

## AMERICAN DOCTORS TO FIGHT TYPHUS IN MEXICO

Expedition Will Leave Laredo When Permission Is Granted—Plague Has Already Claimed Many Victims.

El Paso, Tex.—An expedition of American physicians will start from Laredo, Texas, south into Mexico to fight the typhus fever epidemic as soon as permission can be obtained from the Mexican de facto government, according to an announcement made this week by Carlos Husk, chief surgeon for the American Smelting and Refining Company. The expedition will be headed by Drs. Liebman and Oltzky of Mount Sinai hospital, New York, and Dr. Husk, it is said.

Compiled reports to federal officials show there are at least one hundred thousand cases of typhus in Mexico. Aguascalientes alone having 5,000. Out of a population of 20,000 in Pachuca, 1,890 died in December. The number of cases in the state of Chihuahua and Sonora is unknown.

The American physicians plan to combat the disease with the same methods used so successfully in Serbia recently.

Once in Mexico they will encase themselves in silk underclothing with outer garments of linen, which will be fastened to their legs and rubber gloved wrists by bands of adhesive tape. They will wear rubber boots, about the ankles of which bands of crude oil will be painted to keep off the vermin.

Frequent baths of equal parts of kerosene and vinegar also will be used. The silk underclothing is listed as "very important," as the body vermin which are held solely responsible for communicating the disease have no affinity for silk.

The kerosene and vinegar baths will be applied to suspects and patients in addition to the use of a serum specific treatment.

In the meantime the El Paso County Medical Society, including in its membership physicians attached to municipal, state and national health services, have discussed measures to prevent the entrance of the disease into this country.

### Hydrogen Gas Caused Explosion.

Washington.—Gas generated by the new Edison storage battery and ignited by a spark of unknown origin is held responsible for the explosion on the submarine E-2 at the New York navy yard Saturday in a report to Secretary Daniels Tuesday by the board of inquiry. This board made an investigation preliminary to that now being conducted by the naval court of inquiry to determine the cause of the disaster in which five men lost their lives and nine were injured seriously.

### Some Americans Stay in Mexico.

El Paso, Tex.—Mormons in Chihuahua state do not intend to come to the United States in deference to the advice and counsel of the American government, according to Mexican officials who received advices Monday stating that the colonists, numbering about five hundred, were to concentrate under protection of Carranza garrisons stationed at Casas Grandes and other points, until the country is cleared of bandits.

### Delinquent Fee Is Not Included.

Austin, Tex.—An opinion was rendered by the attorney general's department Saturday that the fee of 5c a line provided in an act of the thirty-fourth legislature as compensation to tax collectors for making delinquent tax records and supplements thereto should not be included in determining the maximum amount tax collectors should receive.

### Lusitania Proposal Not Accepted.

Washington.—Germany's proposal to incorporate in the settlement of the Lusitania case a reservation of any admission of wrongdoing by her submarine commander is understood to have been rejected by the United States.

### 85,000 Bags of Sugar Sold.

New Orleans, La.—The American sugar refinery bought 85,000 bags of sugar Tuesday, valued at close to \$1,250,000.

## PRIZES AWARDED BY INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS

Great Achievements Made in Cultivation of Field Crops, Garden Products, Live Stock, Etc.

Dallas, Tex.—Epoch-making achievements in the cultivation of field crops and garden products and in the growing of live stock marked the result of the various contests of the Texas Industrial Congress during 1915, according to the reports of the results obtained by the contestants in the various classes made public at the seventh annual convention of the congress at Dallas Saturday.

Billie Minter, a 10-year-old school boy of Austin, accomplished perhaps the most remarkable results ever obtained in Texas in a garden contest for boys and girls. He not only won a first prize of \$100 in gold in this division, but was awarded a handsome gold watch, the gift of two friends of the late Colonel Henry Exall, founder of the Texas Industrial Congress.

On a plot of ground 10x20 yards, in the back yard of his home in Austin, Billie Minter grew a garden which produced during the year 572 pounds of vegetables. According to the standard price set by the congress, the value of these products was \$33.32 gross. On this same scale an acre of ground cultivated as successfully would have yielded a profit of nearly \$7,000. In achieving this result, E. W. Kirkpatrick, president of the Texas Industrial Congress, said Billie Minter had perhaps set a record for the world in scientific gardening.

The results in the other divisions were almost as startling in many instances. Alvin Tieroff of Vernon, who represented himself and his family at the convention, returned home with six prizes aggregating \$685. He won the first prize of \$500 for the best four-acre model farm. His son, Otto Tieroff, won three prizes in the wheat, baby beef and hog contests, aggregating \$150, and his daughters, Annie and Hertha, won prizes of \$25 and \$10, respectively, in the peanut and garden contests.

The Goodnight School, a negro rural school near Kerens, in Navarro county, won a second prize of \$75 in the school garden contest, and James Little, a negro living at Waxahachie, won a second prize of \$75 in the adult garden class on a commercial basis.

A general survey of the reports made by the contestants show the following facts: Average yield of corn per acre, 68.94 bushels, at a net profit of \$33.75; 3.3 tons of cowpeas, at a net profit of \$52.70; 1,118 bales of cotton, at a net profit of \$90.98; 3.16 tons of grain sorghums, at a net profit of \$49.05, and 2.92 tons of peanuts, at a net profit of \$32.97.

### New Railroad Files Charter.

Austin, Tex.—The Midland & Northwestern Railway Company, capital stock \$65,000, filed its charter, which had been approved by the attorney general, with the state department Wednesday. It is proposed to build a road from Midland, Midland county, to Seminole, Gaines county, a distance of sixty-five miles.

### Would Coin Souvenir Dollars.

Washington.—A hundred thousand souvenir gold dollars commemorating erection of the \$399,000 memorial building soon to be dedicated at Niles, Ohio, in honor of William McKinley, would be coined under a bill favorably reported Wednesday by the house committee on coinage, weights and measures.

### \$20,000 Fire at Rogers.

Tempe, Tex.—Fire at Rogers Wednesday did damage estimated at \$20,000. Three brick buildings were destroyed.

### Coal Production Shows Increase.

Washington.—The production of bituminous and anthracite coal during 1915 is estimated by the United States geological survey at 518,000,000 short tons, an increase of 1 per cent compared with the production of 1914.

### Embargo on Dyewood Is Raised.

Washington.—Formal notice was given the state department by the British embassy Saturday that the embargo on dyewood exports from Jamaica.
