

AN OIL WELL AT ANSE-LA-BUTTE

Similarity of This Well to the Present Oil Field Near the Town of Winnfield.

A special to the New Orleans Picayune of January 7, gives the information that an oil well had been brought in at a depth of 800 feet, at Anse-la-Butte, in Iberia parish. On being bailed out the well furnished 200 barrels of heavy density. It is expected that this well will develop a capacity of 2000 barrels a day.

This development brings into prominence the fact that the formation of the earth at the Winnfield oil field is identical with that at Anse-la-Butte. On an investigation of the location when the experiment of boring for oil was first inaugurated here, Prof. Harris, the State geologist, expressed the opinion that it would never be successful. Since the discovery at Anse-la-Butte he has reversed his first opinion and now says that the experiment here would prove successful and oil would be found.

The boring at the Pace Oil well has struck hot black sulphur water with a strong pressure of gas. A match touched at the opening causes a flame jet to shoot up a distance of ten feet. The surface indications of sulphur and gas are of the most encouraging nature, while the boring, as it progresses, gives strong indications and bright promise of a development of oil at any time. It would not surprise those who are interested in this work, to be informed at any time, that the sought-for substance has been found in paying quantities. The investors in this field are very sanguine of the eventual discovery of a fine oil producer.

THE ROCK ISLAND RAILROAD OFFICIALS

Wish to Develop Vacant Lands and Establish Colonies of Industrious Settlers.

Wednesday night the Rock Island train brought to Winnfield three prominent officials of that system and the Frisco, members of the Immigration Department of these lines. They were Messrs. C. B. Schmidt, of Chicago, commissioner of Immigration of the Rock Island-Frisco lines and Chicago and Eastern Illinois railroad; S. A. Hughes, of St. Louis, General Immigration Agent of the Frisco railroad; and Isaac Kline, Traveling Immigration Agent, C. R. I. & P. railroad, of Chicago.

These gentlemen made the Sentinel office their headquarters during a portion of Thursday morning and were met by Mayor Pace and a number of citizens who gave them statistics and general information relative to Winnfield and this section of the country.

They are making a tour of Louisiana and collecting statistics of the climate, fertility of soil, health, and other information, with a view of inducing immigration and settling up the vacant lands. Their purpose is to induce small farmers, men of industry and intelligence, to come and acquire homes and become permanent residents.

Of the purposes and aims of this movement, more will be written in future, as time and space will not permit a more extended notice at present. It is sufficient to call the attention to the work of these immense railroad lines in the direction of developing their territory, and their representatives desire the co-operation of every resident to promote the aim in view and bring to Louisiana a desirable population.
