### TOWN COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Nov. 6, 1917.

Regular meeting of the town council. Present: Mr. W. L. Darrow, Mayor Pro-tem, Messrs. W. F. Coltharp and W. S. Craig, Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were approved.

The village treasure read his annual report, which will be read as soon as audited.

Hon. D. M. Evans came before the board asking that Mulberry street and ditches be straightened out and bridges repaired. The matter was deferred until the next meeting.

On motion of Mr. Craig and seconded by Mr. Coltharp, an ordinance was duly adopted relative to a change of price of electric current, whereas the price was changed from fifteen cents per k. w. to eighteen cents per k. w. for the first forty k. w.'s, and twelve cents for each k. w. above forty k. w. And also the minimum charge per month for water bills shall be fifty cents plus meter rent.

### ORDINANCE NO. 101

Be it ordained by the Mayor Protem and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Tallulah that beginning from Dec. 1, 1917, the price of electric current be increased twenty (20) per centum; the price for electric current will be fixed at eighteen cents per kilowatt hour for the first forty kilowatts and twelve cents per kilowatt hour for each kilowatt above forty.

Be it further ordained that the minimum charge for a water bill shall be fifty cents plus meter rent.

Be it further ordained that all parts of ordinances in conflict are hereby repealed. Adopted this, the 6th day of Nov., 1917.

This change of price to be effective for Dec., 1917, accounts.

On motion of Mr. Craig, and seconded by Mr. Coltharp, it was ordered that a budget for the year of 1918 be published.

### POLICE JURY PROCEEDINGS

This day the Police Jury convened in regular session, Hon. Alex. Clark, President presiding, all ward duly represented except the sixth. Mr. J. H. Devine being absent.

On motion of Mr. Hews the reading of the minutes of the last meeting were dispensed with.

The Finance Committee presented its report, together with bills against the Parish amounting to \$2,658.00 endorsed for payment and on motion of Mr. McDonald the same was ordered paid when sufficient funds are available.

On motion of Mr. Wright the following committee was appointed to lay off and declare a certain road from Quebec to Island Chute a public road upon which committee the president appointed Messrs. Blanche and Patterson free holders to act in conjunction with the Road committee of this Board, and report their doings to this Board at its next meeting.

On motion of Mr. Saunders Ralph Peck, was authorized and instructed to erect a work shop on the jail lot in Tallulah 20x30 feet.

On motion of Mr. Galloway the following resolution was unanimously adopted, "Resolved that Hon. Alex. Clark, the president of this Police Jury be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to borrow the sum of sixty-five hundred dollars to defray the current expenses of the Parish and to issue a warrant or certificate of indebtedness pledging the revenues of Parish as security for same, Adopted Nov. 7th 1917.

A representative of the Young Mens Christian Association appeared before the Board and made interesting address asking this Board to make an appropriation of fifteen hundred dollars or as much thereof as may be later determined as Madison Parish pro rata.

On motion of Mr. Galloway, the sum of 1,500.00 or as much thereof as may be found to be quota for Madison Parish was donated to assist the efforts of the Young Mens Christian Association.

There being no further business the Board adjourned.

### WAR BREAD

Breads may be divided into two classes: yeast breads and quick breads. In the first instance 25 per cent of the wheat flour may be saved by substituting an equal amount of some other wholesome food material which may be at hand, in the second instance 50 per cent of the substitute may be used. The South is fortunate in having a number of substitutes such as corn meal, rice, sweet potatoes, soy beans, pea, the better grades of cotton seed meal, etc. all of which make wholesome palatable breads. Below is given a recipe using the sweet potato. Any of the substitutes may be used. All measures are level. 2 cups mashed sweet potato; 2 teaspoons salt; 2 cups flour; 4 tablespoons shortening; 4 teaspoons baking powder; liquid sufficient to mix to proper consistency. Sift all dry ingredients together; mix well into the sifted mixture. Add the potato, adding liquid as necessary till all is made into a dough of proper consistency, roll into about 1-2 inch thick, cut, and bake as for ordinary wheat biscuits.

Requests have been received for directions for making yeast breads with the substitutes. This will be given in the Journal at an early date.

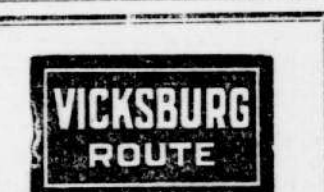
