THINKS COLORADO IS VERY CHARMING PLACE

Mrs. Mary McKay Addresses Welsh Friends on Subject of Western Trip.

To the Dear Friends and Relatives in Welsh:

It has been nearly three months since we left our little home in Welsh and started out in quest of health. Our wise Dr. Martin advised us to come to Colorado Springs and I thank him very much, for the trip has certainly been very beneficial to both Martha and myself.

Martha has gained 15 pounds and the roses are coming into her cheeks. She looks and acts like a different girl and is delighted with the grandeur and beauty of this country. She started to high school here the 7th of Sept., and likes it very much. At home she would have been in the 9th grade, but that grade corresponds here with the 10th B. the first half term and 10th A. the last half.

We spent the first five weeks visiting my father, step mother, brothers and sisters, near Lee's Summit. Mo. the home of my childhood, then we continued our journey to Rocky Ford a famous and beautiful town and country. There were fields and fields of melons, sugar beets, wheat, corn and in fact most everything but rice. We only stayed here a short time visiting with my old school teacher Mrs. Maggie Purdie, and family.

The most beautiful of all was Colorado Springs, and the wonderful mountains. There were two snows on Pike's Peak in August, which looked beautiful. People are visiting the summit of Pike's Peak every day both by train and by auto.

As you saw by the papers, on the 6th of August, there was an auto race up the peak, but there was an awful snow storm on the peak that day and the people who were there to see the race nearly froze. The weather was pleasant, however, in Colorado Springs which is in the valley below.

There are several peaks here close: Pike's Peak has an altitude of 14,147 feet above the sea level, and Colorado Springs is 5,915 feet; Manitou is 6,128 feet. We had the pleasure of walking up Mt. Manitou one day. There is only a Burro path up this mountain, but it is well worth the trip. Such massive rocks we saw—but missed the birds—only saw one lone bird. It took us about four and one-half hours to walk up and only about two hours to walk down.

There were about 65,000 visitors here this season. The summers are delightful. There are several nice shady parks to sit in. Everybody misses the best part of life if they never visit this beautiful country. Those who have visited here can tell of the "Garden of the Gods," "The Seven Falls," above which Helent Hunt, a writer, died and was buried, but after ward was removed, the "Cave of the Winds," is also a wonderful place. It has 16 distinct rooms and extends back 3-4 of a mile in the ground. So come out west next summer.


