Senator Rayner.

The death of Senator Isidore Rayner, of Maryland, which occurred several days ago, will be largely regretted. The dead Senator was a man of exceptional ability and power, who earned distinction both at the bar and in public life. Scholarly, eloquent and industrious, he gained early preferment in his native State, having served in both branches of the Legislature. In the eighties he was promoted from the State Senate to the Federal House where he served three terms. Thereafter he returned to the State service as Attorney general.

As counsel for Admiral Schley during the memorable inquiry by a naval court following the sea fight at Santiago, Mr. Rayner achieved a national reputation by his masterly conduct of his distinguished client's case. Promotion to the United States Senate followed in 1905, and he was re-elected for the term which began last March. As a Senator Mr. Rayner's profound knowledge of law, his readiness and force as a debater and his indefatigable industry speedily gained for him prestige and influence among the elder statesmen. His committee assignment include places upon the Judiciary and Foreign Relations committees, two of the most important.

His passing, to be accounted a national loss and sincerely regretted under any circumstances, is peculiarly unfortunate at this juncture, for the reason that he will operate temporarily to reduce the slender Democratic majority in the next Senate almost to the vanishing point. Maryland's Legislature will not hold its next session until January, 1914, it is understood. The present Governor is a Republican, who is expected to appoint a member of his own party to occupy the vacant seat in the upper house until the Legislature makes its choice. So that the Republicans gain, by Senator Rayner's untimely death, an additional seat not only through the coming session, but through the special session to be called by President Wilson for the purpose of tariff revision.

The Philippine government, through its bureau of Education, has taken an important step in the industrial development of the people of the Islands. By establishing a School of Household Industries at Manila, the government hopes to introduce into the homes several industries which will add materially to the income of thousands of families. Several hundred women from all parts of the Philippines received instruction in special industries at the school. After finishing the course they return to their native towns and teach other women to make at home things for which there is a market. Embroidery and lace-making are receiving first attention, since the government sees most direct commercial advantages in these two arts.

ACT OF INCORPORATION OF ALLEN-SEVIER CO., LTD.

State of Louisiana Parish of Madison

Before me the undersigned authority duly commissioned and qualified according to law and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named, and undersigned, on the 15th day of October, 1912 personally appeared the persons, whose names are signed hereto, who declared:

That availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana, relative to the organization of corporations they have covenanted and do, by the present act, covenant, bind form and constitute themselves, as well as such other persons as may hereafter join or become associated with them, into a body politic and corporation for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations following:

ARTICLE I.

The name and style of this corporation shall be ALLEN-SEVIER COMPANY, LIMITED, and that name shall have power to enjoy and have succession for a period of ninety-nine years to contract, sue and be sued in its corporate name, to make and to use a corporate seal, to have and employ such managers, officers and employees as the interest of the corporation shall require and to conduct the business for which the corporation is created.

ARTICLE II.

The domicile of said corporation shall be at Tallulah, Madison Parish, Louisiana, and all citations or other legal process shall be served either upon its President or its Vice-President, or its Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE III.

The purpose for which this corporation is created is to conduct, carry on and operate a general mercantile business, either wholesale or retail or both, to buy, sell, own and lease property, both real and personal, to lend and borrow monies, to make sign and endorse notes, bills, drafts and checks; and to do any and all things necessary in carrying out the purposes for which the corporation is created.

ARTICLE IV.

The capital stock of this corporation is fixed at the sum of Ten thousand dollars represented by one hundred shares of \$100.00 dollars each, which stock shall be paid for either in cash or in property and said corporation may begin business when Ten thousand Dollars of stock thereon has been subscribed for and paid up.

ARTICLE V.

The corporate powers shall be vested in a board of Directors, composed of three stock holders, but the stockholders by majority vote shall have the right to increase the membership of said board of Directors. The majority of said board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business. The first board of directors are declared to be D. H. Allen, W. P. Sevier, and L. H. Hurst, with D. H. Allen as president; W. P. Sevier as vice-president and L. H. Hurst as Secretary-Treasurer. A new board of directors shall be elected on the second Tuesday in October 1913, and annually thereafter by the stockholders, and all boards and officers shall hold office until their successors shall have been designated and elected as provided in this charter. The Board of Directors shall meet at such times as may be designated by the by-laws or upon call of the President. Special meetings may be held of the stockholders, upon one week's written notice given to the stockholders, signed by either the President or Vice-President. Vacancies on the board of Directors may be filled by the remaining directors.

ARTICLE VI.

Whenever this corporation shall be dissolved by limitation or otherwise its affairs shall be liquidated by three commissioners, elected by the stockholders for that purpose, unless such liquidation and dissolution shall be made by some other lawful means.

ARTICLE VII.

The officers of this corporation shall be a President, a Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer, and the President shall have authority to appoint and discharge, at will, all such assistants and agents as the interest of the corporation may require. Said officers shall be elected annually, and they shall be stockholders.

ARTICLE VIII.

The President shall have such powers as are generally exercised by such officers except, as hereinafter conferred. The President shall have full power to appoint, employ discharge and fix salaries of all employees he shall have entire control and management of the business of the corporation, with the sole right to buy, and sell property for the corporation, to make and sign all notes, drafts, checks and contracts and to do all things necessary to conduct the business for which this corporation is created. Each officer hereto has set opposite his name the number of shares for which he has subscribed so that the same will operate as a stock subscription list.

Ten Thousand Dollars having been subscribed by the incorporators, hereof and paid up, this corporation is authorized to commence business from this date.




