash.

The small patch planted to these seeds will yield about 1500 gourds and Mr. Kennedy, who is a warm devotee of "My Lady Nicotine," expects to realize a handsome return therefrom through tobaccoists with whom he is now corresponding.

The discovery of the excellence of the Calabash gourd as a nature made and splendid pipe came about in a curious way, as did Newton's preception of the law of gravitation and other things now of common knowledge.

An English soldier trekking on a forced march in the Boer war broke his pipe, and noticing the curve like conformation of the gourd weeds by the wayside and the aperture in the end of same, plucked one as he went by, inserted his pipe stem therein, and presto—the sweetest pipe known to lovers of the weed was discovered.

Calabash seeds, by the way, can be secured from your congressman, and if Mr. Kennedy's pioneer patch proves profitable a new industry will probably be born in this section.
