

Wednesday were Mr. and Mrs. Y. D. Prohibits Gambling Within Five Miles of The Welsh High School.

> An act of the recent General Asembly phohibiting gambling within five miles of the Welsh High School went into effect Wednesday, July 1st. The law referred to is Act NNo. 258 of the Acts of the General Assembly introduced by Mr. Heinen of Jennings. The Act prohibits gambling with cards, dice and all manner of banking games or gambling in any manner whatever for money or the representative thereof, within five miles of the Welsh High School located at Welsh, in Ward 6, School District No. 10, Jefferson Davis Parish State of Louisiana, making it a misdemeanor to violate same and imposing a fine in the sum of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00 or imprisonment not less than ten days
