THORNWELL DRAINAGE CONTRACT LET TO LAKE ARTHUR CO.

Company Also Purchased Bonds of the District.

The Lake Arthur Dredging Co., of Lake Arthur, has been awarded the contract for the excavation of 1-90,000 cubic yards of dirt for the Thornwell Drainage District. The district comprises some 12,000 acres of land in the vicinity of Thornwell. E. A. Lyon is president and E. E. Baker, secretary of the board of commissioners of the district.

The Lake Arthur Dredging Co. purchased the drainage bonds of the district, paying par and accrued interest for the \$24,000 of ad valorem bonds and 90 per cent and accrued interest for \$12,000 acreage tax bonds.

Their bid for excavation was 16 1-2 cents per cubic yard. The main drainage ditch will be ten miles long and will empty into Lacassine bayou. Another ditch will empty into Lake Arthur.

Work of excavation will begin, according to present plans, about July 1st, and it is anticipated the work will be completed within eight months.

OLD LAND MARK IS BEING REMOVED

The building on the Verret property north of the railroad is being dismantled this week and will be removed from the location the property on which it is situated having been sold by Mr. J. A. Verret recently to L. M. Ducote, agent for the Southern Pacific railway.

The tearing down of this building brings to the front some of its history that it will be pleasant for the old timers to recall. It is not an old building, having been erected about fifteen years ago, at that time being located about two blocks east of its present location, near the section house. It was built by the late Mr. Alex Verret for the accommodation of Sam Berkowitz, who operated a clothing and dry goods store therein. It is said that Sam developed a very prosperous business there, but he also developed a fondness for the "four aces", which ultimately resulted in his financial downfall.

Before the fire of 1910 the building was removed to its present location, being used as a blacksmith shop for some time. In this building Welsh's first garage was established by Jesse Buckingham. Although not so very long ago the arages of those days were not as pretentious as the ones of today. The building has since been used by Mr. E. F. Doan as a tin shop and lastly by Mr. Mohler as a paint shop. It is stated that Mr. Verret will use most of the material, which is in building purposes.

TRY THIS METHOD OF SAVING TOMATOES

An economical method of canning tomatoes is recommended by the canning specialists of the Extension Division, Louisiana State University, as follows:

Pack firm, whole fruits in a jar and fill in space with concentrated tomato sauce. Each quart jar will then provide whole tomatoes for salads or baking and a tomato puree for soups or sauces. The recipe is given here.

Select firm uniformly red, ripe tomatoes of medium size. Put into trays and lower into boiling water for one minute. Remove plunge into cold water, drain, and cut out the core with a slender-pointed knife without cutting into the seed cells. Peel promptly and pack into jars. To each pint add one level teaspoonful of a mixture of one third salt and two thirds sugar. Fill the jars with a thick tomato sauce made by cooking the small or broken tomatoes until tender. Remove the seeds and skin by straining the pulp—and concentrate it by boiling to about the consistency of ketchup. Adjust the rubber cap, place the jars on a false bottom in a vessel of water which will almost reach to their tops and keep at boiling temperature for twenty five minutes. Remove the jars from the water bath and tighten the covers immediately.

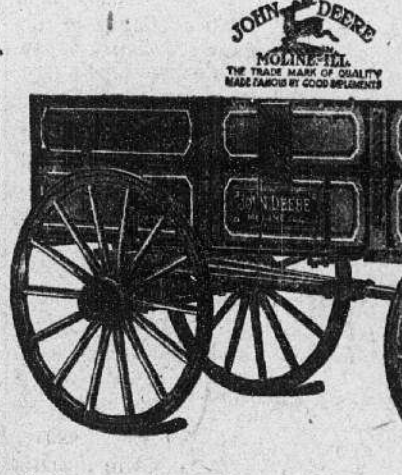
