Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the home and interment made in the Catholic cemetery.

ORDINANCE NO. 124.

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the borrowing of Seven Thousand Dollars, from the Calcasieu National bank of Southwest Louisiana at Lake Charles, to be expended for the eradication of the cattle tick in Jefferson Davis parish; fixing terms of payment of said loan, and the rate of interest thereon; authorizing the President of the Police Jury of said Parish to execute notes representing said indebtedness; dedicating the excess revenues of said Parish for the years 1919 and 1920, above the statutory, necessary and usual charges for services rendered annually under time contracts, to the payment of said loan in principal and interest.

Whereas, the State of Louisiana, by Act No. 127 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1916 has made it compulsory upon the Police Juries of the several parishes of the State to proceed with the work of systematic eradication of the cattle tick, and—

Whereas, said work is deemed necessary and desirable in the Parish of Jefferson Davis; and

Whereas, the Police Jury by its budget heretofore adopted has declared that the excess revenues of said Parish for the year 1918, after the payment of all statutory charges, and all necessary and usual charges provided for by ordinance or resolution of said Police Jury and the payment of all charges for services rendered annually under time contracts, amounts to at least Seven Thousand Dollars, and

Whereas, it is necessary, in order to obtain the money with which to carry on systematically the work of cattle tick eradication in said Parish that at least Seven Thousand Dollars be borrowed to be expended in said work in accordance with Act No. 127 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1916, and

Whereas, the Calcasieu National Bank of Southwest Louisiana at Lake Charles has declared its willingness to lend said amount for said purpose on the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth:

Now therefore:

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, that he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow from the Calcasieu National bank of Southwest Louisiana at Lake Charles the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars to be expended in accordance with the provisions of Act No. 127 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1916 in the work of systematic eradication of the cattle tick in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, interest thereon to be paid annually at the rate of five per cent per annum and payment thereof to be made in the following manner:


Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and all accrued interest on said loan to be paid on or before the first day of January, 1920.

Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and all accrued interest on said loan to be paid on or before the first day of January, 1921.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That there is hereby set apart, appropriated and dedicated to the payment of said loan in principal and interest out of the excess revenues

of the Parish of Jefferson Davis over and above the statutory charges, all necessary and usual charges provided for by ordinance or resolution of said Police Jury, to the payment of all charges for services to be rendered annually under time contracts, the following sums, to-wit:

For the year 1919 the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars.

For the year 1920 the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That said loan shall bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, interest on the whole of said loan to be paid annually, and the President of this Police Jury is hereby authorized and directed to execute promissory notes in the name of this Police Jury in favor of said Bank representing the two annual payments of said loan as herein provided for, each of said notes to be dated as needed and each to be payable on or before the respective maturity, and to deliver said notes to said Bank by this Police Jury of the amount of said loan.

ORDINANCE NO. 125

AN ORDINANCE levying and imposing a tax of 3 1/2 mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation of all the property in the corporate limits of the incorporated cities, towns and villages in the Parish of Jefferson Davis subject to taxation, and a tax of 5 1/2 Mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation of all the property outside the corporate limits of the incorporated cities, towns and villages in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, subject to taxation, for the year 1918, for general purposes.

SECTION 1. Be it Ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, in regular and lawful session convened that a tax of three and one-half (3 1/2) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation, be and the same is hereby levied, assessed and imposed upon all the property within the corporate limits of all the cities, towns and villages in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, subject to taxation, to be applied to the general purposes and needs of the Parish and for the payment of all general and special accounts heretofore budgeted by this Police Jury for the year 1918.

SECTION 2. Be it further Ordained, etc., That a tax of Five and one-half (5 1/2) Mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation, be and the same is hereby levied, assessed and imposed upon all the property outside the corporate limits of the incorporated cities, towns and villages in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, subject to taxation, to be applied to the general purposes and needs of the Parish and especially for the payment of all accounts heretofore budgeted by this Police Jury for the year 1918.

SECTION 3. Be it further Ordained, etc., That the proper respective administrative officers of the Parish of Jefferson Davis be and they are hereby authorized and directed to spread the said levies as hereinabove set forth upon the assessment rolls for the year 1918, and to make the collection of the taxes herein imposed according to law.

SECTION 4. Be it further Ordained, etc., That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption and promulgation.

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ORDINANCE NO. 192.

AN ORDINANCE providing for the levying and collecting of taxes on all real and personal property within the corporation of the Town of Welsh.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Town of Welsh, La., that for the year 1918, as per budget of expenses hereunto attached, there be and is hereby levied ten (10) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation on all taxable property in the Town of Welsh, La.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that by an ordinance adopted by the Board of Trustees and the property taxpayers of the Town of Welsh, La., on the 5th day of August 1913 providing for a special electric light tax of five (5) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all taxable property in the Town of Welsh, La., for the purpose of retiring such bonds as may become due this year and the payment of interest on the same and also interest on the different bonds.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that by an ordinance adopted by the Board of Trustees and the propertyowners of the Town of Welsh, La., on the 5th day of August 1914 providing for a special tax of five (5) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the Town of Welsh, La., for the building of streets, bridges and public improvements, for the term of ten years from the above date, therefore a special tax of five (5) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the Town of Welsh, La., be and is hereby levied for the building and maintenance of streets, bridges and public improvements in the Town of Welsh, La.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that by an ordinance adopted by the Board of Trustees and the property owners of the Town of Welsh, La., on the 5th day of September, 1916, providing for a special tax of five (5) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the Town of Welsh, La., for a term of fifteen years from the above date, for the purpose of buying a new engine for and enlarging and extending the electric light plant owned by the Town of Welsh, La., title to which shall vest in the Town of Welsh, La., be and is hereby levied for the purpose of retiring such bonds as may become due this year and the payment of interest on the same and also interest on the deferred bonds.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., that all taxes herein levied shall become a lien and privilege on all taxable property, paramount to all other liens, state and parish taxes excepted, and shall become delinquent in the same manner as provided for the collection of state and parish taxes.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., that all taxes herein levied shall become delinquent on January 1st, 1919 and shall draw interest at the rate of ten per cent per annum until paid.
