

neighbor. They parted at the crossroads within sight of the cabin.

John and Lemuel were at school the same day and left Welsh when school was out, about 3:30 p. m. There was nothing in evidence to show when the old folks or Fay were last seen alive. The discovery of the murders was made on Monday, February 24, in the evening, an was brought about by John Downes, a Lake Charles stock dealer, telephoning to Paul Daniel, a Welsh merchant, concerning some stock which he said Ward Earl had offered to sell him and had left at his barn without effecting a sale.

Mr. Daniels knew nothing about it, and sent for Miss Earl, who clerked in a nearby store. The young lady had not heard that Ward intended to sell any of the stock and she remembered that she had heard and seen nothing of the family for two weeks. Alarmed by the inquiry she went to a nearby livery stable, and secured a rig and driver, and drove rapidly to the farm. Naturally she stopped first at her brother's cabin. She reached it just about dusk. The front door was locked and the windows barred. Entrance was secured through the rear. Miss Earl passed the living room, and to the door of her brother's bed room; it was obstructed. She pushed it partly open, glanced inside, and fell fainting in the driver's arms.

Without permitting the girl to examine further the driver carried her to the buggy and drove back to Welsh. A small party of men immediately set out for the cabin in his company, and found the little room full of corpses. Ward Earl lay dead on the bed; the bodies of his mother and three brothers were piled like cordwood on the floor. All were in a state of partial decomposition. The walls of the room were filled with shot, and empty cartridge shells were strewn about.

On the door was tacked a notice with Ward Earl's name signed to it, stating he had gone to Lake Charles and would not be back till Friday or Saturday. On the floor were scraps of paper with the same notice partially written. An old horse lay dead in the barn of starva-

tion. All of the rest of the stock was gone.

At the main residence things were in confusion. Drawers where valuables would ordinarily be kept had been emptied out on the table, and Earl's papers were scattered about. The father was missing, but not for long. Early in the morning of February 25 his remains were found in a ditch nearby. A load of shot had been emptied into his body.

The same day Ed Batson, the missing farm hand, was located at Spicard, Missouri, where his mother lived, and placed under arrest.
