DOUGHNUTS!
 There is nothing wholesome and healthful than doughnuts and crullers rightly prepared.

Doughnuts
 1/2 spoon shortening
 1/2 spoon sugar
 1/2 milk
 1/2 spoon putmeg
 1/2 spoon salt
 1/2 flour
 1/2 spoon Royal Baking Powder

Shortening: add and well-beaten in milk; add nutmeg, salt and baking powder which have sifted together and additional flour to dough stiff enough. Roll out on floured surface to about 1/2-inch fat hot enough to fry in a piece of bread in ends. Drain on newspaper and sprinkle powdered sugar.

Crullers
 1/2 spoon shortening
 1/2 spoon sugar
 1/2 flour
 1/2 spoon cinnamon
 1/2 spoon salt
 1/2 spoon Royal Baking Powder
 1/2 milk

Shortening: add gradually and beat; sift together cinnamon, salt and powder; add one egg and mix well; add remainder of ingredients to make dough. Roll out on board to about 1/4-inch thick and cut into about 4 inches long 1/2-inch wide; roll in and twist each and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot oil. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.
