Kansas Prohibition

In the recent campaign this paper received hundreds of letters from its readers, from Virginia to Oregon and Washington, asking The Weekly Star for information as to the "future" of prohibition in Kansas. The saloon interests had flooded every state, especially where prohibition was the issue, with literature to prove that Kansas was in a deplorable condition as a result of prohibition.

The answer to the whisky ring is to be found in the election returns from Kansas. The saloon interests made a hard fight in Kansas under conditions that were ideal for their purpose, for resubmission of the prohibitory law.

There were six candidates for governor on the Kansas ballot. Every candidate except the candidate of the resubmissionists was pledged to prohibition. Other issues divided the followers of all the "dry" candidates, but the resubmissionists were united upon their candidate. The names of the candidates were on the new Massachusetts ballot so that no party ticket could hide the issue from the view of any voter in the state who desired to vote for a return to the open saloon. The issue was clearly understood by every citizen of Kansas.

Nearly six hundred thousand votes were polled in the state. It was the biggest vote ever polled, and the most representative. If ever the resubmissionists hoped for a showing against prohibition in that state, they had their chance this year.

The result was that out of the six hundred thousand votes polled, the resubmission candidate received about fifty thousand. One citizen in every twelve in Kansas voted for resubmission.

The statement was made by The Weekly Star during the campaign, in answer to the many of the letters received, that not more than one voter in every seven in Kansas favored a return to the saloon. Even this paper underestimated the strength of prohibition in Kansas.

Kansas has made a thorough test of prohibition. It has won the fight against the whiskey ring, and it is so well pleased with the result that nothing more will be heard of resubmission in that state. That should be sufficient answer for every intelligent citizen in the country anywhere, to the slanders of the saloon keepers against Kansas. —Kansas City Star


