ADDS TEN PER CENT TO THE FIGHTING POWER OF ARMY

General Pershing concurs in the opinion of Lieut. Col. E. S. Wheeler of the general headquarters staff A. E. F., that the Y. M. C. A. adds ten per cent to the fighting power of the forces it serves. Writing General Pershing recently, Colonel Wheeler said:

"There is no one factor contributing more to the morale of the American army in France than the Y. M. C. A. The value of the organization cannot be overestimated. When I come to the Y. M. C. A. huts and see our men night after night and one day after another in their spare moments enjoying the privileges created by a corps of self-sacrificing Red Triangle workers, I know that they are better men and better fighters for so doing. Give me 900 men who have a Y. M. C. A. rather than 1,000 who have none, and I will have better fighters every time."

General Pershing directed that Colonel Wheeler's letter be sent to the Y. M. C. A. officials, adding to the letter this comment:

"The conclusions and opinions of Lieut. Col. Wheeler are concurred in by these headquarters."

With almost 2,000,000 men in France the Y. M. C. A. is adding approximately 200,000 men to the fighting power of the American armies over there, according to the estimate of General Pershing and Lieut. Col. Wheeler—and they ought to know, better than any others.


