

WHY DELAYS FIGHT FOR THIRTY DAYS

ACTION TO BE TAKEN ON DEBATED QUESTIONS FOR ONE MONTH.

CHARGED WITH INJUSTICE

The Farmers of Four Wards Are Highly Incensed and Greatly Agitated.

Baton Rouge—

With farmers from the Fifth, Seventh, Ninth and Tenth wards on the hand clamoring for a rescinding of the recent cattle dipping regulations, and the ladies of Baton Rouge on the other demanding a vote on the issue, the East Baton Rouge parish jury solved the problem for the present by tabling both measures for thirty days. Both the farmers and the ladies expected immediate action.

After the presentation of their petitions to the police jury, and the jury's declining to take action at that time, some of the farmers especially interested in holding up the dipping, and have affidavits made out against us for the violation of the police jury regulations," said S. B. Davy, who has been one of the leaders in the fight against dipping.

"We are not going to dip on the issue assigned to us to dip," was the decision of the five hundred signers of the petition to the police jury.

"Money is being raised to fight the issue," said H. O'Neil who has also taken a prominent part in the fight against dipping.

Less than two thousand are covered in the assessment rolls, and it is reported that Dr. Washer has already dipped some fifteen thousand head.

The farmers of the four wards are highly incensed and greatly agitated over what the claim to an injustice, and their open threats that they are going to defy the law indicates that conditions have reached a critical stage.

They denounce those in charge of the work as grafters, the Baton Rouge people interested in tick eradication as hoodlums, and impugn the police jury for its delayed action. Nothing short of a special election, in which the city of Baton Rouge will be excluded, to determine whether or not the dipping regulations shall prevail, is a direct rescinding of the dipping ordinance by the police jury.

The interesting view of the situation was revealed when one of the farmers told a business man of Baton Rouge that should the city saddle dipping on the farmers, the farmers would saddle prohibition on the city.

BRIEFLY RELATED.

Mr. Samuel's—Amending the chattel mortgage law: ayes 88, nays 12.

Mr. Butler—Prohibiting corporations from contributing to campaign funds: ayes, 94; nays, 12.

Mr. Martin of St. James—Approving \$70,000 to pay the expenses of the constitutional convention: ayes, 83; nays, 23.

Senator Well—Authorizing parishes and municipalities to pledge one-half mills of their general revenue for not more than twenty years to fund floating indebtedness: ayes, 97; nays, 7.

There seems to be a little more opposition feeling amongst the lumber operators of the Osage Belt than any time since the beginning of the war. The demand for yellow pine lumber and timber is increasing and the mills are now assured of a continuance of their recent advance prices.

One of the finest Jersey herds in the country has just been purchased by Louisiana. J. K. Newman, the Orleans banker, who has located a model demonstration dairy farm at Donaldsonville, is the purchaser.

C. H. Staples, of the Louisiana University and the government extension service, made the selection of the Avoyelles parish jury of \$250 in aid of the Avoyelles parish fair to be held this fall.

Faced by certain rebuke from the House membership, the Pleasant-Thomas-Sanders insurgent combine surrendered to the Senate demand for New Orleans as the meeting place for the constitutional convention. For its part the Senate receded from its demand for fifteen delegates at large. Breaking of the twenty-four-hour deadlock between the two houses in conference committee followed immediately and the committee report, based upon the agreement, was adopted in the House by a vote of 166 to 2, and in the Senate by a vote of 30 to 2. The Sundry convention bill thus completed its final legislative stage and will go to the governor for signature.

The series of maneuvers leading up to the agreement from one of the most interesting chapters in the remarkable contest which has attended the course of the Sundry bill through its legislative career. The capitulation of the insurgents, which came just before the noon hour, claimed a strong movement organized in the House to break the conference committee deadlock by ordering the House conferees to agree to the Senate's final terms of New Orleans as the meeting place. Originally the Senate also asked fifteen delegates at large but a disposition to recede from the last demand if the other could be secured was indicated by the Senate conferees.

Gov. Hall signed ten bills. Four remain on his desk and five which have passed both Houses are still to be enrolled. The bills signed follow:

Fontenot's anti-trust bills, three in number.

Davy's dock board bills, two in number.

Butler's anti-slush fund bill.

Locke's bill approving leases of state oil lands.

Claiborne's bill authorizing banks to discount time drafts.

Samuel's chattel mortgage bill.

Gordon's bill creating a rural credit commission.

The governor still has on his desk the general appropriation bill, the special bill carrying a \$70,000 appropriation of the constitutional convention and two measures by Senator Well which are being held up pending inquiry into an error said to have crept into one of them.

Representative Fortier's concurrent resolution memorializing the State Department to make final settlement of the question of citizenship attending the birth in this country of offspring of French parents, which was passed by the House, encountered opposition when it was introduced in the Senate. It finally was adopted, however, several senators voting against it because they believe the General Assembly should not "put itself in the position of asking for that to which the people are inherently entitled."

There will be many fine specimens added to the big bird collection in the natural history building of the state museum when Naturalist Schneider returns from the M'Ilhany Game Preserve, on Avery Island, in the course of the next few days.

Louisiana's state banks are placed on a par with national banks in handling time drafts, through a bill introduced in the Legislature by Representative Ferd Claiborne which passed the Senate, and will go to the governor.

Completion of a waterway 91 miles long from Crowley to the Gulf was celebrated here. It affords a water route from the gulf to the center of the Louisiana rice district. The project required several years.

The Sicily Island Oil and Gas Company is getting ready to sink their sixth well. The sand formations and strata now being passed through is the same that is in the Osage regions of Arkansas. The drillers have reached 1800 feet and expect to strike the pocket of gas.

The House of Representatives of the Louisiana legislature adopted a resolution calling upon the Louisiana congressional delegation to urge upon the State Department the necessity for a more specific declaration of citizenship for Americans born of foreign parentage.

Appropriations amounting to \$100 have been provided by the board of directors of the South Louisiana Fair Association of Donaldsonville for various free attractions at the big fair to be held under the auspices of the organization in this city October 13 to 17, next.


Small lots of peaches are now being sent to market and before the end of this month the movement of the Gibsland crop will be under full headway.
