

## INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTE

At Lafayette is Being Greatly Improved.

With the special appropriation of \$10,000 made at the recent session of the General Assembly for the purchase of twenty-five acres of additional land for the Southwestern Industrial Institute the Board of Trustees of that institution has consummated a purchase which effectually lays the foundation for a great State institution of learning in Southwest Louisiana. The original twenty-five acres which were donated by Mr. Crow Girard and his mother six years ago as an inducement to the State to select Lafayette as the location of the school, but not nearly enough to allow for its growth, additional buildings, etc., which would have soon deprived the young men of their athletic field and would have limited to a small area the space for gardens, etc. for the boarding clubs. It is also necessary to have separate play grounds for the young ladies, who are entitled to as much consideration as the young men. With the area of fifty acres now at the institute's command all these various problems are happily solved.

Bids are now being received for the enlargement and completion of the young ladies' brick dormitory of 20 rooms. This gives the institute three large brick buildings, besides the protected (galvanized iron) workshop, the President's residence (frame) and the large two and one-half story frame residence recently purchased for \$4,000 to be used as an additional dormitory. The actual present cash value of the institute plant is \$162,000.

The Institute has never had a more prosperous outlook. The sixth session is to begin Wednesday, September 19, 1906.
