Truck and Fruit Growing.

There are a very large number of acres of cut over lands in Winn parish and the area is increasing yearly. These lands are largely unoccupied and uncultivated. Yet with proper labor they can be made productive and remunerative. An instance of this kind is mentioned in an issue of the Lake Charles Press.

The Long-Bell Lumber Company three years ago cleared 460 acres of their cut-over land on the Kansas City Southern between Bon Ami and DeRidder, and this tract has been planted in orchards, truck and forage crops growing while the trees are coming in bearing. The account goes on further to state:

"A year and a half ago, as soon as the land was open, this company planted 105 acres of Elberta peaches, 10,000 Magnolia figs, 51 acres Gonzales, Japan wonder and Abundance plums, Keiffer pears, Japanese walnuts, Satsuma oranges, ten of the best varieties of grapes, strawberries, blackberries and pecans. All these have made a remarkable growth, and are now in a very healthy condition. Another year will see the trees bearing heavily.

"Cantaloupes, potatoes and peas have been grown on the lands among the trees while the latter were being cultivated and coming into bearing. Three crops are grown during the year, cantaloupes or cucumbers, peas for the summer, for forage and seed, and then potatoes in the fall. These crops keep the land in good shape, pay, and the fertilization given them benefits the trees, which have had no fertilization direct.

"The value of the work on this farm is becoming evident already. A careful reckoning is made of all expenses, and of the income from each crop, and the lands are being farmed under such conditions as would prevail under ordinary conditions at the hands of the small farmer. The demonstration is a practical one, and so most valuable.

Baptist Encampment.

A movement is on foot to move the Baptist Encampment from Mandeville to some more central and convenient locality. This Encampment is an annual gathering of the Sunday School Association, the Baptist Young People's Union and other auxiliaries of this denomination. Rev. J. P. Durham, formerly a pastor here, has been addressing audiences in the interest of the encampment. If it is to be moved Winnfield would prove an ideal place in which to hold these annual meetings because of its convenient railroad connections with all portions of the State and its ample and excellent hotel accommodations, besides having a numerous Baptist population. The members of this denomination would do well to set on foot some concerted action to secure this encampment. Winnfield presents cogent reasons and inducements for the annual meeting and it would add greatly to the interest of the gathering to secure it. Our Baptist friends are urged to take up this subject and inaugurate steps to secure this encampment if it is to be changed.
