**ENTOMOLOGISTS FROM COTTON STATES TO MEET HERE AND IN VICKSBURG**

Distinguished Experts Will Discuss Cotton Growing Under Weevil Sprayer Dusting Method

Vicksburg is preparing for one of the most important meetings ever held in the state, the conference of cotton states entomologists, horticultural inspectors and commissioners of agriculture here March 1, 2 and 3. One of the sessions will be held at the Tallulah, La., laboratory of the Delta boll weevil investigations.

The conference will bring together the leading agricultural scientists of the south for special addresses and round table discussions of the pertinent problems facing the farm interests of this section.

March 1, 8 p. m., National Park Hotel Convening of conference.

Greetings and responses. "What My State is Doing in Entomology," including teaching, experimentation, inspections, extension and the like—a round table discussion by the representatives from each state.

"Results of Boll Weevil Poisoning in Florida in 1919," by Prof. William Newell.

General discussion.

March 2.

Morning and evening sessions in Tallulah laboratory under supervision of B. R. Coad, director of laboratory. Special reports and demonstrations in boll weevil control and in cotton dusting machinery.

"Malarial Mosquito Control," Capt. D. L. Van Dine.

8 p. m., National Park Hotel.

"Conclusions on Cotton Dusting Programme for 1920," round table discussion.

"The Sweet Potato Weevil Fight," discussion led by J. A. Graft, K. L. Cockerham, Wilmon Newell and Dr. O. F. E. Winburg.

March 3, 9 a. m.

"The Pink Bollworm Situation in Texas," presented by Dr. W. D. Hunter and his associates. Discussion led by E. E. Scholl, R. W. Harned and Prof. Anderson.

"The European Corn Borer; statements of Personal Observation Made in Europe," Dr. O. F. E. Winburg.

Round table discussion on advisable methods of prevention of the further dissemination of the European corn borer, Oriental peach moth Japanese beetle, etc.

Afternoon Session

"Uniform Horticultural Inspection Laws," presented by F. M. O'Bryne. Discussion led by A. F. Conradi, R. W. Harned and C. C. Becker.

"The Citrus Canker Situation," subjected presented by Dr. Karl Kellerman. Discussion led by William Newell, Dr. Winberg, Prof. Harned and others.

"Bee Disease Inspections and Foul Brood Law Enforcement," presented by Prof. G. M. Bentley, followed by round table discussion.

Round table discussion of pecan insects and citrus insect pests and their control.

This meeting will bring to Vicksburg a number of the largest cotton planters in the Mississippi Delta, also from the cotton growing parishes across the river in Louisiana.—Vicksburg Herald.
