

FARMERS PROPOSE STORAGE PLANT

PLACE MAY BE ESTABLISHED FOR HOLDING CROPS READY FOR THE MARKET.

ESTABLISH SELLING BUREAU

Another Meeting Will Be Held August 15, When Full Details Will Be Made Public.

Pointe-a-la-Hache.—The lower coast truck and fruit farmers, on the east bank of the river, propose to have a cold storage and a selling plant as part of the selling organization they are forming.

A general meeting was held at Pointe-a-la-Hache and Col. R. G. Carlin, acting chairman, reported that while not much haste was being made there was constant and steady progress and gratifying approach to unanimity.

There will be another general meeting at the Plaquemines courthouse on August 15, when the full details will be made public.

Petitions of protest against the advance in rates on sand, gravel, crushed stones and shells applied for by the different railroads of the state has been filed with the Louisiana Railroad Commission by a number of the parishes.

The State Conservation Commission has received information that J. J. McKeeton of Johnson's Bayou, Cameron parish, had been found guilty of selling aigrette plumes, and heavily fined in the District Court.

The Democratic Caddo Parish Executive Committee at Shreveport recommended the resolution it adopted a week ago putting the ban on "single-shotting" at the primary election on July 27, to select nominees for delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Dr. H. M. Blain, professor of journalism, Louisiana State University, has returned from San Francisco, where he attended a conference of the American Association of Teachers of Journalism.

In a contest of the Panama-Pacific exposition in San Francisco, King tobacco, a New Orleans brand, was awarded first honor over a large number of other brands.

O. H. Castle, owner of a 500-acre tract and stock farm northeast of Lake Charles, will co-operate with the United States government in demonstration work for cattle growers in the parish.

There were 1,030 head of cattle rounded up in the several yearly roundups at Prieto's pasture at Mandeville. The loss by carbon thus far this season was reported at three head, and the dead animals were burned as required by law.

A step forward in the long-drawn-out fight to restore navigable communication between the Mississippi river and Bayou Lafourche by means of the construction of a lock in the latter stream at Donaldsonville, was accomplished, when the joint organization of the Atchafalaya and Lafourche basin levee boards passed a resolution approving and adopting the plans for the lock as prepared by Col. Lansing H. Beach, of the U. S. Corps of Engineers, and providing that these plans and specifications, upon approval by the Board of State Engineers, be at once submitted to the United States Secretary of War for adoption and approval.

The register at the Louisiana booth at the San Francisco Fair shows a thousand visitors from the state up to a few days ago. Most benefit, however, comes from the many thousands from other states, who do not hesitate to declare the display the finest agricultural exhibit there.

State and federal game inspectors were out on an inspection trip in St. Bernard parish in the Conservation Commission automobile, and en route made a find that may get some bird fanciers into trouble.

In Judge Fred D. King's division of the Civil District Court the motion of the American Sugar Refining Company, against which ouster proceedings were instituted by the attorney general a short time ago, in opposition to the trial of the cause during the vacation period of the court, was argued.

Before leaving the capital for New Orleans, Governor Hall appointed Levering Moore, vice president of the Mortgage Securities Company of New Orleans, as chairman, and I. S. West, a farmer of West Baton Rouge, and Robert L. Himes, professor of commerce at the Louisiana State University as members of the Rural Banking or Credit Commission created by Act No. 19 of 1915.

As a result of protests entered by transportation and export interests of New Orleans, the Board of Port Commissioners have postponed for sixty days the putting into effect of their new port charges. The new rates were to have gone into effect August 1, but this would have given the persons interested insufficient time to discuss the effect of the change, hence the date was changed to October 1.

Attorney General Pleasant has ruled that women can neither sit in the Constitutional Convention as delegates nor vote for delegates to the convention. His opinion was rendered on the application filed with Chairman J. C. Henriques, of the Parish Democratic committee, by Mrs. Christopher Hanilton Tebault, who wanted to be recognized as a candidate for the Third ward.

Special elections have been called for August 31, the date set for the election for delegates to the convention and the vote of the people on whether it will be held, to choose members of the boards of school directors for the Fourth ward of St. Landry, the Fifth ward of Bienville, the First ward of West Baton Rouge, the Fourth ward of Washington and the Fourth ward of Tensas.

A statement of the imports through the port of New Orleans for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1915, issued by the collector of the port, shows a falling off of nearly \$20,000,000, as compared to last year. In view of the troubled condition of shipping at present, the showing is considered to be nothing short of remarkable.

At the large sale of blooded Duroc Jersey hogs, held by the Bolds Liva Stock Company, of Plaquemine, there were buyers present from five states. In the short space of three hours, eighty-four hogs were sold, bringing an average of \$65.75 per head for the breed sows.


