BANKERS URGE FARMERS TO BACK ASSOCIATION

See Light of Prosperity Ahead—Recommend Holding of Rice For Fair Values.

At a meeting of Group C. Louisiana bankers in Lake Charles last Wednesday the rice situation was discussed at length. Following a review of the situation in detail Frank Roberts urged upon the farmers the desirability of maintaining the Southern Rice Growers' Association.

Mr. Roberts further expressed himself before the bankers as favoring the holding of the remainder of the crop for fair values, at least as much as would be required to replace it with new crop rice. In speaking of the milling contract, he said: "Sixty five to 85 per cent of the millers signed up with us last fall in good faith but others just for what they could get out of it and they attempted to pass as much rice through their mills as possible in order to collect milling charges. Some are honest in other ways. I have seen reports from New Orleans in the last ten days which shows that a 200-pound bag of Blue Rose rice is now milling out from 55 to 60 pounds of head rice, while in the past it milled 87 lbs. That is done purposely as there is at present a greater demand for screenings, and the millers are making screenings."

WELSH HEADQUARTERS FOR COMMUNITY EGG CIRCLE

First Shipment to be Made April 2nd. Plan successful in other Communities.

According to advice received from Esther O. Stafford, parish home demonstration agent, Welsh is to be made the shipping point for the first community egg circle to be formed in Jefferson Davis parish.

Ten good, live, reliable egg producers are wanted at once in this vicinity to complete this first circle. The demonstration agents of the parish are going to put their best effort behind the movement to make it a success. Crates have already been ordered for the first shipment, which will be made on April 2nd.

The idea, according to our advice, is to have a ready market for all poultry products at all times, to learn to work in groups, to furnish high class products and get fancy prices therefor.

The work will be closely supervised by the demonstration forces. The securing of equipment and feed at correct prices, and the development are a part of the plan.
