Brigands' Coffee.

While hot the berries are bruised with stones and put into a pot of fast boiling water, which is held over the fire five minutes. The fragrant beverage is now poured into a pitcher, at the bottom of which a lump of honey has been placed, and is drunk forthwith. It is delicious. The quantity of berries put into the pot is regulated according to the strength of the coffee required.—Exchange.
