HOOK WORM AND HEALTH CAMPAIGN

To be Conducted in Madison Parish

The State Board of Health with the co-operations of the Police Jury will soon begin a campaign for the eradication of hook worm disease.

Dr. J. D. Baucum of the State Board of Health will have charge of the work.

Dr. Baucum states that hook worm infection is light in this section of state, but other health problems of vital importance will be discussed.

The Police Jury judiciously appropriated \$175.00 to assist the Board of Health.

Dr. Baucum will visit every school in the Parish and lecture on hook worm disease, adenoids, enlarged tonsils and other defects of school children, also on malarial fevers, the itinerary of visits to schools is published elsewhere and it is to be hoped that every patron of schools will be out on dates mentioned.

Teachers throughout the Parish are requested to get as many visitors out to lectures as possible.

No one can question the importance of public health work and with the hearty co-operation of all public spirited citizens in this campaign it will no doubt be a great success.

LEVEE BOARD PROCEEDINGS

Office of the Board of Commissioners Fifth Louisiana Levee District

Pursuant to a call by the President, the Board of Commissioners for the Louisiana Levee District, met in special session at Tallulah, La., its domicile, this day.

President Rhodes called the Board to order at eleven o'clock, A. M. There were present the following Commissioners:

E. J. Hamley and R. L. Hill, East Carroll; J. M. Johnson and T. P. Kell, Madison; B. F. Young and F. L. Guthrie, Tensas; J. H. Lambdin and E. C. Rhodes, President, Concordia.

President Rhodes stated the call of the meeting as being for the purpose of considering bids for sale of the bonds which were advertised for sale on this day, and considering any other matters of importance that might come before the board for consideration.

On motion of Commissioner Young, seconded by Commissioner Kell, the work on the banquettes in the District were ordered to be discontinued for the present and all Contractors be notified of same by inspectors.

On motion of Commissioner Young, duly seconded by Commissioner Kell, the following resolution was adopted:

Be it resolved that the President of this Board be and he is hereby authorized to negotiate with — Bank for an extension of the Board's obligation, shortly maturing, to such time as may be satisfactory to said — Banks and the President be authorized to issue a note or certificate of indebtedness, and pledging to the said banks same security now held as security for said loan.

At 12 o'clock, the time advertised for the opening of the bids for the sale of the \$250,000.00 issue of bonds by the District, the following bid was received and opened: Mrs. Agnes Guthrie, of Natchez, Miss., bid \$5,000 for \$5,000 worth of the bonds, and her bid being in conformity with law, being not less than par and with interest at the rate of 5 per cent, the same on motion of Commissioner Young, duly seconded, were sold to the said Mrs. Guthrie and the same ordered delivered to her upon payment in cash the said amount.

On motion of Commissioner Young, seconded by Commissioner Hamley, the following resolution was adopted:

Be it resolved that a committee of three, of which the President shall be one, be appointed to negotiate a loan of \$50,000 for the immediate necessities of the Board and to endeavor to make some disposition of the bonds now held by the Board and report back to this Board for final action on Tuesday, Feb. 17th, 1914. The President appointed besides himself, Commissioners Young and Hamley as members of the said above committee.

On motion of Commissioner Johnson duly seconded, the complaint of Mr. J. L. Russel, for damages to his fence claimed to have been done by Messrs. Scott & Clements was referred to them. On motion of Commissioner Johnson, seconded by Commissioner Young, a committee was appointed to see Messrs. Scott & Clements, and arrange with them to take certificates of indebtedness

for the balance due them on their levee contract at Willow Point Loop, with interest at the rate of 7 per cent per annum until paid. Commissioners Young and Hamley and the President were appointed a committee to see Messrs. Scott & Clements about the above matter.

On motion of Commissioner Young, seconded by Commissioner Hamley, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, the slide at the Reid-Biggs levee is giving this Board uneasiness and it is feared that the situation might become critical, and

Whereas, Maj. Robertson cannot leave home at present on account of illness in his family,

Therefore, be it resolved that this Board respectfully request that Maj. Kerr, Chief of the State Board of Engineers, meet a committee of this Board on the Reid-Biggs Levee on the morning of Wednesday, March 14th, 1914.

The President and Commissioner Kell were appointed a committee to meet Maj. Kerr at said time and place. There being no further business, the Board adjourned subject to call of the President.

Wednesday, March 5th, 1914.

The Police Jury convened in regular session; present: Hon. F. L. Maxwell, President, presiding, all wards being duly represented.

The minutes of the last meeting read and adopted.

The Finance Committee presented its report, together with bills against the Parish amounting to Twenty-three Hundred and Forty-one and 77-100 (\$2,341.77) Dollars, duly endorsed for payment, and the necessary funds for the payment of same is hereby appropriated:

The following resolution was offered by Mr. Galloway and duly adopted:

"Whereas, the committee, together with the Secretary of this Board, having examined the license account of A. J. Sevier, Jr., Tax Collector and all licenses having been paid and accounted for for the year 1913, the Secretary is hereby instructed to issue to said Collector his quietus on license account for said year.

Jno. E. Yerger, Clerk 9th District Court, presented a communication from the Art Metal Construction Co. in which it was agreed to make a reduction of 33 1-3 per cent on the purchase price of the office fixtures lately installed in the Clerk's Office, which reduced the cost from \$388.00 to \$265.00, which agreement, on motion of Mr. Mitchell, was accepted, and the President authorized to draw warrant on the Treasurer of this Parish for the payment of same.

On motion of Mr. Devine, the following resolution was adopted:

A committee of three be appointed to investigate and report the possibility, costs, and wisdom of damming Roundaway Bayou near the site of present bridge, said dam to be used in lieu of bridge as part of public road and the removal of present bridge and its reconstruction at Montrose plantation across Roundaway Bayou. W. R. Spann, Alex Clark and Benj. Mitchell, committee.

On motion of Mr. Spann, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved that the President be, and he is hereby authorized to borrow from the Tallulah State Bank the sum of five thousand dollars for and in the of this Police Jury for the purpose of defraying the current expenses of the Parish and paying for the

be further authorized to issue the negotiable certificate of the Police Jury for said amount payable on the 1st day of January, 1915, and to pledge the revenues of the Parish as security for said loan, an appropriation being hereby made for its payment out of any funds available on or after its maturity.

On motion of Mr. Spann, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, that the President be, and he is hereby authorized to borrow from such bank as he may see fit the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars at the rate of 6 per cent interest for and in the name of this Police Jury for the purpose of defraying the current expenses of the Parish, and that he is further authorized to issue the negotiable certificate of the Police Jury for said amount payable January 1st, 1915, and to pledge the revenues of the Parish as security for the payment of same, an appropriation being hereby made for its payment on or after its maturity.

Dr. J. D. Baucum appeared before the Board representing the Rockefeller fund for the eradication of the Hook Worm.

On motion of Mr. Galloway the following resolution was adopted:

"Be it resolved, That, in order to further the work of the treatment and eradication of the Hook Worm that the sum of \$175.00 is hereby appropriated and to be paid to Dr. J. D. Baucum upon his completion of the work in Madison Parish, it being understood that he is to visit and treat all applicants in each ward of this Parish.

On motion of Mr. Hewes the operation of the traction engine outfit was discontinued on and after 1st day of April, 1914.

There being no further business the Board adjourned, sine die.
