## RAILROAD MEETING.

At a meeting of the property owners of the Parish of Madison, held at Tallulah, May 9th, Mr. P. L. Maxwell was called to the chair, after addresses from Judge Hiram R. Steele, Judge Wyley and others the following resolution was adopted.

A committee of 5 was appointed consisting of Maj. Geo. C. Waddill, Geo. W. Montgomery, H. B. Holmes, F. L. Maxwell and Maj. H. R. Lucas to supervise the necessary work in building the road.

The following ward committees were appointed.

1st Ward, Adams Kellogg, J. T. Cochran, Willis Davis.

2nd Ward, Geo. Long, Colman Lucas, Milton McCoy.

3rd Ward, S. F. Catchings, H. P. Morancy, N. Kahn, H. R. Hurd.

4th, Geo. W. Montgomery, S. E. Blum, Johnson Wyatt, Gov. Hawkins.

5th, J. H. Gilfoil, W. W. Johnson, W. H. Harvey, M. P. Erwin.

6th, A. K. Montgomery, S. W. Boswell, A. B. Armstrong, J. W. Dun.

7th, Alf. Fischel, E. W. Smith, P. P. Bruce, Jim Davis.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the Parish of Madison should take steps at once to vote the tax of five mills in aid of the Mississippi Valley Railroad Co., and secure the grant of the right of way, with the promise that in the event the road shall not be completed entirely through this Parish on or during the year 1890, then such vote of aid and right of way shall lapse and become null and void.

2nd, That a committee of three be appointed in each ward to secure the right of way and the necessary vote.

## What Reformers Call Reform.

The Advocate, like any respectable paper, is a staunch and fearless advocate of true reform, but does not believe in the doctrines of regeneration as formulated by the would-be political reformers of this State, nor are we so foolish as to be ignorant of the true motives which underlie all those vituperative eruptions of injured patriotism as proclaimed by our reform friends. Take for example the Assumption Pioneer. In a late issue it says: "If this contest were the result of men in search of official pap it would be unnecessary to look further, for they are usually on the lookout for some deal which will be to their advantage. We know of no individual who is advocating the cause of Gen. Nicholls who is influenced by any selfish motives."

What unsophisticated display of ignorance?

What sweet tally for the ignorant voter!

The Pioneer poses as a Reform organ and yet it displays a lamentable ignorance of the political platform of its own faction. Here it is: "We must elect Gen. Nicholls Governor, and also elect the balance of the State officers."

"We must elect reform members of the Legislature, and reform members of the State Senate."

"The joint assembly must elect two reform United States Senators."

"The United States Senators on taking their seats must see that none but Reformers are appointed to Federal positions in the New Orleans customhouse and mint."

"Every country postoffice must be in the hands of patriotic Reformers."

Of course, the Pioneer will not see any selfish motives in the above programme, nor any reason why Gen. Nicholls and his friends should "not regard the favoritism." If the Pioneer is disposed to be patriotic to that extent of capturing all the official pap within the political boundaries of the State of Louisiana, we, as humble and unpatriotic ringsters, respectfully beg leave to file our bill of exceptions, and we shall be very candid in so doing. If this reform movement is to be simply a question as to who shall occupy and control the public offices, then the friends of the present administration want to stand in the front row when the grand distribution takes place.
