

Getty Well Pump and Screen
Estimated Delivery 4500 Gallons per Minute

The above shows the 11 5-8 inch Getty well on the M. H. Robbins farm, at Mowata, La., delivering water at a rate estimated to be fully 4500 gallons per minute; the estimate is based on a comparison of the stream of water with those of other Getty wells which have measured by weir 4000 gallons per minute or more. The picture shows a perfectly natural delivery of water from the 11 5-8 inch discharge pipe of a Getty pump. We never bush the discharge or resort to any other trick, in order to make a comparatively small delivery of water spurt out and show up large in a photograph.

The Robbins Well Has Been Watering 700 Acres of Rice and Doing it Easily

It is a fair sample of the Getty wells, which, with adequate power, can be depended on to easily water from 500 to 700 acres, or practically a square mile of land. All of these wells are finished with the "Solid Wrapped Screen" recognized for many years as the standard for oil field and irrigation wells, and without question the best strainer yet produced anywhere.

The strainer for water wells is now being made on heavy 12-inch line pipe, weighing 45 lbs. to the foot, the diameter of the screen surface being 13 1-4 inches. While others are putting out a strainer which is very thin and light, very cheap to manufacture, and are charging a big price for it, we are sparing no expense in building our Solid Wrapped construction, heavy, massive and strong so as to better resist the strains, to which the screen is subjected while in the ground.

The Guarantee of Water and Our Record.

While our contracts on 11 5-8 wells have heretofore only guaranteed 2000 gallons of water per minute we have, invariably, all over the proven territory in Southwest Louisiana, obtained from these wells 3000 to 4000 gallons per minute, and have never charged the farmer anything for the extra amount over the guarantee. In the light of our record for years back, the guarantee, so much talked about by some parties, becomes a burlesque.

The Question of Larger Pumping Plants.

When an 11 5-8 Getty well will pump economically from 3000 to 3500 gallons of water per minute, and on test will deliver from 4000 to 4500 gallons per minute, what should be expected from similar wells when made 14 inches, 16 inches or 18 inches in diameter?

Points to be Carefully Considered.

There is talk at times about larger wells; but does the individual farmer demand or need them?

If larger wells are put in, a larger power plant would be needed to pump them to full capacity.

Large free wells are always desirable, but the full benefit from them is not realized, unless they are equipped with suitable pumps and power.

Water cannot be taken out of a well, whether large or small, any faster than it comes in.

Water cannot come into a well any faster than it travels through the surrounding sand or gravel to the well.

On this account there is a limit to the size of a well which would be practical to put down. An increase in size over this limit, would result in very little advantage, but, a good deal of additional cost.

Just how large it would be practical to make wells, or just how much water per minute we can, with economy, draw out of the ground from one point, has never been fully determined.

The Getty well and pumping outfit has however secured by far the largest delivery of water, for the rice farmer, with the greatest degree of economy, ever known in this section.
