AROUND THE WORLD WITH THE AMERICAN RED CROSS.
In Serbia.

As far back as the first winter of the war, the Red Cross sent to Serbia a sanitary commission that effectively checked the scourge of typhus, but after the United States entered the conflict, the Red Cross was able, in August, 1917, to send a full commission that carried on extensive relief operations among the suffering refugees of the tortured nation. Hospitals were established, the refugees fed, clothed and given medical attention, the army supplied with much needed dental treatment, farm machinery, and seeds provided to help the Serbs redeem their land to productivity, and, not least, measures undertaken for the succor of the children. The terrible condition into which these helpless victims of the war had fallen is well portrayed by this photograph of a little Serbian girl wearing the rags and expression of hopeless dismay that were all she possessed when the Red Cross came.

RED CROSS GIVES FULL ACCOUNTING

War Council Tells How Millions Contributed by Public Were Used For Relief.

BIG TASK IS DESCRIBED

In Twenty Months \$154,000,000 Was Spent Overseas and \$119,000,000, in the United States.

Washington. (Special).—Through a complete report of the work of the American Red Cross in the war by Chairman Henry P. Davison, on behalf of the war council, the organization on the eve of its annual enrollment of members during the Third Red Cross Roll Call, November 2 to 11, has rendered an accounting of the many millions given it by the American people to help our fighting men and our allies. The statement is, in part, as follows:

"The war council of the American Red Cross is now prepared to make a complete accounting to the American people of money contributed and expended, as well as the work done by the American Red Cross during the period in which the war council was in control of its affairs. The war council was appointed May 19, 1919, and went out of existence February 28, 1919.

"It was the practice of the war council to give complete publicity to its policies and finances, but it is only now that a picture of the war period as a whole can be presented. It is the feeling of the war council that a report in this summarized form should be made directly to the public which provided the money and gave the effort which made the American Red Cross a success.

"A statement of the American Red Cross effort and finances since the war council relinquished its control will be made to the public through the executive committee, and it is important, therefore, that the fact that this report covers the period only until March 1, should be carefully noted."

Following are certain round figures covering American Red Cross participation in the war, as revealed by the war council's report:

Of the \$400,000,000 in money and supplies, contributed to the American Red Cross during the twenty months the war council was in existence, \$283,000,000 was allotted to national headquarters, while \$117,000,000 went to the chapters to finance their activities. Expenditures in the twenty months totalled \$278,000,000, divided as follows: By national headquarters in France, \$57,000,000; elsewhere overseas, \$64,000,000; in the United States, \$48,000,000; by chapters in the United States, \$48,000,000; cost of chapter-produced articles distributed in France, \$25,000,000, elsewhere overseas, \$8,000,000; in the United States, \$28,000,000, making total expenditures in France, \$82,000,000, elsewhere overseas, \$72,000,000; in the United States, \$119,000,000.

The National Tuberculosis Association has launched an extensive educational campaign. A recent health survey revealed a yearly death rate in the United States of 150,000 and there are today 1,000,000 active cases.

This is the emblem of the National Tuberculosis Association which annually sponsors the sale of the Red Cross Christmas Seals.

"RED CROSS" TASK UNFINISHED.

The Armistice did not put a stop to Red Cross activities in the camps and hospitals of the Gulf Division, comprising Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi. During the past six months, the seven Field Stations in the Division have performed many services: 4,151 men were helped to straighten out difficult home problems; 7,000 were given information and personal advice; 69,844 men attended 371 different entertainments. The Red Cross workers made 11,828 personal visits to hospital patients; and in addition, \$9,000 worth of comfort kits, cigarettes, etc., were distributed, and 383 men were helped financially, \$5,000 having been used for that purpose.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

BE IT KNOWN that by virtue of the authority conferred upon me by law and especially by an ordinance of the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, passed and adopted on the 2nd day of October, A. D., 1919, I, J. S. TREME, President of the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, do hereby issue this, my proclamation, giving notice of the calling of a special election within the limits of Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, on the 18th day of November, A. D., 1919, between legal hours, to-wit: Seven o'clock a. m. and Five o'clock p. m., for the purpose of submitting to the qualified tax payers of said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, the following proposition, to-wit: (1) A proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds of the said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, to the amount of One Hundred Seventy Thousand (\$170,000.00) Dollars, to run for a period of Twenty Five years, bearing interest at the rate of Five (5) per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing permanent public roads and bridges in the said Lake Arthur Road District No. 1 of Jefferson Davis Parish, Louisiana, title to which shall vest in the public.

Further notice is hereby given that the voting or polling places for said election are as follows, to-wit:

Ward 1, Precinct 1, Lake Arthur.

Ward 1, Precinct 2, Thornwell.

Further notice is hereby given that at the hour of ten o'clock a. m., on the 20th day of November, 1919, the Police Jury of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, State of Louisiana, will meet in open session in their office in the Court House of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, City of Jennings, Louisiana, and will then and there open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, and canvass the returns, and declare the result of said election.
