

Official Minutes of Parish School Board

Jennings, La., July 7, 1916.
The Board of Directors of the Public Schools of the Parish of Jefferson met in regular session with the following members present: Dr. V. Miller, Dr. C. E. Hunter, Henry Walton, W. M. Fenton, J. M. Booze, Z. W. Todd, Ozeman and John Hay.
The minutes of June 20, 1916 were read and approved.
PROMULGATION OF ELECTION of Louisiana.

By the direction of the School Board notice is hereby given that on Wednesday, the fifth day of July, an election was held in School District Number 23 in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, to determine the proposition to levy a five cent special tax on all property subject to State taxation in School District Number 23 in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana; and that the majority of the taxpayers voting at said election in favor of the proposition as eight in number and \$3740.00 in amount; and that before said proposition was carried.

This done and signed on this the fifth day of July, 1916, at Jennings, Louisiana, in the Parish of Jefferson Davis.

It was moved by Mr. Hebert and seconded by Mr. Fenton that two transfers be run in School District Number 29 to bring the children to the Rice school. Same carried.

It was moved by Dr. Hunter and seconded by Mr. Fenton that all schools shall not begin later than ten o'clock a. m. and shall remain open till four o'clock p. m. From ten o'clock a. m. till four o'clock p. m. shall constitute a school day in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Same carried.

It was moved by Mr. Hebert and seconded by Mr. Todd that the number of grades in the Woodlawn school for the term of 1916-17 shall be limited to seven. Same carried.

It was moved by Dr. Miller and seconded by Mr. Hebert that the schools of the Parish of Jefferson Davis begin the term of 1916-17 on the fourth day of September. Same carried.

It was moved by Mr. Fenton and seconded by Mr. Precht that no other typewriters be used in the school buildings, Jennings, Lake Arthur and Welsh but the Remington typewriter. Same carried.

An Ordinance, Ordinance No. 29.
Ordering a special election to be held in School District No. 22 in the Parish of Jefferson Davis for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors to the said School District the question of the levy of a special tax of three (3) mills for the purpose of providing additional aid to the public school of the said district No. 22.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, that a special election be and is hereby ordered to be held in School District Number 22 in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, on the 15th day of August, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the said school district entitled to vote thereat the question of the levy of a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar of all property in the said School District subject to state taxation, for a period of five (5) years, the proceeds of the said tax to be used in giving additional aid to the public school of the said School District Number 22.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the ballots to be used at the said election shall be prepared by the secretary of the Parish Board of School Directors, and shall be in the following form:

Proposition to levy a three (3) mill special tax on all property subject to State taxation in School District Number 22 in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, annually, for a period of five (5) years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public school of the said School District Number 22. NOTICE TO VOTERS:
To vote in favor of the proposition submitted upon this ballot, place a cross (x) mark in the square after the word "Yes;" to vote against it, place a similar mark after the word "No."

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the secretary of the Parish Board of School Directors be and is hereby ordered to cause to be prepared for use at the said election the tally sheets, lists of qualified electors, assessed valuation of property, blank statements for the compilation of the vote, in number and amount, and other election blanks that may be required for the purpose of holding the said election to cause the same to be placed in the ballot box for the use at the respective precincts and make provision for the transmission of the ballot box to the several precincts of the school district at which the election is to be held.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That the polling place or precinct for the said election shall be the school house at Elton and the following three commissioners and clerk of the election are appointed to hold the election commissioners R. E. Powell, T. S. Plunkett and Allen Delarue; clerk, Robert Buller.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Board of School Directors shall meet at 9:00 o'clock a. m. on the 16th day of August, 1916, for the purpose in open session, of examining and counting the ballot, canvassing the returns and declaring the results of the said election.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That the President of the Parish School Board be, and he is hereby instructed to give notice of the said election by proclamation to be duly published, according to law in the following form:

PROCLAMATION.
Pursuant to an ordinance passed by the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, at its regular meeting held on the 7th day of July, 1916, I, J. M. Booze, president of said Parish Board of School Directors, hereby give notice that in compliance with said ordinance, a special election will be held in School District Number 22, Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, on the 15th day of August, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers qualified under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election the following proposition to-wit:

To levy a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar on all the property in School District Number 22, Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually, for a period of five (5) years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public school in said District Number 22.

For the purpose of said special election the polling place will be the school house at Elton, Louisiana, and the following commissioners and clerk of the election have been appointed to serve at this election: Commissioners R. E. Powell, T. S. Plunkett and Allen Delarue; clerk, Robert Buller.

At said special election the polls will be open at seven o'clock a. m. and close at five o'clock p. m. and the election will be conducted in accordance with the laws of Louisiana applicable thereto.

Notice is also given that at 9:30 o'clock a. m. on the 16th day of August, 1916, the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, will meet at Jennings, Louisiana, and in open session proceed to open the ballot box, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns, and declare the results of said election.

No further business to transact the Board adjourned.

PROMULGATION OF ELECTION
Jennings, La., August 1, 1916.

By the direction of the School Board notice is hereby given that on the first day of August, 1916 an election was held in Districts Numbers 21 and 15 and Ward Seven in the Parish of Jefferson Davis. Propositions in District Number 21 were to incur debt and issue bonds and to vote a special tax of three mills for ten years, That the majority of the taxpayers voting at said election in favor of proposition in Ward Seven was 21 in number and \$21,160 in amount; and that therefore said proposition was carried.

That the majority of taxpayers voting at said election in favor of the propositions in District Number 21 were 00 for the maintenance tax and 00 for the bond issue, but the majority against said propositions was 29 in number and \$3537.00 in amount, the majority against the bond issue

was 54 in number and \$102,440.33; and that therefore said propositions were lost.
