## POLICE JURY PROCEEDINGS

Tallulah, La., August 6th, 1919  
Police Jury of Madison Parish met  
this day in regular session.Members present: Hon. Alex.  
Clark, President, J. B. Galloway, J.  
H. Devine, W. H. Hewes, A. E.  
Hinds, E. B. Saunders. Absent: J. V.  
Wright and W. M. McDonald.Minutes of last regular meeting  
and one special meeting were read  
and motion of Mr. Galloway both  
were approved.On motion of Mr. Devine seconded  
by Mr. Galloway, the following reso-  
lution was adopted:Resolved, that the President of this  
Police Jury be and he is hereby au-  
thorized to borrow from the Tallu-  
lah State Bank the sum of Fifteen  
thousand dollars and to issue the ne-  
gotiable notes of the Police Jury for  
the amount, for the repayment of  
which notes the revenues of the Par-  
ish are hereby pledged and an appor-  
tionation is hereby made out of the  
funds available.Mr. J. B. Galloway, Chairman of  
the Road Committee, reported that  
the road committee had investigated  
the question of laying off a road east  
from Tallulah through the Wallace  
place and recommended that a sur-  
vey be made of the proposed road.He, also, reported that the Road  
Committee had laid off a road from  
Ellis pumping plant on Roundaway  
Bayou to the railroad at Lake One,  
the said road to follow the old Ashley  
Railroad levee.On motion of Mr. Devine the pro-  
posal of Morris and January to cut  
the brush and trees from the right  
of way of said road for the sum of  
\$150.00 was accepted, the work to  
be approved by the Road Committee  
before payment is made.On motion of Mr. Devine, Mr.  
Hewes was authorized to have the  
roads in his ward worked.On motion the Secretary was in-  
structed to write Mr. T. J. Mitchell  
that the Police Jury would consent  
that the flume across the public road  
in front of Araby plantation should  
remain in position is said Mitchell  
would at once repair the road where  
it crosses said flume and maintain a  
good crossing.On motion of Mr. Galloway, sec-  
onded by Mr. Devine, Hon. David M.  
Evans and Mr. R. K. Boney were ap-  
pointed delegates to a meeting of  
Farmers and Friends of the Louisi-  
ana State University to be  
held at Baton Rouge on Thursday,  
August 7th, and were requested to  
support such action as they might  
consider to the best interests of the  
farmers of Louisiana.The finance committee reported

## LEVEE BOARD PROCEEDING.

Office Board of Commissioners of  
Fifth Louisiana Levee District

Tallulah, La., Aug. 4, 1919.

On the call of the President, the  
Board of Commissioners of the Fifth  
Louisiana Levee District met in a spe-  
cial session at its domicile, Tallulah,  
La., this day.The Board was called to order by  
the president thereof 10:30 o'clock  
A. M., the roll being called, the fol-  
lowing Commissioners were present,  
answering to their names:Present: E. J. Hamley, East Car-  
roll parish; R. K. Boney and T. P.  
Kell, President, Madison parish; G.  
C. Goldman, Tensas parish; E. C.  
Rhodes, Concordia parish.Absent: F. H. Schneider, East  
Carroll parish, B. F. Young, Tensas  
parish, J. H. Lambdin, Concordia  
parish.A quorum being present, the fol-  
lowing business was taken up:The special meeting of the Board  
was called for the purpose of ratify-  
ing and confirming the acceptance  
by the president of the bid of the  
Marine Bank & Trust Company and  
Commercial Trust and Savings Bank,  
which is incorporated and made a part  
of these proceedings as follows:

New Orleans, La., July 23, 1919

Mr. T. P. Kell, President,  
Fifth Louisiana Levee District of  
the State of Louisiana,  
Tallulah, La.,

Dear Sir:

Referring to the authority vested  
in you by the Board of Commission-  
ers of the Fifth Levee District of  
the State of Louisiana to sell to the  
highest bidder \$400,000 5% bonds of  
the Fifth Louisiana Levee District, we  
hereby agree to pay you par and ac-  
crued interest to date of delivery of  
the bonds to us, and in addition  
thereto a premium of \$4,500.00.This bid is made subject to the fol-  
lowing terms and conditions:The proceeds of the sale of these  
bonds is to be deposited in the Com-  
mercial Trust & Savings Bank and the  
Marine Bank & Trust Co., New Or-  
leans, La., without interest, until the  
said deposits shall have averaged one  
year with the said banking institu-  
tions.It is understood and agreed that if  
it should be found necessary to trans-  
fer any part of these funds to the  
credit of the U. S. Mississippi River  
Commissioners, the said funds will  
still be left with the undersigned  
banks under the terms and condi-  
tions, to be withdrawn only as work  
progresses.After these deposits will have av-  
eraged one year with our respec-  
tive institutions, we agree to pay in-  
terest on the remaining funds at the  
rate of 3% per annum.This bid is further conditioned up-  
on the legality of these bonds being  
approved by our attorneys.We enclose our check for \$4,000.00  
as an evidence of our good faith  
which amount is to be applied by you  
on the purchase of these bonds when  
they are taken up by us.

## FIFTH LA. LEVEE DISTRICT.

On motion of Comr. Rhodes, sec-  
onded by Comr. Hamley, the follow-  
ing resolution was unanimously  
adopted:BE IT RESOLVED, That the bid  
of the Marine Bank & Trust Co., and  
the Commercial Trust and Savings  
Bank be received and incorporated in  
the minutes of this Board.BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,  
That the acceptance by the President  
of this Board of the bid of the Marine  
Bank & Trust Co. and Commercial  
Trust & Savings Bank of the pur-  
chase of \$400,000.00 of bonds au-  
thorized to be sold under the resolu-  
tion of this Board adopted July 9,  
1919, as set forth in the above bid,  
is hereby ratified and confirmed.BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,  
That the two hundred and twenty-  
five additional bonds provided to be  
lithographed in said resolution of July  
9th, 1919, shall bear the date of Au-  
gust 15th, 1919, and the interest

each year.On motion of Comr. Hamley, sec-  
onded by Comr. Goldman, the follow-  
ing resolution was unanimously adopt-  
ed.BE IT RESOLVED, That acting  
under and by authority of Act No.  
205 of Acts of the General Assembly  
of 1912 of La., the president of this  
Board is hereby authorized and di-  
rected, in accordance with the agree-  
ment with the Marine Bank & Trust  
Co., and the Commercial Trust and  
Savings Bank, to deposit with the  
said banks the proceeds of the sale  
of the bonds amounting to \$400,-  
000.00 and accrued interest and pre-  
mium and to withdraw same as may  
be necessary for levee construction  
in the District.WHEREAS, The Mississippi River  
Commission, through its Engineer,  
of the Third U. S. District, has called  
upon this Board for its pro rata of  
contribution under the Flood Control  
Act of Congress, to contribute for  
levee construction, outlined and be-  
ing advertised for construction in  
this district, the sum of \$120,000.00,THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED  
That the President of this Board be  
and he is hereby authorized and em-  
powered to draw a warrant on the  
State Auditor of Louisiana from the  
above funds set aside for levee con-  
struction, to be countersigned by the  
Chief of the Board of State Engi-  
neers, and made payable to the Ma-  
rine Bank and Trust Co., and Com-  
mercial Trust and Savings Bank of  
New Orleans, for account of the Pres-  
ident of the Mississippi River Com-  
mission, for the sum of \$120,000.00,  
one hundred and twenty thousand  
dollars.The above resolution offered by  
Comr. Rhodes, seconded by Comr.  
Boney, was unanimously adopted.
