SPECIAL ELECTION CALLED IN WARD SIX.

Board and shall be in the following form:

Proposition to levy a three (3) mill special tax on all property subject to taxation in Ward Six (6) Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, annually for a period of five (5) years for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools in said Ward Six.

Signature of Voter. Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the secretary of the Parish School Board, be and he is hereby ordered to cause to be prepared for use at the said election the tally sheets, lists of qualified electors, assessed valuation of property, blank statements for the compilation of the vote in number and amount, and other election blanks that may be required for the purpose of holding the said election, to cause the same to be placed in the ballot boxes for use at the respective precincts, and to make provision for the transmission of the ballot boxes to these several precincts in the Ward at which the election is to be held.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That the polling places or precincts shall be at the Town Hall in the Village of Welsh and Postoffice in the Village of Roanoke, and the following three commissioners and clerks are appointed to each respective place: Welsh, Precinct One—Commissioners, William Fear, M. L. Prentice, Mrs. Lydia Unkel; Clerk, Mrs. J. B. Godfrey. Roanoke, Precinct Two—Commissioners, A. Longanecker, W. L. Bowers, Mrs. P. B. Thomas; Clerk, A. T. Moore.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Parish School Board shall meet at 9:30 o'clock a. m., on

Section 6. Be it further ordained etc., That the Vice President of the Parish School Board be, and he is hereby instructed to give public notice of the said election by proclamation to be duly published, according to law in the following form:

Proclamation. Pursuant to an ordinance passed by the Parish School Board of the Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, at its special meeting held on the 10th day of November, 1921, I, W. M. Penton, Vice President of the said Parish School Board, hereby give notice that, in compliance with said ordinance, a special election will be held in Ward Six, Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, on the 14th day of December, 1921, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

To levy a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar on all property in Ward Six, Parish of Jefferson Davis, Louisiana, subject to State taxation annually for a period of five (5) years.
