

# POLICE JURY PROCEEDINGS

28, to the s. w. corner, sec. 21-4-6, for the convenience of property owners we have in some instances taken the entire right of way off of one side of the sec. line, as will more fully appear from report to be made by the Parish Surveyor.

We have taken from each adjoining property 30 feet for right of way, on legal sub-dividing lines, except as referred to above and have received the right of way from all land owners on said route except, R. H. Narens, Est. Iowa Town Site Co. La. Co. W. C. Terril American Land Co. E. S. Woods, C. E. Smith, Est. C. H. Hawze, Van Houvel, A. Cross, Gulf Ref. Co. A. E. Parent, J. A. Stevens, w. m. d. Lee. and we expropriate the right of way over said lands and assess damages at \$1.00 each, and we most respectfully ask that you adopt this report and grant us said road.

By Mr. Fontenot: That above report be received and adopted and that said right of way be declared a public highway and that the Ordinances concerning ordinance expropriating right of way.

### Old Claims From Calcasieu

A claim was presented for the proportionate share of the Parish of Jefferson Davis from the Parish of Calcasieu, and having been made by the Parish of Allen, as election expense, and amounting to \$206.13, and the same having the approval of the Dist. Atty. and appearing a just claim was approved, and ordered paid out of the "Outstanding indebtedness" Fund.

### Panama Exposition

Mr. Hebert of the La. Dep. of Agri. representing the Panama Exposition appeared and made a plea for assistance for the publicity work at the Panama Exposition at San Francisco in 1915. By Mr. Hathaway, that \$100 be appropriated to be paid out of the contingent fund, from the funds of 1915, to the Panama Exposition Co. to advertise and exploit the resources of the Parish. Carried.

### L. C. R. R. and Nav. Co

Notice of suit by the L. C. R. R. and Nav. Co. resisting the collection of taxes, was received, and ordered to be forwarded to the Dist. Atty. for such action as may be necessary and proper and that the Pres. of the Police Jury be authorized to act as he may be advised by the Dist. Atty.

Resolution, authorizing Wards 6 and 8 to purchase Road Machinery. By Mr. Fontenot—Resolved that Wards 6 and 8, jointly be authorized to purchase road machinery, grader and engine, and such other machinery as may be required for road work and expend therefor not to exceed \$4000, payable out of the Special Ward funds, of Wards 6-8, machinery being for the account of and for the use of said Wards and to be under the exclusive control of said wards for public use. Carried. On motion of Mr. Arceneaux, the Police Jury adjourned until 1:30.

### Afternoon Session Jail

In pursuance of the order of the District Court to construct a jail, for the Parish of Jefferson Davis, the following Resolution was adopted on a Yeas and Nays vote, 7 Yeas, 2 Nays.

### RESOLUTION

Resolved by the Police Jury of Jefferson Davis Parish that John H. Cooper, President, be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to advertise for sealed bids for the erection and completion of a fire proof jail at Jennings, to be constructed of brick, cement and steel, in compliance with the sanitary and other requirements of the Louisiana State Board of Health; said jail to be adequate for the accommodation of not less than twenty-four prisoners and not less than two insane persons at the same time, with separate accommodations for the white and colored, and for male and female inmates; the cost of said jail not to exceed the sum of Fifteen thousand and no one hundred dollars, each bid to be accompanied by a complete set of plans and specifications, for which no charge is to be made; said jail to be completed and delivered within six months from date of contract; said advertisement shall stipulate that any and all bids may be rejected at the option of the Police Jury, and that all bids shall be filed with the Clerk of the Police Jury on or before the 3rd day of December, A. D. 1914, at 11:00 o'clock A. M.; each bid shall be accompanied by a certified check for the sum of one thousand and

no one hundred dollars, payable to John H. Cooper, President.

It shall be understood, and said advertisement shall so stipulate, that the check of any bidder whose bid is accepted shall be forfeited, in the event he fails to enter and to execute within ten days from date of awarding the contract, a contract containing all the provisions of what is known as the "Uniform Builders Contract," or if he fails to furnish bond with solvent surety for the faithful performance of the contract price; said bond to be approved by the President of the Police Jury, and to be filed within ten days from date upon which the bid is accepted. Checks of all bidders whose bids have not been accepted shall be returned forthwith to the owner.

Pursuant to above resolution John H. Cooper, President, issued the following notice to Contractors.

### Notice To Contractors

In pursuance to a resolution adopted by the Police Jury of Jefferson Davis Parish at its meeting on November 5th, 1914, public notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by me for the erection and completion of a fire proof parish jail at Jennings, Louisiana, said jail to be constructed of brick, cement and steel in compliance with the sanitary and other regulations of the Louisiana State Board of Health, said jail to be adequate for the accommodation of not less than twenty-four prisoners and not less than two insane persons at the same time, with separate accommodations for prisoners and insane, and separate accommodations for white and colored, and for male and female inmates.

No bid in excess of Fifteen thousand and no one hundred dollars will be considered and each bid shall be accompanied by a complete set of plans and specifications for the erection of said jail building no charge to be made for such plans and specifications; said jail to be completed and delivered to the Police Jury of Jefferson Davis Parish with six months from date of contract, and such delivery shall be free from all liens and incumbrances of any kind or nature whatsoever, said contract price to cover and include the cost of all material and equipment for said jail. The Police Jury of Jefferson Davis Parish reserving the right and option to reject any and all bids. No bid will be considered unless the same shall have been delivered properly sealed to the Clerk of the Police Jury of Jefferson Davis Parish on or before the 3rd day of December A. D. 1914 at 11:00 o'clock A. M. at which time all bids will be opened at Jennings, Louisiana.

Each bid shall be accompanied by the certified check of the bidder for the sum of one Thousand and No hundreds dollars, said checks to be payable to John H. Cooper, President.

The check of the successful bidder, if any, shall be forfeited in the event he fails to enter into and execute within ten days of the contract, a contract with the Police Jury containing all of the provisions of what is known as "Uniform Builders contract", or if he fails to furnish bond according to the laws of Louisiana with solvent surety to be approved by the President of the Police Jury, binding and obligating said bidder to the faithful performance of all of the conditions and terms of the contract, said bond to be in a sum equal to the amount of the contract price, and to be filed within ten days of the date upon which the bid is accepted. Checks of all bidders whose bids have not been accepted will be returned immediately to the owners thereof.

## Charter— Welsh Warehouse Company.

State of Louisiana,  
Parish of Jefferson Davis;  
Before me, Charles E. Carr, duly commissioned and qualified Notary Public, in and for said Parish and State, on this 21st. day of September 1914, personally came and appeared Simpson O. Scoggins, Rosamond R. Arceneaux, Wade E. Plaque, Lee E. Robinson, Elwin C. Willard, Joseph A. Verret, George R. Boling, William E. Faught and Arthur T. Jones, all residents of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, each of whom declared unto me in the presence of the hereinafter named and undersigned competent witnesses that they do hereby organize themselves into and create a body corporate in law and adopt the following articles of incorporation for the control of themselves and such other persons as may become associated with or succeed them.

### Article I.

The name of said corporation is declared to be the WELSH WAREHOUSE COMPANY, under which name and title it shall enjoy all of the immunities rights and privileges conferred by law upon corporations for a period of ninety-nine years from date hereof.

### Article II.

The domicile of said corporation is declared to be in the town of Welsh, Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana.

### Article III.

The objects and purposes for which said corporation is formed are declared to be for the purpose of conducting a public or private warehouse business in the town of Welsh, Louisiana, or such other places as may be decided upon by the Board of Directors; to buy, own, sell, or lease real estate; to buy and sell feed, fertilizer, coal, oil, sacks, twine, machinery and generally all character of plantation or farm supplies, and to do all things incident to and connected with the conduct of either a private or public warehouse business, and the advancing or furnishing of supplies to farmers or planters.

### Article IV.

The capital stock of said corporation is declared to be Twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars, divided into two hundred and fifty (250) shares of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars each, and this corporation shall be authorized to commence business when said two-hundred and fifty (250) shares of its capital stock has been subscribed for, each subscription must be accompanied with the payment of at least fifty per cent of the capital so subscribed; the remaining portion of said subscription shall be payable upon demand of the Board of Directors, but in no event shall it be paid later than January 15th, 1915. No certificate of stock shall be issued as evidence of ownership of stock until the purchase price thereof has been paid.

### Article V.

The business affairs of this corporation and the management thereof shall be entrusted to a Board of Directors of not less than five nor more than nine stockholders, the number thereof to be determined for the ensuing year at each annual meeting of the stockholders, when said directors are selected. The directors until the first annual meeting of the stockholders, which shall occur on the 2nd Monday of January, 1915, are declared to be as follows: Simpson O. Scoggins, Rosamond R. Arceneaux, Wade E. Plaque, Lee E. Robinson, Elwin C. Willard, Joseph A. Verret, George R. Boling, William E. Faught and Arthur T. Jones.

### Article VI.

The officers of said corporation are declared to be a President, a Vice President and a Secretary-Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usually incumbent upon such officers of a corporation, and such other duties as may, from time to time, be assigned to them by the Board of Directors. Until the first meeting of the stockholders on the 2nd Monday of January, 1915, the officers are declared to be, Lee E. Robinson, President; Rosamond R. Arceneaux, Vice-President, and Joseph A. Verret, Secretary-Treasurer.

Citations and other legal processes shall be served upon the President, or in his absence, on the Vice-President, and in the absence of both, upon the Secretary-Treasurer.

### Article VII.

The stockholders of this corporation shall hold a regular annual meeting upon the second Monday of January, 1915, and annually thereafter, and the Secretary-Treasurer shall mail a written or printed notice to each stockholder to his last known postoffice address not less than fifteen days preceding said meeting, which notice shall state the hour, date and place of the meeting. The Board of Directors may call a special meeting at any time, as provided by law, in which event a similar notice shall be given to each stockholder at least fifteen days prior to said meeting, which notice of a special meeting in all respects must comply with the provisions of Act 267 of the Acts of 1914.

### Article VIII.

The name, postoffice address and number of shares of the capital stock subscribed for by each incorporator are declared to be as follows:

### Article IX.

No stockholder shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance of the stock subscribed by him, nor shall any mere informality in the organization have the effect of rendering the charter null and expose a stockholder to any liability other than as herein provided.
