AN ORDINANCE levying and imposing a tax of seven and one-quarter (7 1/4) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all the property within the limits of the Pelican Road District Number One of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying interest and principal on the Pelican Road District Bonds falling due September 1, 1919, March 1, 1920, and September 1, 1920.

Section 1. Be it Ordained, by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, in lawful session convened, that a tax of Seven and one-quarter (7 1/4) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation, be and the same is hereby levied, assessed and imposed upon all the property within the limits of the Pelican Road District Number One of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, subject to taxation for the year 1919, the proceeds of the said tax to be applied to the payment of principal and interest on the Pelican Road District Bonds falling due September 1, 1919, March 1, 1920 and September 1, 1920.

Section 2. Be it Further Ordained, etc., That the proper respective administrative officers of the Parish of Jefferson Davis be and they are hereby authorized and directed to spread the said tax levy as hereinabove set forth upon the assessment rolls for the year 1919, and to make the collection of the said tax imposed according to law.

Section 3. Be it Further Ordained, etc., that this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption and promulgation. Adopted June 16th, 1919.

ORDINANCE No. 142. AN ORDINANCE levying and imposing a tax of Five Mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation of all the property in the Parish of Jefferson Davis subject to taxation for the year 1919, for general purposes, and a tax of one and one-half Mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all the property in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, subject to taxation, for the year 1919, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of Jefferson Davis Parish.

Section 1. Be it Ordained, by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, in regular session convened, that a tax of Five Mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation be and the same is hereby levied, assessed and imposed upon all the property within the limits of Jefferson Davis Parish subject to taxation, to be applied to the general purposes and needs of the Parish and for the payment of all general and special accounts heretofore budgeted by this Police Jury for the year 1919, out of which general Five Mill levy a tax of one and one-half Mills on the dollar of the total assessed valuation is hereby set aside for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the Parish pursuant to demand of the Parish School Board and in accordance with law.

Section 2. Be it Further Ordained, etc., That a tax of one and one-half Mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation be and the same is hereby levied, assessed and imposed upon all the property within the limits of Jefferson Davis Parish, subject to taxation, to be applied to the support and maintenance of the Public Schools of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana; the said special tax of one and one-half Mills as provided in this section is levied pursuant to demand of the Parish School Board and in accordance with law.

Section 3. Be it Further Ordained, etc., that the proper respective administrative officers of the Parish of Jefferson Davis be and they are hereby authorized and directed to spread the said levies as hereinabove set forth upon the assessment rolls for the year 1919, and to make the collection of taxes herein imposed according to law.

Section 4. Be it Further Ordained, etc., That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption and promulgation. Adopted Sept. 4, 1919.

ORDINANCE No. 143. AN ORDINANCE creating Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, designating the boundaries thereof, and providing the time when this ordinance shall become effective.

Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, in regular session convened, that it does hereby create, upon its own initiative, in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance of the State of Louisiana, and especially Act No. 30 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, of the year 1917, Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, which Road District shall comprise all of the territory included in Ward No. 1, as now laid out and established, situated in the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, described by metes and bounds as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point in the center of Bayou Chene on the section line between sections twenty-two (22) and twenty-seven (27) township ten (10) South, Range four West; thence in a southeasterly direction along the section line between sections twenty-eight (28) and twenty-nine (29) township ten (10) South, Range four (4) West; thence South along said section line to the Northwest corner of section seven (7) in township eleven (11) South, Range four (4) West; thence South along said section line to the Northwest corner of section seven (7) in township eleven (11) South, Range four (4) West; thence South on the Range line to the boundary line between the Parishes of Jefferson Davis and Cameron; thence East along said boundary line to the center of the Mermentau river and Lake Arthur; thence in a northerly direction along the center of said Lake Arthur and Mermentau river to a point opposite the section line running east and west between sections twenty-four (24) and twenty-five (25) in township ten (10) South, Range three (3) West; thence West along said section line between said sections twenty-four (24) and twenty-five (25) to the center of said Bayou Chene and place of beginning.

ORDINANCE No. 144. Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, in lawful session convened, that having been petitioned by not less than twenty-five per cent of the property owners resident in the proposed road district, and in accordance with the laws and constitution of the State of Louisiana, a Road District within said Parish be, and the same is hereby created and which shall be known as Elton Road District Number One of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana.

Section 2. Be it Further Ordained, etc., That said Road District shall comprise the following territory: The entire ward four of Jefferson Davis Parish now existing, including the Town of Elton, Louisiana, less and except the following described portion of said Ward 4, to-wit:

Sections twenty-five (25) and thirty-six (36) and the south one-quarter (S 1/4) of section twenty-four (24) in township seven (7) South, Range four (4) West, also sections twenty-nine (29) thirty (30), thirty-one (31) thirty-two (32) and the west half of section twenty-eight (28) and thirty-three (33) and the south quarter (S 1/4) of sections nineteen (19) and twenty (20), in township seven (7) South, range three (3) West.

ORDINANCE No. 145. AN ORDINANCE creating a Road District under the name of The Roanoke Road District Number One (1) of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, and designating and recommending the appointment of a Board of Supervisors for the same.

Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, in regular session convened, that whereas a petition signed by more than twenty-five per cent (25) of the resident property owners in the territory hereinafter described has been presented this body asking for the creation of a Road District in said territory under Act Number 30 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1917:

Be it Further Ordained, That a Road District under the name of The Roanoke Road District Number One (1) of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, be and the same is hereby created for the purpose of constructing public highways in said Road District, and in constructing the same, to do all acts necessary therein such as the bridging of streams and ditching of the said roads whether the said ditches are to be constructed along the said road or through adjacent property; and generally to perform any and all duties that may be necessary to carry out the objects and purposes for which said Road District is created, and the said Road District is hereby invested with all the powers, rights and privileges conferred by Act Number 30 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1917, and all other laws on the same subject.

Section 2. Be it Further Ordained, etc., that the land to be embraced and included within the limits of the said Road District are hereby described to be as follows, to-wit: The south half of the south half of section 24, township 7, south range 4 west, all of section 25, all of section thirty-six (36) township seven (7) South, range four (4) West, Louisiana Meridian.

The south half of the south half of section nineteen (19), the south half of the south half of section twenty (20), all of section thirty (30), section twenty-nine (29), the east half of section twenty-eight (28) and the west half of section thirty-one (31), section thirty-two (32), and the west half of section thirty-three (33), all in township seven (7) South, range three (3) West, Louisiana Meridian.

The west half of section four (4), all of section five (5), section six (6), section seven (7), section eight (8), the west half of section nine (9) and the west half of section sixteen (16), all of section seventeen, section eighteen (18), section nineteen (19), section twenty (20), the west half of section twenty-one (21), section thirty (30), section thirty-one (31), all in township eight (8) South, range three (3) West, Louisiana Meridian.

All sections six (6), seven (7), eighteen (18), nineteen (19), and thirty (30), township nine (9) South, range three (3) West, Louisiana Meridian.

All of section one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4), five (5), eight (8), nine (9), ten (10), eleven (11), twelve (12), thirteen (13), fourteen (14), fifteen (15), sixteen (16), seventeen (17), eighteen (18), nineteen (19), twenty (20), twenty-one (21), twenty-two (22), twenty-three (23), twenty-four (24), twenty-five (25), twenty-six (26), twenty-seven (27), twenty-eight (28), twenty-nine (29), thirty (30), thirty-one (31), thirty-two (32), thirty-three (33), thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35), thirty-six (36), all in township eight (8) South, range four (4) West, Louisiana Meridian.

All sections one (1), two (2), three (3), the east half of section four (4), the east half of section nine (9), all of section ten (10), eleven (11), twelve (12), thirteen (13), fourteen (14), fifteen (15), the east half of section sixteen (16), the east half of section twenty-one (21), section twenty-two (22), twenty-three (23), section twenty-four (24), section twenty-five (25), section twenty-six (26), section twenty-seven (27), and the east half of section twenty-eight (28), all in township nine (9) South, range four (4) West, Louisiana Meridian.

hereby appointed as the Board of Supervisors of the said Road District as provided in the said Section four (4) of the said Act Number thirty (30) of the General Assembly of Louisiana for the year 1917, and they are hereby vested with all the powers, rights and privileges conferred by the said Act of the General Assembly, and shall serve until their successors shall have been appointed.

Section 4. Be it Further Ordained, etc., That all the provisions of the said Act Number thirty (30) of the General Assembly of 1917 relating to the creation, organization and conduct of Road Districts be and the same are hereby enacted for the government of the said Road District.

Section 5. Be it further Ordained, etc., That this Ordinance be and the same shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and promulgation. Yeas, 8; Nays, 0; Absent, 1. Adopted Sept. 11, 1919.

ORDINANCE No. 140. AN ORDINANCE amending Section four of Ordinance No. 137 adopted by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, on the 15th day of May, 1919, fixing the time and place for meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Bell City Drainage District No. One.

WHEREAS, on the 15th day of May, A. D. 1919, the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis adopted Ordinance No. 137 creating Bell City Drainage District No. One; and

Whereas, in said ordinance the Board of Commissioners of said District therein named were called to meet in the village of Bell City, in the Parish of Calcasieu, at ten o'clock a. m., on the 17th day of June, 1919; and

Whereas, circumstances have made it impossible for the said Board of Commissioners to meet at said time and place;

Section 1. Be it now therefore Ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis in regular session convened, that Section Four of Ordinance No. 137 adopted by the Police Jury of the parish of Jefferson Davis whereby Bell City Drainage District No. One was created, be amended and readopted so as to read as follows:

"Section Four. Be it further Ordained, etc., that the Board of Commissioners of said District shall meet at such place as may be designated by them in the Village of Bell City, in the Parish of Calcasieu, at ten o'clock a. m., on Tuesday, August 12th, 1919, and shall then and there proceed to organize as provided by law."

Section Two. Be it further ordained, etc., That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section Three. Be it further ordained, etc., That Ordinance No. 137 adopted by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis on the 15th day of May A. D. 1919, adopted and re-affirmed except as herein provided and amended.

ORDINANCE No. 146. AN ORDINANCE calling a special election within the Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, under the terms and provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Louisiana, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified tax payers of said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1, a proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds of the Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, to the amount of One Hundred Seventy Thousand (\$170,000.00) Dollars, to run for a period of Twenty-Five years, bearing interest at the rate of Five (5) per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing permanent public roads and bridges in the said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, title to which shall vest in the public; providing for the expense of the holding of said election, naming officers of said election; providing for ballots and all necessary things for said election and fixing the time and place at which the results of said election will be canvassed.

Section 1. Be it Resolved, by the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, that a special election be held in the Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, and for the same is hereby fixed and called for November 18th A. D. 1919, for the purpose of submitting to a vote of the qualified tax payers of the said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, the following proposition: A proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds of the said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, to the amount of One Hundred Seventy Thousand (\$170,000.00) Dollars, to run for a period of Twenty-Five years, bearing interest at the rate of Five (5) per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing permanent roads and bridges in the said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, title to which shall vest in the public.

Section 2. Be it Further Resolved, etc., that on the 20th day of November, A. D. 1919, at the hour of Ten o'clock a. m., the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, shall meet in open session in its office at the court house of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Jennings, Louisiana, and then and there shall in open session proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and canvass the returns and declare the results of said election hereinabove called.

Section 3. Be it Further Resolved, etc., That the President of the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, is hereby ordered

and instructed to issue his proclamation calling said election, and giving notice that the same is to be held on the date hereinabove named, for the purpose of submitting to the vote of the qualified tax payers of said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, the proposition herein ordered submitted to them, and that the proclamation and notice shall state at the hour of Ten o'clock a. m., on November 20th, A. D. 1919, the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, shall meet in open session, in its office in the Court House of Jefferson Davis Parish, in Jennings, Louisiana, and will then and there, proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of the said election, and said proclamation and notice of election shall give notice that the polling places in said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, for said election, are fixed as follows:

Precinct 1, Lake Arthur. Precinct 2, Thornwell.

Section 4. Be it Further Resolved, etc., that in order to hold the said election, the following officers are appointed, each of whom is a qualified voter and a man of good repute, to-wit: Placide Landry, G. E. Bailey and Eugene Gaithe are appointed commissioners, and W. M. Buchanan clerk for the polling place fixed at Lake Arthur; S. W. Mack, J. E. Peterson and Leon Pitaro are appointed commissioners and Leroy Elliott clerk for the polling place fixed at Thornwell.

Section 5. Be it Further Resolved, etc., That the President of the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to procure for use in said election hereinabove called the necessary registration list, including list of those who have paid poll taxes, together with a list of property tax payers qualified to vote in said election, and provide the necessary polling booths, pencils, pads, etc., and other things and materials necessary for said election and the President of the Police Jury shall also provide and have printed ballots in such form as to comply with the form outlined in the succeeding section, and in order to pay for the cost of holding said election, including the pay of commissioners, clerks and deputies, the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary be and the same is hereby appropriated out of the contingent fund of this Police Jury.

Section 6. Be it Further Resolved, etc., That the ballots to be used in said election shall be printed as follows, to-wit: "Special election held in the Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, on the 18th day of November, A. D. 1919, for the incurring of debt and the issuance of negotiable bonds, the proceeds of the sale of which are to be used to construct permanent public roads and bridges within the said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana.

A proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds of the Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, to the amount of One Hundred Seventy Thousand (\$170,000.00) Dollars, to run for a period of Twenty Five years, bearing interest at the rate of Five (5) per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing permanent public roads and bridges in the said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, title to which shall vest in the public. Taxable valuation \$.....

Signature of Voter. Attorney in fact. Notice to Voters. To vote in favor of the proposition submitted upon this ballot place a cross (X) mark in the square after the word "YES"; to vote against it place a similar mark after the word "NO."

Section 7. Be it Further Resolved, etc., That the polls for the said election shall open at Seven o'clock a. m., and remain open until Five o'clock p. m., at which last named time the polls shall be closed.

Section 8. Be it Further Resolved, etc., That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage. Passed and adopted October 2nd, 1919.

ARMISTICE DAY PROCLAMATION

November 11 Is Declared to be a Holiday in Texas by Governor Hobby.

Austin, Tex.—Governor Hobby Saturday issued the following proclamation: "It needs no reminder from the executive office to turn the hearts and minds of the people of this state to Tuesday, November 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the day upon which became effective the armistice agreed upon by the contenders in the great world war.

"About the hearthstone in this state gathered those whose daily prayers were for the success of the arms of all nations with which America was associated, and for safe return of our citizen soldiers who had journeyed overseas to break the power, destroy the will and humble the pride of that military machine that sought to put every nation in subjection. For more than three years we had witnessed an unequal contest. Combined armies of allied nations were giving way to the advance of the invader, and the fortunes of war did not turn until the power of American manhood, supported by the spirit of American womanhood, had joined the conflict. From the hour of the first American drive, the tide of battle turned and one victory followed another in such succession that the enemy welcomed the opportunity to sign the agreement that would be followed by the order to 'cease firing.'

"The imperial state of Texas gave of her men and women, her wealth and her products; consecrated her soil to government purpose and shared with every other state in the sacrifices that were necessary to maintain those who had joined the greatest overseas expedition that ever set afloat. Imperial Texas had her part in the great world war, and her sons now sleep on Flanders field martyrs to the noblest crusade upon which a people ever moved. We glorify our sacred dead and every thought is a memorial to those who made the supreme sacrifice. We honor those who have returned to us and we make places for them in social, industrial and public life, counting it a privilege to serve them.

"It is fitting, that we take notice of the anniversary to which I have called attention; it is fitting that we who have passed through the agonizing hours of the conflict, should make this first anniversary such an event that it will inspire in those who are to follow us and who will learn the story as it is handed to them, to forever give it proper observance, that the memory of the victory for world peace will be imperishable. It is our privilege to celebrate the consummation of that which we in person devoutly wished. It will be posterity's duty to perpetuate an historic event. Let therefore, every heart beat in unison with this patriotic and joyful purpose, and every soul enter into the statewide spirit in full accord.

Now, therefore, I, William P. Hobby, governor of the state of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in me, do proclaim Tuesday, November 11, 1919, a holiday. The mayor of each municipal corporation is requested to issue his proclamation in accordance herewith. I request all patriotic societies, all religious denominations, the commercial organizations, and associations of men and women who are banded together for the weal of the commonwealth, to unite for local demonstration and exercises befitting this greatest historical day that has come to the people of the world; and to give thanks to the Omnipotent Ruler of the universe for the answer he gave to the prayers of our people and pay a tribute to the men of America who bore themselves with such bravery and courage and success under the flags of the allied forces."

Bonds Are Approved. Austin, Tex.—The attorney general Friday approved the following bond issues: Collin County Road District No. 26, \$259,000, both issues serials, 5 1/2%, and \$100,000 Kaufman County Levee Improvement District No. 7, serials, 6%.

Nearly Ten Billions Advanced. Washington.—A credit of \$1,000,000 to Italy was announced this week by the treasury department, making \$1,620,922,872 advanced to that country and a total of \$9,647,419,494 to all the allies.

American Transport Leaves. Vladivostok.—The American army transport Great Northern sailed from here Oct. 7 with 100 officers and 1400 enlisted men, returning to the United States.

Rear Admiral Clover Dies. Cheyenne, Wyo.—Rear Admiral Richardson Clover, U. S. N., retired, died on a train west of Cheyenne Thursday. He was on his way to his home in Washington, D. C., from California.

Fifteen Negroes, Arrested. Frankston, Tex.—Fifteen negroes were arrested Tuesday. They were all found heavily armed.
