Ordinance No. 87.

AN ORDINANCE submitting to the property tax payers qualified to vote therein of Road District No. 2 of Jefferson Davis parish, Louisiana, a proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds of said District to the amount of one hundred twenty-five thousand \$125,000.00 dollars for the purpose of building and constructing good roads and a system of modern highways in said District, pursuant to Article 281 of the Constitution of 1913 and Act 256 of the Legislature of 1910 as amended by Act 218 of 1912 and Act 183 of 1914.

Whereas, Article 281 of the Constitution of 1913 and Act 256 of the Legislature of 1910, as amended by Act 218 of 1912, and Act 183 of 1914, declares the Police Jury of the parish of Jefferson Davis to be the governing authority thru which such Road District may incur debt and issue negotiable bonds for such purposes, when so authorized by an election held in said Road District; and

Whereas, the assessed valuation of said Road District amounts to one million, three hundred fifty thousand, nine hundred fifty dollars \$1,350,950.00, and there is no existing bonded indebtedness against said Road District; and

Whereas, the special tax necessary to be annually levied to extinguish the proposed indebtedness will not exceed ten mills on the dollar, which is the constitutional limit provided by Article 281 of the Constitution of 1913, as amended by various amendments to extinguish said indebtedness incurred under said article; now, therefore:

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the parish of Jefferson Davis, in lawful session convened, that an election shall be, and is hereby, called to be held in Road District No. 2 of the parish of Jefferson Davis, Jefferson Davis on the 19th day of October 1915, at which election a majority of the property taxpayers of Road District No. 2 of the parish of Jefferson Davis in number and amount, eligible to vote and voting, shall determine the proposition to incur debt and issue bonds of said Road District No. 2 of the parish of Jefferson Davis in the amount of one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000.00) to run for a period of 25 years, bearing interest at the rate of five per centum (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually, the funds thus derived to be used for the purpose of building and improving the highways system in said Road District, as follows: To build, construct and surface, with some approved road material, a system of good roads or modern highways within said District, according to the map, plans and plats attached hereto and filed herewith.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the ballot boxes, necessary blanks and other necessary paraphernalia shall be provided by the Clerk of the Police Jury, and he shall cause to be printed ballots for use in said election, in the following form, to-wit:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"

"Proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds of Road District No. 2 of the parish of Jefferson Davis to the amount of one hundred twenty-five thousand (\$125,000.00) dollars, to run for twenty five years, bearing interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of building and improving the highway system in said Road District

as follows: To build, construct and surface, with some approved road material, a system of good roads or modern highways within said District according to the map, plans and plats attached to this petition and filed of record.

"Taxable valuation \$.....
"Signature of voter.....

"Notice to voters: To vote in favor of proposition submitted upon this ballot, the voter will place a cross (X) mark in the square after the word "YES"; to vote against it place a similar mark after the word "NO."

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the compensation of said election commissioners of said election shall be three dollars (\$3.00) per day for one day; and the said election shall be held at the following place and by the officials here named, each being a registered voter:

At Jennings, at the Mayor's office, Election Commissioners: Chas. Daughenbaugh E. A. Toups, Guy Connelly, Clerk of election L. L. Crowl.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That notice of this election, containing the proposition herein submitted to the voters, shall be prepared and signed by the President and Clerk of the Police Jury, and shall be published by the clerk in official journal by four weekly insertions to be thirty (30) days before the date of the election.

The said notice shall recite that: "On the 20th day of October, 1915, the first day following such election at 9:00 o'clock A. M., the Police Jury will meet at the court house of Jennings, in the parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, and there in public sees on open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots, both as to number and amount, and examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of said election, and promulgate the same."

Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the plan and map hereto attached showing the roads proposed to be constructed and built in ward 2, or Road District No. 2, are defined to be as follows: 1st, two lines of road running north and south thru the entire length of the ward from the south boundary line to the north boundary line thereof, and known at present respectively as the Lake Arthur and Cutting Avenue roads.

2nd, A road from Mermentau thru Jennings where what is now known as the Mermentau road is located up to Railroad Avenue; Railroad Avenue to the intersection of North Main Street; thence up North Main Street to Davies avenue and on Davies avenue west to the west boundary line of ward 2, known as the Jennings-Roanoke road.

3rd, Cary Avenue from Davies Avenue south to Railroad Avenue.

4th, West Division Street from Lake Arthur Avenue to North Main Street.

5th, South Main Street from Railroad Avenue South to Madison Street.

6th, From Cutting Avenue to the Jaenke Bridge, on what is now called the Oilfield road.

Making in all about thirty-two "32" or thirty three "33" Miles of road together with such cross roads, streets and connectives as it is possible to build and construct with the amount of funds, especially a road from Lake Arthur Avenue road at a point near the south boundary of ward 2 west about a mile and a half.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after its adoption and promulgation.


