SCHOOL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

Tallulah, La., Feb 6th, 1914. The Madison Parish Board of School Directors met in regular session on this the 6th day of February 1914. The following members were present: Mr. T. F. Ward, president.

Mr. Chas. C. Aiken, Mr. R. K. Boney, Mr. H. P. Purnell, Mr. C. E. Wixson, Mr. John Riley, and Mr. W. A. Holloway.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with.

The Negro Schools were then discussed at some length, which discussion resulted in the following motion being offered by Mr. R. K. Boney and seconded by Mr. Chas. C. Aiken.

Resolved, that where a certificated colored teacher offers to teach a school that has not been this session the superintendent is empowered to open that school for a session of three months.

The motion carried. It was then moved by Mr. R. K. Boney and seconded by Mr. W. A. Holloway, that the president and secretary of this board be authorized to lease the old Tallulah School Building for 1 yr. with the privilege of renewal for a rental of twenty five dollars per month, and that they be further authorized to repair said building to the extent of three hundred and five dollars.

The motion carried. Superintendent Linton then nominated the following teachers: Miss Ruth Henry, for Waverly School, Salary \$40.00 per month. Miss Myrtle Cole for Crescent School, Salary \$15.00 per month. It was then moved by Mr. H. P. Purnell and seconded by Mr. R. K. Boney that the above mentioned teachers be elected for the schools named and the salaries stated.

The motion carried. The Board then adjourned. T. F. WARD, President. Jas. R. LINTON, Secretary.

LAWS PROTECTING FISH.

Sale prohibited—No black bass, commonly called green trout, white or yellow bass, commonly called striped bass or or barfish; crappie, commonly called sac-lait or white perch, nor any species of perch and sunfish to be sold or had in possession for sale at any time.

None of the preceding varieties to be caught by any other means than rod, hook and line having not more than five sets of hooks, or hand line having not more than five sets of hooks or trolling with spoon hook or other artificial bait attached.

Any of the preceding species of fish caught in seines or other apparatus to be returned to the water alive and uninjured. No bass under 8 inches to be had in possession.

Not more than 25 bass nor more than 100 sunfish or perch to be caught in one day by one person.

No hoop-nets to be set in bayous or other streams less than forty yards in width.

Soining for fresh-water fish absolutely prohibited in waters east of the Mississippi river.

Permits for the use of seines in specified waters west of the Mississippi river for the purpose of catching the common species of fresh-water fish other than game fish may be granted on application to the commission. The holders of such permits are entitled to seine, under suitable rules and regulations, in any public waters within 70 miles of salt water and in lakes Poston and Phelps in Bossier Parish, all lakes and bayous in Catahoula Parish, all lakes in Point Coupee Parish and all lakes in Concordia Parish.

No restrictions on use of minnow seines or small shrimp seines for catching bait if employed only for that purpose.

Use of seines, hoop nets, trotlines, bushlines and setlines for catching the following fresh water fish prohibited during the seasons noted herewith: Buffalo fish, Feb. 15-Apr. 15; catfish of all species and paddle or spoonbill cat, May 15-June 15.

No buffalo fish nor catfish less than 12 inches in length to be had in possession for sale.

SEED CORN.
