READING FOR THE SOLDIERS

Englishmen of Prominence Interest Themselves in Providing Literature for the Soldiers.

The London Times announces the completion of plans for the publication of reading material in a new and portable form, especially suitable for the trenches. Sir Walter Raleigh, professor of English literature at Oxford, has aided the Times in this work. The Times has undertaken to supply a numerous and various selection of the best passages, grave and gay, from English verse and prose, to be printed on flyleaves or broadsheets, and sold in mixed sets at a very low price. Each broadsheet can be enclosed in a letter without adding to the cost of postage, while whole assortments can be sent to officers for distribution among the men. Of these broadsheets thirty-six, in sets of six, have been arranged for.

The first set includes: The two testaments; Shakespeare, Milton and Wordsworth; "Pericles to the Athenians" (Froissart on back); selections from the "Complaint Angler"; Dickens' "A Game of Cribbage"; Macaulay's "Armanda." In the second set are: "The Song of Deborah"; four poems on the war; three essays by Bacon; "David Harris, Cricketer" (Nyen); "The Worthy Commander" (Overbury); "Partridge at the Play" (from Tom Jones). The third set offers: "The Blessed Life"; "The Last Fight of the Revenge"; "The Winchester Country" (Cobbett); some Shakespeare songs; "Mr. Micawber's Transactions"; "Cavanagh, the Fives-Player" (Hazlitt).

The fourth set is varied, starting out with King Solomon's Prayer. Following this are: "The Men in Buckram"; Tolstoy's "A Future Life"; "A Swim Below Niagara," by Trelawny; "Adonais," two letters of Charles Lamb. "David and Goliath" heads the fifth list, followed by Pope's "The Secret Happiness; Prayer; "Interview With a Pasha" (Kingslake); "A Quarrel With the Captain" (Fielding), and "The Ballad of Agincourt." In the last set are: "Bibah and the Rain;" Gray's "Elegy;" Bunyan's "The River of Death;" "The City at Night;" "Old Trees," and "Bob Acres' Duel" (Sheridan).

AUTHORITIES WILL ENFORCE GAME LAW

NO WINKING AT VIOLATIONS WILL BE PERMITTED, SAYS DISTRICT ATTORNEY.

SEASON OPENS DECEMBER 15

Local Sportsmen Claim Fund Will Be Raised if Necessary and Special Agents Employed to Guard Against Law Violations.

Lake Charles.—

Informal assurances of the Conservation Commission to the contrary, the shipment and sale of game in this part of the state will not be permitted before December 15, the date set in the state law governing market hunting, it is asserted here. Local officials have declared that while the Conservation Commission may wink at the violations of the law, they will keep their eyes particularly wide open, and offenders will be severely dealt with.

District Attorney Edwards has addressed a letter to the sheriffs in the Fifteenth Judicial district, which comprises the parishes of Calcasieu, Beauregard, Allen, Jeff Davis and Cameron, asking them rigidly to enforce the law. He announces that failure to enforce it will be followed by prosecution for malfeasance in office. In this stand the two district judges concur.

The Conservation Commission has let it be known informally that violation of the law would be winked at, taking the stand that the storm victims along the lower coast are in need, and should have access to the state's resources. One man who engages extensively in market hunting has assembled a fleet of boats, manned by seventy hunters, few of them residents of this section, and is prepared to cross into Cameron parish as soon as the hunting season opens.

A state law passed last year prohibits the sale of game prior to December 15. Perhaps aaving game in their possession for sale or shipment, and common carriers accepting such shipments, are responsible under the law. Local sportsmen will raise a fund if necessary and employ special agents to guard against law violations.

TOLD IN A FEW LINES.

Use of state funds by E. O. Bruner, commissioner of agriculture and immigration, for a pamphlet alleged to have been issued for campaign purposes, has been made the subject of a special report to Governor Hall by W. N. McFarland, supervisor of public accounts. The report has been referred by the governor to the district attorney at Baton Rouge.

Hearing on the mandamus proceedings brought against the police jury of St. Charles parish by Charles Eifer and other residents of that parish to require the displaying of vouchers for \$65,000 covering the cost of construction of a road along the bank of the Mississippi river, will be taken up at Hahnville.

Lieutenant Governor Thomas C. Barret wrote to officials of the Louisiana W. C. T. U. at Alexandria that he would approve a measure passed by the General Assembly for the prohibition of the sale of liquor within ten miles of the Louisiana State University and the Industrial Institute at Lafayette.

The DeSoto Parish Fair was a great success. The largest number of people were present on "Shreveport Day," when the Rotarians and Chamber of Commerce men with their families and friends were on hand to boost the approaching State Fair.

Mrs. Robert Chamberlain and her two-year-old son were drowned and Mr. Chamberlain was burned seriously when a motorboat in which they were traveling struck a snag in the Ouachita river, three miles below Monroe.

A public hearing on the question of continuing the improvement of Red river below Fulton, Ark., will be held at Shreveport, La., at 9 a. m., November 17, by the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors.

The Lake Charles Railroad of Calcasieu parish filed suit against the State Board of Appraisers in the District Court for a reduction in its assessment of from \$3,500 to \$1,750 per mile.

The state convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union elected the following officers for the ensuing year: Mrs. A. C. McKinney, of Ruston, president; Mrs. A. D. Elgin, of Winnfield, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Selma Pitman of Athens, recording secretary; Mrs. E. M. Henzinger, of Alexandria, treasurer.

The Salem Brick & Lumber Co. of Slidell advanced wages of Slidell employes twelve and one-half per cent.

The convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of the State of Louisiana, after a four days' session adjourned, after selecting Jennings as the next place of meeting. Invitations were received from Shreveport and Monroe, but as the conventions have been held in the Northern part of the state for several years, it was deemed advisable to select a South Louisiana town for the next convention.

A greater portion of the session was taken up with the discussion of plans for extension. Efforts will be put forth to increase the membership at least five hundred during the coming year. The membership in the state at this time is nine hundred. An unusual fact in connection with this convention is that all of the delegates remained until the close thereof.

After months of negotiations, interests represented by M. L. Benedum, J. C. Trees and A. B. Dally, Jr., of Pittsburgh, Pa., have bought and assumed control of 2,260 acres of land in the heart of the Caddo oil belt, the purchase being made from the Rogers Oil and Gas Company. The price is not stated, but it is close to \$1,250,000 and means more for the permanent development of the Shreveport field than all the small deals that have been made here in years.

New Orleans is to have another great, modern warehouse. Plans have been discussed for some time, but now have been definitely decided upon. Bids were opened at the office of Sam Stone, Jr., architect, for the big concrete and brick warehouse and elevator for handling grain, which is to be built by the John T. Gibbons Company on the New Basin Canal, between Willow and Clara streets. The lowest bidder, it was stated, was Julius Koch. The cost of the building will be about \$250,000.

A petition is being circulated and liberally signed in De Soto parish asking the police jury to order an election in Wards Two, Six, Four, Five and Seven for the purpose of permitting the property owners in these wards to vote on a bond issue of \$280,000 to pay for graveling the public road through the parish from the Cadodo to the Sabine and Natchitoches line, and all model roads in the Fourth ward of the parish.

Arrangements are being made to repair and enlarge the Church of Our Lady of Prompt Succor, Westwego, a committee composed of Vic. A. F. Tre, chairman; Dupre Terrebonne, William T. Quinn, Vincent St. Blanc and Andre Armondin being named to take charge of the work. A fund is being raised, each of the Catholic societies contributing \$50 towards it.

A big national defense rally and preparedness celebration will be held by the Louisiana division of the Navy League in New Orleans, Thursday, November 18. John Temple Graves, who is one of the directors of the Navy League, will be the principal speaker and addresses also will be made by prominent local men interested in Navy League work.

Parish Assessor L. L. Richard has completed the tax roll for the parish of Jefferson Davis for the year 1915. The total assessed valuation is \$5,092,480, an increase of about \$55,000 over last year. The assessment at Jennings is \$912,910; Welsh, \$384,330; Lake Arthur, \$275,690, and Elton, \$83,820.

An unusual occurrence happened at Cataboula lake, when fishermen caught an immense tarpon. It measured fully six feet. The scales are about two to three inches in diameter and on one side is a larger silver spot which gave it an unusual beauty. This fish doubtless came in during the storm.

Officials of the New Orleans Board of Trade are congratulating themselves on adhering to their strict standard of grading wheat for export. From faraway Italy has come a loud protest that faulty shipments of grain are being received there from America.

The beginning of work on the dredging of the canals for the drainage of the Fourth Jefferson Drainage district was a matter of great interest to everyone interested in suburban land, especially land between the city center and Lake Pontchartrain.

The Young Women's Christian Association has been offered a free scholarship in vical music by one best instructors of New Orleans. It will be awarded to the applicant who is best fitted to profit by it in the judgment of the teacher conferring it.

The Longbridge Cotton Oil Company's main building at Cottonport was destroyed by fire, the loss being estimated at \$35,000, partly covered by insurance.

What is said to be the first flying fish caught in Lake Pontchartrain was landed off Spanish Fort by Thomas A. Clarke, a well known railroad man of 1308 Moss street, New Orleans. The fish was caught with hook and line.

Mayor Behrman received quite a number of checks, contributions to the fund raised to advertise New Orleans in moving pictures to be taken on Orange Day, November 19, when the Liberty Bell will be here.

Salmon Thrive in Maine. Success has been met by the bureau of fisheries in establishing hump-back salmon on the Maine coast, according to reports from that territory. The fish were planted in February, 1914. Many fish weighing five to seven and a half pounds have been taken or seen in Penobscot river, Me., and twenty were captured alive by agents of the bureau near Bangor and held in an effort to obtain ripe eggs. From two of these fish 3,000 eggs were taken September 6, and, after fertilization, sent to the Craig Brook hatchery for incubation. Local fishermen caught and ate large numbers, and an employee of the Green Lake hatchery took fifteen fish last week. These had passed through the fishways in dams in Dennys river and were dropping down stream in a spent condition; at the same time both live and dead fish were observed below the dams.
