



LEVEE BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

Office Board of Commissioners, Fifth Louisiana Levee District, Tallulah, La., February 10, 1915. Pursuant to call, the Board of Commissioners of the Fifth Louisiana Levee District, met in special session at Tallulah, La., this day, for the purpose of considering the reports and findings of committees appointed to investigate the merits of certain claims made by sundry persons against the Board and other matters that might come before the Board for consideration.

The meeting was called to order by President Rhodes at 12 a. m., and roll call was ordered. There were present the following Commissioners:

E. J. Hamley, R. L. Hill, East Carroll; T. P. Kell, Madison; E. C. Rhodes, President, J. H. Lambdin, Concordia.

Absent—J. M. Johnson, Madison. On motion duly seconded, the reading of the minutes of previous meeting was dispensed with.

Reports of committees was then heard as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEES. To the Honorable Board of Commissioners for the Fifth Louisiana Levee District. Gentlemen:

We, your undersigned committee, appointed at the last regular meeting of this Board to investigate and ascertain the merits of certain claims filed against the Board, beg to submit to you the results of our findings in the various matters herein set forth.

We have considered carefully the facts in the various cases and have conferred with the attorney of this Board, Hon. Jeff B. Snyder, as to the legal phases in all the matters involved, and desire to report as follows:

(1) In the matter of Lawrence Bros., former contractors for the Reid-Biggs levee in Madison Parish, La., which contract was cancelled and relet, we would recommend that the president be authorized and empowered to take up and offer the said Lawrence Bros., in settlement of their claims in full, the amount due for certain toping done by them on the Reid-Biggs levee; for the high water of 1913, and estimate of which was issued by the Board of State Engineers of Louisiana, and at the price fixed in the contract previously made.

(2) We recommend the payment of (\$534.50) five hundred and four and 50/100 dollars, covering the items shown on page two of said account filed herewith; that this sum be paid to the agent of the estate of Mrs. M. P. Utz, A. E. Keil, upon claimant giving receipt in full in the premises.

The item aggregating the sum of six hundred and eighty-one and 97/100 dollars, (\$1,681.97) shown on page one of said account, we recommend be rejected.

(3) In the matter presented by Mr. John G. Sessions, we find some merit in the claim, and we recommend that the president of this Board and Commissioner Hamley be appointed a committee to endeavor to arrange an amicable compromise with Mr. Sessions.

(4) In the matter of Stewart Bros. Co., of New Orleans, claim for damage from fire to property caused by Inspector setting fire to grass on levee, we recommend that a sub-committee of this Board be appointed to investigate and fix the actual damage caused and that the claimants, Stewart Bros. Co., be paid upon the recommendation of said committee.

Respectfully submitted, E. C. RHODES, T. P. KELL, B. F. YOUNG, Committee.

On motion of Commissioner Hill, seconded by Commissioner Guthrie, the following resolution was adopted: Be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners for the Fifth Louisiana Levee District, that the foregoing reports of

the committees appointed by this Board, be and the same is hereby adopted and ratified, and that the matters be disposed of as recommended by said committee.

On motion of Commissioner Young, seconded by Commissioner Kell, the president was authorized to appoint a committee to investigate the offer of Mr. John Scott, of the sale of a drag-line levee machine now at Henderson, La., and to advise the practicability and advisability of purchasing this machine and to report to the Board its findings.

On motion of Commissioner Young, seconded by Commissioner Guthrie, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, in the suits now pending in the United States Court for this District, of the St. Louis Iron Mountain Ry Co., versus Dunn, Hughes and Campbell, Sheriffs et al, restraining the collection of taxes by said Railway company, in which said taxes this Board has an interest; and that whereas, Blanchard, Smith & Palmer have been retained as counsel to assist district attorney Snyder in the defense of the suits at an agreed upon fee of \$1,000.

Resolved, that this Board agrees to bear its proportion of said fee based upon the amount of levee taxes involved in said suit and with the permission of the Governor and Attorney General of this State, which is hereby submitted, does ratify and confirm the employment of said law firm of Blanchard, Smith & Palmer.

The president appointed the following committee:

To investigate purchase of levee machine—Commissioners Hamley, Hill and Guthrie, the president, to act with the committee.

To constitute the sub-committee to fix the damages in the Stewart Bros. Co. case—Commissioners Hamley and Hill.

On motion of Commissioner Hamley, duly seconded the Board adjourned.
