MEETING OF CITY BOARD OF HEALTH

City Hall, Welsh, La., Apr. 5, 1920. The regular meeting of the Board of Health of the Town of Welsh, La., was held this date. The meeting was called to order by the president, Dr. C. A. Martin. Members present, E. E. Kimball, secretary, F. E. Hurlbut, Dr. B. J. LaCour. Absent, A. Robin. The work of the Board was taken up. On account of not being able to give the time to the work of the Board Mr. A. Robin tendered his resignation as a member of the City Board of Health, which was accepted by this Board. It was moved and seconded that Mr. J. L. Barnett be appointed to fill the place made vacant by the resignation of Mr. A. Robin. Carried. It was moved and seconded that Mr. J. L. Barnett be appointed assistant Health Officer at a salary of \$10.00 per month. Carried. Moved and seconded that the Toilet Ordinance and regulations as mentioned in our minutes of March 1st, be enforced at once. We can not delay this matter longer, warm weather is coming and we will have a hard fight at once to combat with the hundred different diseases that arise from unsanitary privies. You have long ago been warned of this, so do not feel surprised on going home some evening to see a card posted on your toilet with the inscription: "CONDEMNED FOR LACK OF ATTENTION." We are held responsible by the State Board for attention to this, and we have tried in every way possible to make it plain to you that it is very necessary for the health of your city. You will have a card posted in your toilet with your name and number on it, together with the regulations that MUST BE followed. These names and numbers are recorded on the books of this Board. Carried. Special notice is hereby given that it is strictly forbidden that any cess-pool or septic tank be allowed to drain into or streck or where it will be offensive to any resident of the city under any condition (see regulation governing this in the State Sanitary Code) and anyone having a cess-pool or septic tank that drains in violation to the State Code regulations, same is hereby condemned by this board and will not be allowed to be used until same is arranged to meet the regulations. Mr. Ernst, of the State Board of Health, was with us this month checking our work again. We like Mr. Ernst very much, but he has a very bad habit of dropping in on a fellow unexpectedly. He has that privilege, however, and we must at all times be cleaned up and ready for him so that there will be no one that will feel that they should have been notified beforehand. Let us all pull together and feel proud that our little city has gotten to the point and importance where it is necessary to put it on the basis with larger towns. C. A. MARTIN, President. E. E.
