

CAN WOMEN VOTE?

Yes! The ensuing election in this parish on 30th inst., is a non-political election. The Act, No. 35 of 1886, permits all property tax payers—without regard to sex—the right of voting. The object of the law is to obtain the sense of the tax payers on the question of whether their property shall be taxed or not.

The law requires a "majority in numbers and in value of the property tax payers" of the parish to be in favor of said tax before the same can be levied.

Ladies, who own property and who figure on the tax rolls, not only have the right to vote, but it is their duty to do so.

There must be a majority in number and value in favor of the levy—those who are in favor of seeing our parish supplied with another road and fail to cast their ballots in favor of the aid, really and in fact vote against progress.

There has never been a period when the women were behind in building up the resources of a country, and it is believed by the advocates of this great enterprise that they will not stand idly by and have their property weighed in the scale against progress and improvement, when by the simple act of going to the polls they can vote in favor of it.

It is stated that many ladies who own property are in favor of the railroad but are averse to going to the polls, and inquired if there is no other way by which their property can be counted in favor of the road. There is none. The ladies must vote for the road or their property will be counted against it.

A LAW UNTO THEMSELVES.

We quote the following from the report of the Grand Jury of East Carroll Parish, at the last session of the District Court:

"We had a large number of cases presented to us against persons for riding and driving on the public levees, and nine-tenths of said cases were against our most ignorant citizens; many of whom, we are satisfied, did not know of the existence of this law until arrested by the levee guard. For this reason and for the further reason, that the public roads of the parish are impassable in many places, and because the Police Jury of the parish has been so remiss in the matter of fixing our roads we have not indicted any person for breaking the levee law.

We respectfully call the attention of our Hon. Police Jury to the present bad condition of our roads; many of which are impassable after every big rain, and urge upon them the importance of action therein as soon as possible."

Ordinance of Police Jury of the Parish of Madison.

Ordinance No. 352. An ordinance ordering a special election in the parish of Madison, for the purpose of taking the sense of the property tax-payers of said parish relative to the levy of a special tax of 33 mills on the dollar per annum for ten years in aid of the Mississippi Valley Railroad Company of Louisiana.

Whereas, more than one third of the property tax payers of said parish of Madison have presented their petition to the Police Jury of said parish, praying that an election be ordered for the purpose of submitting a proposition to the property tax payers of the parish of Madison, Louisiana, whether they will vote a five mill tax for ten years in aid of the Mississippi Valley Railroad Co., and

Whereas, the said railroad company, in order to secure the active support of the tax-payers of said parish, has consented to accept three and three-fourths mills, tax for ten years, instead of five mills, as petitioned for—therefore

Be it ordained by the Police Jury of Madison Parish, Louisiana, in special session convened,

SECTION 1 That an election, for the purpose aforesaid, be held at the several voting precincts of the parish of Madison, Louisiana, on Tuesday, the 30th Day of April, A. D. 1889.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, That the Returning officer and the Sheriff of the parish of Madison, Louisiana, be, and they are hereby directed to provide for the holding of said election, by furnishing the necessary ballot boxes and appointing proper officers for conducting said election, according to the duties of their respective offices, as prescribed by law.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, That the Assessor of the parish of Madison, Louisiana, be, and he is hereby directed to furnish, for the use and purposes of the Commissioners of election, a list of the property tax payers for each respective ward, and for each ward a list of the non-resident tax payers, said list to show the amount of each tax payers assessment for the year 1888—being the last roll completed in said parish.

Be it further ordained that the ballots to be used at said special election be printed on the following form: "Against the levy of _____ on the Mississippi Valley Railroad Co." or "Against the levy of _____ on the Mississippi Valley Railroad Co." and, before the levy

is deposited in the ballot box, the name of the voter shall be written on the ballot by the voter or some other person at his or her request.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, That the Commissioners of election shall prepare a return of the election in duplicate; they shall count in the usual form, the number of votes cast for and against the tax, and shall prepare in separate columns, a list of all the names of persons voting for the tax, and of persons voting against the tax, as shown by the name endorsed on the ballots found in the ballot box, giving to each voter his proper valuation of the tax according to the Assessor's list.

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained &c. That after the election is held and returns thereof made, the officer charged with the promulgation of the same, shall obtain from the tax rolls of 1888 the assessment of the parish, and, after thus ascertaining the value of the taxable property, shall certify the return and make due promulgation according to law.
