SCHOOL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

Tallulah, La., Oct. 10, 1913. The Madison Parish Board of School Directors met in regular session on the 10th day of October, 1913. The following members were present: Mr. T. F. Ward, President, Messrs. Chas. C. Aiken, R. K. Boney, H. P. Parnell, C. E. Wixon, John Riley, and W. A. Holloway.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The following additional teachers were appointed by Supt. Linton: Miss Maggie Allen for Madison Parish High School, salary, \$60 per month. Miss Virginia Roberts for Madison Parish High School, salary, \$65 per month. Miss Genevieve Smith, assistant in Afton School, salary, \$55 per month.

Miss Molly Kline, for Texas School, salary, \$40 per month. Miss Ruby Hart, Thomas School, salary \$10 per month. Miss Margaret Cottrell, Crescent School, salary, \$1 per month. Miss Bertha Schmalfluss, Andrews School, salary, \$40 per month. Miss Lily Schmalfluss, Andrews School, salary, \$40 per month. Miss Rosa Taylor, Livingston School, salary, \$50 per month.

It was then moved by Mr. Boney and seconded by Mr. Aiken that the above named teachers be elected at the salaries named for the session 1913-1914. The motion carried.

It was then moved by Mr. Wixon and seconded by Mr. Holloway that the superintendent be authorized to issue a quibus for \$1444.23 received by him from the tax collector, for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1913. The motion carried.

Negro Schools for the session were then discussed which resulted in the following motion, offered by Mr. Aiken and seconded by Mr. Boney: Resolved that on the first Monday in January, 1914 negro schools be opened at each point in the parish where there is a certified teacher, for a session of three months at a salary of \$15 per month for those holding third grade certificates and \$20 per month for those holding second grade certificates. The motion carried.

It was then moved by Mr. Boney and seconded by Mr. Wixon that the School Board appropriate \$10 toward defraying the expenses of erecting the grand stand on the school grounds of the Madison Parish High School. The motion carried.

The superintendent the following budget of receipts and expenditures during the year from July 1st, 1913 to July 1st, 1914.

Total \$12734 25. Mr. Riley moved and Mr. Boney seconded that the above budget be adopted as the School Board's budget.

President Ward then appointed Mr. Aiken, Mr. Riley, and Mr. Wixon to audit the Superintendent's books. The committee reported as follows: Oct. 10, 1913.

We, the undersigned committee, appointed to examine the books, accounts, and vouchers of the Superintendent of Schools for this Parish of Madison for the quarter ending September 30, 1913, beg to say and report that we have this day made said examination and find said books and accounts correct and in good form.

Dated this 10th day of October, 1913. Signed: CHAS. C. AIKEN, J. H. IDLEF, C. E. WIXON, Committee. There being no further business, it was moved by Mr. Boney, seconded by Mr. Aiken and carried that the Board adjourn. W. H. WARD, President. JAS. R. LINTON, Secretary.
