

**PROCEEDINGS OF POLICE JURY.**

Tallulah, La., Nov. 5th, 1919.

Police Jury met in regular session with the following members present: Hon. Alex. Clark, President, J. B. Galloway, J. H. Devine, W. H. Hewes, W. T. Oakes, and E. B. Saunders.

Minutes of the last meeting read and on motion of Mr. Galloway, were approved.

On motion of Mr. Devine, the following resolution was adopted: Be it resolved that W. L. Rountree is hereby elected Parish Printer for Madison Parish at a salary of \$50.00 per month, and that the Madison Journal is designated as the official journal of said parish.

On motion of Mr. Devine, seconded by Mr. Hewes, the Sheriff was authorized to increase the janitor's salary to \$25.00 per month.

Mr. Galloway reported that the road and bridge committee had approved the construction of the road and erection of bridge asked for by Messrs. A. M. Ayers and C. W. Melton, the work to be done by Messrs. Ayers and Melton, who agreed to charge the parish actual cost for the same and to accept in payment certificates of indebtedness running one, two, and three years, divided equally bearing interest from their date at 5 per cent per annum, all pay rolls and material bills to be O. K'd. by Mr. Devine.

On motion of Mr. Hewes, Secretary was instructed to notify Messrs. C. E. Gray and R. E. Lee that their services would not be required after Nov. 20th, it being intended to discontinue the use of the road outfit during the winter.

Mr. V. W. F. Jefferson appeared before the Board and asked that the location of the old military road where it approaches Tensas River be changed and that there be some changes made in the location of the road from Quebec to Mr. Hunter's place on the west side of Tensas River. This matter was referred to Mr. Devine to investigate and authorize the change if he considered it advisable.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. J. A. Seldon to remove gates from public road through "Scratch Ankle" plantation, Mr. Joel F. Johnson, Sr., to remove gates from public road to "Hester" plantation and Mr. V. W. F. Jefferson, Manager of Poinsette Lumber Company, to remove gates from road to "Dunlap" plantation.

On motion of Mr. Hewes, Secretary was instructed to write Mrs. A. A. Baum to repair the broken culvert over the run from her hog lot to the bayou, or to have the run filled.

Mr. R. K. Boney appeared before the Board, stated that because of withdrawal of Government appropriation it would be necessary for the parish to appropriate an additional \$50.00 if it were desired to continue the services of the Parish Agricultural Agent, and that he thought it advisable to continue this service.

On motion of Mr. Wright each member of the Police Jury was requested to ascertain the sentiment of the taxpayers in this community on this matter in order that action might be taken at the next meeting of the Board.

Secretary reported that the balance in the hands of the Parish Treasurer was only \$178.36 but that there was \$909.29 to the credit of "Special Highway Fund" which could be transferred to the general fund to partly reimburse it for road expenditure in excess of budget. On motion of Mr. Wright this transfer was ordered made.

Mr. Galloway, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee had approved the following bills and the Secretary was ordered to issue warrants for the amounts whenever there were funds in the treasury available for their payment.

Regular meeting of the Village Council.

Minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

The following resolution was offered by Mr. Craig and seconded by Mr. Darrow:

Resolved that it shall be unlawful for any person to throw empty cans, bottles or trash of any kind in any of the gutters or drainage ditches within the corporate limits of the Village and that any person found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$20.00 or be confined in jail not exceeding 10 days or both, at the discretion of the Mayor; and that it shall be the duty of the Marshall to patrol the drainage ditches of the Village at least twice each month and see that same are kept clear of rubbish.

The vote on this resolution was: Yeas: W. S. Craig, W. L. Darrow. Nays: None.

Moved by Mr. Darrow and seconded by Mr. Craig that the V. S. & P. Railroad be directed to install arc lights of not less than 100 candle power at the street crossing on the east side of Mulberry, Cedar, Chestnut, Walnut, and Elm Streets.

**THE TRUTH ABOUT NEW ORLEANS**

The City of New Orleans will be Found in the Parker Column.

The strongest anti-ring organization since the Citizens' League of 1890 has been formed in New Orleans under the name of the Orleans Democratic Association. It has enlisted in its ranks literally hundreds of former regulars who have become disgusted with the present-day "ring" tactics.

The New Orleans Democratic Association is only three weeks old, yet it has the "ring" already conceding a close fight.

Proof of the strength of the newly formed body is contained in the "ring's" own bet proposition.

Eight years ago the "ring" bet Michel would beat Hall two to one in New Orleans. They lost that bet. Wednesday, October 15, the "ring" in a newspaper advertisement offered to bet \$33,000 that John M. Parker would not carry New Orleans. Mark the terms—"Would not carry." They do not even claim that Stubbs will carry the city.

This offer of wager is a public admission on the part of the "ring" that the day of her majorities is gone and that the light in the city is close.

The Parker forces are making recruits every day. The party of error Pleasant in rebuking the "ring" Deck Board set a close race free to vote as they please. It also deprived the "ring" of a big club which could be used on business and shipping interests.

The removal of the "ring" board has been a tremendous motor in making possible this powerful independent Democratic movement. It goes to prove how little would be left of the city machine were it deprived of the job club over the balance of the city and state employees. They number more than 6,000.

Ladies should remember that the women suffrage amendment was favorably voted on outside of New Orleans but there the ring knocked it out so far as the state of Louisiana was concerned. Some of you may say that you do not want to vote, but you are entitled to the franchise and if you do not want to exercise it when it comes just put it in cold storage for safe keeping until you feel you should use it. There is nothing like getting all there is coming to you. You are as intelligent as women of other states and why should Louisiana be on the outside just because the ring thought it might cut a seal on their bossism. Woman suffrage is coming. California has recently ratified, making the 17th state. Now ladies, as a mark of appreciation of the ring's action, get busy and help us knock it "out of the box" as it did Parker from carrying this parish.

**DECAY OF STUBBS CHANCE IN WINNFIELD.**

From a Claim of Five to One Stubbs Supporters Consider Contest Close.

(North Louisiana Digest)

Parker headquarters Saturday chalked up another heavy black mark in the victory column of the political ledger when he received from J. B. Pick of Winnfield the report of a Stubbs meeting in Winn parish. The report announced that the much-heralded meeting had been attended by 29 men and one boy, and of the 29 men five were Parkerites.

The report is reprinted in part below:

"The old courthouse 'ring' of Winn parish advertised in the local paper a week ago, flooded the town with doggers and made personal appeals, calling all Stubbs supporters to rally for a big 'Stubbs' meeting at the courthouse, Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.

"It was a beautiful night and conditions were favorable for the 'old political guard ring' to show its strength. When the hour set for the meeting arrived the courthouse bell was rung until the rafters shook, but the 'ring' which at one time controlled the political destinies of Winn parish had lost its power, for after the strenuous efforts on the part of Bob Oglesby, a corporation lawyer; J. J. Peters, Jr., a young attorney and political aspirant; P. K. Abel, clerk of court, and all the lesser lights of the defunct parish ring, they could only muster together but 29 men and one boy by actual count.

"Twenty-four declared for Stubbs the others were for Parker. However to bolster up their waning power, the 'old guard' got their heads together and listed a large number of Stubbs supporters, who had expressed themselves in favor of either candidate. They figured that if their names were placed on the 'list' they would stand hitched. But you may rest assured that the methods of the 'old courthouse ring,' of which Bob Oglesby and Perry Abel and a few others are the chief mourners, will not work.

"Winn parish is without a shadow of doubt swinging into the 'Clean Business Government' column with rapid strides and increasing its candence every day.

"The Stubbs supporters first claimed Winn parish by five to one, later they claimed two to one, and now using the words of Bob Oglesby, spoken at the Stubbs meeting: 'We (the Stubbs men) will have to go to work and work hard in order to keep knock it 'out of the box' as it did Parker from carrying this parish."
