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RAILROADS AFTER EXPRESS CO.

Beaumont, Sour Lake and Western and Orange and Northwestern Claim Damages Amounting to Five Years' Business.

Houston, Tex.—Suit for damages aggregating \$96,627.75 against the United States Express Company was brought in the federal court at Houston Wednesday by Frank Andrews, receiver for the Beaumont, Sour Lake and Western and the Orange and Northwestern railroad companies.

The filing of the suits was a sequence to the announcement by President D. I. Roberts of the United States Express Company that the company would go out of business June 30, 1914, and the fact, alleged in the petition, that the express company is under contracts with the two railroad companies that do not expire until July 1, 1915.

Three petitions were filed. In one of these Mr. Andrews, as receiver for the two Frisco lines, asked permission of the court to sue the United States Express Company. The other two petitions ask damages against the express company for the two roads respectively.

The Beaumont, Sour Lake and Western railroad claims damages amounting to \$53,166.25 and the Orange and Northwestern for damages amounting to \$43,461.50.

The petition states that the United States Express Company entered into a contract on or about August 1, 1903, with each of the roads under the terms of which the railroads were to handle the business of the express company until July 1, 1915. In payment for this service the railroad companies were to receive a minimum of \$170 per mile of their tracks operated over per year, or 55 per cent of the gross earnings of the express company over their lines.

June 30 marked the last day of the United States Express Company, once the most powerful and extensive express company in the United States. Under the administration of Thomas G. Platt, its president for a number of years before his death, this company was the most aggressive in the field, securing the choicest routes for its business and skimming the cream of the express business of the country. Senator Platt was the leader in the 20-year fight against parcel post and up to the time of his death was able to muster strength enough to kill every attempt to pass a parcel post law or appropriation.

The bulk of the business of the United States Express Company has been acquired by the Wells Fargo Company, who through the passing of the United States Company has enlarged its sphere of operation about 70 per cent.

First Bale Sold for \$500.

Houston, Tex.—The first bale of the 1914 cotton crop, shipped to Houston from Lyford, Cameron County, was sold Saturday on the floor of the Houston Cotton Exchange to the highest bidder for \$500. W. D. Cleveland & Sons being the purchasers. Later in the day the bale was shipped by express to Jacks, Zwyne & Co., New York.

Joseph Chamberlain Dead.

London.—Joseph Chamberlain, one of the most striking figures in British politics in the past generation, died at his London home Friday. His death came as a surprise. He had been suffering with paralysis, yet the condition of his health was not known to be any worse than for the past three years.

Nacogdoches, Tex.—A negro church and school house in the Swift community, about eight miles east from town, was blown to atoms by dynamite recently.

Grows Wonderful Grass Crop.

Temple, Tex.—From three acres of Soudan grass planted on his Leon River Valley farm R. E. Coleman of Temple exhibited samples of grass Monday, some nine feet long, from which he states he will harvest an average of 700 pounds per acre of grass seed, which is worth in the market \$1 per pound and has been quoted as high as \$2.50 a pound.

Country Girl Wins Race.

Seabrook, Tex.—The race between the Country Girl, a 34-foot sloop that has for years held the sailing championship for her class on the Texas coast, and the Hicks of Palacios, was the principal event at the Seabrook regatta of the Houston Launch Club Saturday. The Country Girl won by 23 minutes.

To Erect Confederate Shaft.

Llano, Tex.—The Daughters of the Confederacy have let the contract for the erection of a monument on the court house square in honor of the Confederate soldiers. The contract price is \$1,200.

Silos and Gravel Roads.

Richmond, Tex.—Two silos have recently been erected on the Bernard river plantation. Work on the gravel road between Richmond and Thompson is being rapidly pushed to completion.

For Undesirable Vegetation.

Common salt is not so effective as oil on grass and narrow-leaved vegetation, but is better than arsenite of soda. When the vegetation is very rank salt will be found very desirable and should be used at the rate of from two to three tons per acre, depending upon the rankness of the growth. The salt should be fine-grained, free from lumps, and should be scattered very uniformly. To secure the best results, it should be made into a saturated solution, one pound being mixed with a quart and a half of water. The salt brine should be applied by means of a sprinkling can or sprinker, which applies it faster than a spraying outfit.
