

CHIHUAHUA CITY IS IN HANDS OF REBELS

Calles Announces Capture of One of Largest Cities in North Mexico.

Agua Prieta, Sonora.—Chihuahua City, capital of the state of the same name, is definitely in the hands of the revolutionists.

General Ignacio Enrique, candidate for governor of Chihuahua, according to General Calles, was at Santa Ysabel with 4500 state militia...

Telegraphic communication was established between Chihuahua City, Santa Ysabel, Hermosillo, capital of Sonora, and military headquarters Saturday.

The revolutionists control virtually all Northern Chihuahua. It was said, with the exception of Juarez, opposite El Paso, Tex., and Casas Grandes, near the Sonora boundary.

At Casas Grandes Carranza troops have been concentrating for three weeks for an attempt to invade Sonora and wrest the state from the revolutionary leaders.

The revolutionists claim they have between 5000 and 6000 troops under their command in Chihuahua.

General Calles issued a statement which said in part: "The revolution is sweeping forward beyond all expectations.

Galveston Picked for 1921 Labor Convention

Cleburne, Tex.—Galveston was selected as the place for the 1921 convention of the Texas Federation of Labor Friday.

The convention adopted resolutions favoring the following: An amendment to the state constitution under which the state would underwrite compensation insurance for workmen.

Resolutions opposing the following were also adopted: The open shop movement, senators and congressmen "who," the resolution said, "represented Wall Street."

French Aviator Lost. Paris.—The French aviator, R. Renaud, one of the competitors in the trans-Mediterranean flight from Monaco to Bizerta, Tunis and back is missing since he left Cagliari.

P. O. Inspector Resigns. Austin, Tex.—C. B. Anderson has resigned as postoffice inspector in charge for Texas and Oklahoma.

Telephone Company Pays State Tax. Austin, Tex.—The Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company Wednesday paid the state tax of \$37,523 on gross receipts of \$2,501,652 for the quarter ending March 31, 1920.

Indians Must Have Burro Meat. Agua Prieta, Sonora.—Mayo Indians being sent to Agua Prieta to reinforce other Sonora revolutionists do not eat meat from cattle.

Increased Pullman Rates. Washington.—Increased Pullman rates amounting to 20 per cent went into effect Saturday.



ORDINANCE NO. FOUR (4) WELSH DRAINAGE DISTRICT

AN ORDINANCE of Welsh Drainage District No. 1, imposing an acreage tax of twenty-five (25) cents per acre upon all of the acreage property within said District subject to State taxation for the purpose of paying the interest maturing semi-annually on the bonded indebtedness in the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00) and the principal falling due and providing for a sinking fund to retire a portion of the bonds authorized by ordinance No. One (1), adopted by the Board of Commissioners of Welsh Drainage District No. 1, on February 20th, 1920, calling a special election held on March 30th, 1920, at which a bonded indebtedness of Seventy Thousand (\$70,000.00) Dollars was authorized, secured by an acreage tax to be imposed annually by the governing authorities of said Drainage District, as provided by Article 251 of the Constitution of 1913, the result of said special election having been promulgated on March 31st, 1920, by ordinance No. three (3) of Welsh Drainage District No. 1.

Whereas, the voters participating in the said special election called in Welsh Drainage District No. 1, by ordinance Number One (1) adopted by the Commissioners of said Drainage District on February 20th, 1920, did, at the election held in pursuance to this ordinance on the 30th day of March, 1920, authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness by Welsh Drainage District No. 1, in the sum of Seventy Thousand (\$70,000.00) Dollars to be secured by an acreage tax of twenty-five (25) cents per acre, to be imposed for each year by the governing authorities of said Drainage District, for the years 1920 to 1939, both inclusive, the result of said election having been promulgated by ordinance Number Three (3), adopted March 31st, 1920.

In pursuance of said authority vested in the Commissioners of Welsh Drainage District No. 1, by the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, and by the election duly held and promulgated as aforesaid, we do hereby impose for the years of 1920 to 1939, both inclusive, an acreage tax of twenty-five (25) cents per acre per annum, upon each acre of land within said Drainage District subject to taxation for State purposes, in excess of all other taxes, the proceeds of said tax to be used for the purpose of meeting the current expenses of said District and paying the interest falling due semi-annually upon said bonded indebtedness of Seventy Thousand (\$70,000.00) Dollars, retiring the portion thereof maturing within each current year, and providing for a sinking fund for the purpose of retiring said bonds at their maturity; and the assessor of the Parish of Jefferson Davis is hereby authorized and instructed to extend upon the assessment rolls of Jefferson Davis Parish for the years 1920 to 1939, both inclusive, the acreage tax of twenty-five (25) cents per acre upon all the acreage property of the Welsh Drainage District No. 1, subject to State taxation.

Commissioner S. O. Scoggins moved that the above and foregoing ordinance be adopted. The motion for adoption was seconded by Commissioner A. R. McBurney. The President called a vote upon the motion to adopt said ordinance which resulted as follows: Yeas, 3; Nays, 0.

ORDINANCE NO. FIVE (5) WELSH DRAINAGE DISTRICT


AN ORDINANCE of Welsh Drainage District No. One imposing an ad valorem tax of three and one-half (3 1-2) mills on the dollar upon all of the property of said Drainage District subject to State taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest maturing semi-annually on the bonded indebtedness in the sum of Sixty Thousand (\$60,000.00) Dollars, and providing a sinking fund to retire a portion of the bonds authorized by ordinance number two (2), adopted by the Board of Commissioners of Welsh Drainage District No. 1, on February 20th, 1920, and calling a special election to be held on on March 30th, 1920, at which a bonded indebtedness of Sixty Thousand and (60,000.00) Dollars was authorized, secured by an ad valorem tax to be imposed annually by the governing authorities of said Drainage District as provided by Article 251 of the Constitution of 1913, the result of said election having been promulgated on March 31st, 1920, by ordinance Number three (3).

Whereas, the voters participating in the special election called in Welsh Drainage District No. 1, by ordinance Number two (2), adopted by the Commissioners of said Drainage District on February 20th, 1920, did, at the election held in pursuance to said ordinance, on the 30th day of March, 1920, authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness of Welsh Drainage District No. 1, in the sum of Sixty thousand (60,000.00) Dollars, to be secured by an ad valorem tax to be imposed from year to year by the governing authorities of said District, the result of said election having been promulgated by ordinance No. three (3), adopted March 31st, 1920.

In pursuance of the authority vested in the Commissioners of Welsh Drainage District No. 1, by the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, and by the election duly held and promulgated as aforesaid, we do hereby impose for the current year of 1920, an ad valorem tax of three and one-half (3 1-2) mills on the dollar of assessed valuation of property within said Drainage District, in excess of all other taxes, the proceeds of the said tax to be used for the purpose of meeting the current expenses of said district, and paying the interest falling due semi-annually on said bonded indebtedness of Sixty Thousand (\$60,000.00) Dollars, and providing a sinking fund for the purpose of retiring said bonds at their maturity, and the assessor of the Parish of Jefferson Davis is hereby authorized and instructed to extend upon the assessment rolls of said Parish for the year 1920 an ad valorem tax of three (3) and one-half (1-2) mills on the dollar of assessed valuation of all property within said Welsh Drainage District No. 1, subject to State taxation.

Commissioner S. O. Scoggins moved that the above and foregoing ordinance be adopted. The motion was seconded by Commissioner A. R. McBurney. The President called a vote upon the motion to adopt the said ordinance, which resulted as follows: Yeas, 3; Nays, 0.

"Ah! Then he is acquainted with your shortcomings?" "He thinks he is. He's my husband."


A Sin of Omission. "When I enlisted," explained the doughboy with an injured air, "I read the posters that said, 'Join the army and see the world.'"
