Ground was broken for the Court House last Thursday. Mr. A. E. Adams was elected chairman, and stated the object of the meeting to be the formal breaking of ground for the new Court House, after which he introduced Capt. Jno. B. Stone, who made a short address, reciting the struggles the people of Madison have made under remarkably adverse circumstances and their present bright prospects, and introduced Mr. J. M. Stanbrough, who threw out a few splendid words of earth, which ended the ceremonies.

COURT ITEMS.

Court has been in session this week. The early part of the week was devoted to civil cases. A number of criminal cases were taken up: State vs. Frank Bailey, assault and battery, plead guilty, \$5 and costs or 30 days in jail.
State vs. Simrall Singleton, wounding, less than may hem, plead guilty, \$10 and costs, or 60 days in jail.
A number of cases have been fixed for trial.

POLICE JURY.

MONDAY, May 2, 1887.

The Board met pursuant to call. Present, G. M. Long, and Messrs. Erwin, Sevier, Cochran, Richardson and Fischel.

The president stated the object of the meeting to be the consideration of the question of the taxes of the V., S. & P. R. R.

The agreement entered into by the parishes west of here, and the R. R. Co., was read by the clerk, and Maj. Waddill addressed the Board on the subject, advocating a compromise on the same basis as that agreed upon by the other parishes.

Maj. Lucas by request addressed the Board favoring the compromise.

Capt. Stone stated the legal aspect of the question.

Mr. Fischel moved that the president be authorized on behalf of the Board to accept the proposition made by the road of a basis of assessment of \$3.500.

Mr. Gilfoil addressed the Board, stating that the compromise was too low, and that he would not stand by it.

Mr. Cochran seconded the motion of Mr. Fischel.

Mr. Richardson moved to adjourn to 2 o'clock p. m., seconded by Mr. Sevier and carried.

The Board met after recess. The yea and nay vote being called on the motion of Mr. Fischel to fix the basis of assessment of the V., S. & P. R. R., at \$3.500 resulted in a tie, Messrs. Long, Cochran and Fischel voting yea, and Messrs. Erwin, Richardson and Sevier voting nay.

Mr. Fischel moved that we adjourn until May 16th, in order to get the true expression from the property tax payers of the parish in regard to the basis of assessment for V., S. & P. R. R., and the president appoint a committee of three to correspond with non-resident tax-payers and a like committee for resident tax-payers, to report at said time.

The President appointed the following gentlemen as such committee:

Mr. Fischel moved that a committee of ten be appointed by the president to make arrangements for the ceremonies attending the laying of the corner stone, seconded by Mr. Sevier and carried.

The president appointed the following as such committee:

H. B. Holmes, W. M. Murphy, Geo. W. Sevier, J. T. McClellan, G. A. Richardson S. F. Catchings, Sam James, S. E. Blum, F. L. Maxwell, G. W. Montgomery.

On motion of Mr. G. W. Sevier, seconded by Mr. Cochran, it was resolved that Stone & Murphy Attorneys be instructed to communicate with F. P. Stubbs Attorney for the V., S. & P. R. R. Co., and to request that no action be taken in the tax injunction suit on file until after the 16th inst., and also to propose to said Stubbs for this Board to accept a valuation of five thousand dollars per mile for ten years from completion on said Rail Road—as a compromise and to avoid further litigation, and to take such other action as may be necessary.

On motion the Board adjourned to May 16.
