SCIENTIFIC NOTES.

Manganese is the most effective desiccating agent for "accelerating the oxidation" of drying oils in paint. That is to say, it makes paint dry quickly. Chlorophyll in a pure state is obtained by Herr A. Tschirch by the action of zinc-dust on chlorophyllan. Its spectrum is the same as that given by living leaves.

The sum of \$200,000 is granted annually by the French government in aid of astronomical and meteorological researches. The total amount devoted to the Ministry of Public Instruction this year is thirty million dollars. The Sanitary Engineer is of opinion that there is no method of removing snow from city streets that is worth talking about except by carting it away bodily. THE LIZARD OF THE GILA.

A Reptile Which is Looked Upon With Terror by Arizona Miners. Sant Fe Cor. Cleveland Leader. The lizard family attains great perfection in the Southwest, climaxing in the horrible creature called the Gila monster of Arizona. This is a big black lizard, from a foot to four feet in length. He has a pair of villainous, bead-like, black eyes in his head, beneath a couple of horny eyebrows that give his face an uncommonly ferocious expression. Around his neck is a broad band of beautiful yellow, and I am convinced that should a recently imported Irishman run foul of one of these vermin he would consider himself in the presence of the devil himself, wearing the colors of the Prince of Orange.

The Arizona prospectors tell of the wildest tales about the poisonous qualities of the Gila monster, some even claiming that the reptile kills its prey by breathing on it. Its poison is contained in minute cells at the base of a number of saw-like teeth. Though naturally a sluggish brute, it at times exhibits the most frightful quickness, darting like a flash upon its prey, and seizing the game between its jaws, which it shuts and keeps closed with the strength and tenacity of a snapping-turtle. Meanwhile the poison slowly exudes and penetrates the wounds made by the teeth, and if the victim be an animal of lesser degree than a man faintness and death will speedily ensue. The poison differs from that of every known venomous snake in being an alkali, while that of serpents is acid. It acts directly on the heart and brain without local effect of a serious nature.
