AUTO OWNERS ATTENTION!

The Journal received a letter from the Secretary of State, stating that auto license taxes are delinquent, and that all owners who have not secured license tags for their cars will be subject to a penalty besides the tax.

LEEVE NOTICE

The Levee Board is notifying the people of the district that stock, etc., will not be allowed on the levees. This is General Order No. 1, which is as follows:

April 2, 1920.

1. All persons residing along the levees of this district are hereby notified that on and after this date, no stock of any kind will be allowed to run at large on the public levees travelling on horseback or by vehicles of any kind shall be allowed thereof.

2. Inspectors of each Parish are directed to serve notice generally on the public and rigidly enforce this order.

3. After having been notified of this order, and party who owns stock shall violate this order, it will be the duty of the Inspector, and they are hereby directed to impound said stock and attach a penalty of not less than \$5.00, for each offense and on each head of stock for such violations the owners be prosecuted for said violations.

4. Should after having been notified, any person shall persist in allowing their stock to run at large on the levees, regardless of the law the inspectors are directed to kill the stock, without further notice.

HEAVY RAINS HELP TO SWELL THE RIVERS

When the Herald editorially stated that 51 feet would be the minimum for the crest at this point, it was generally conceded that the forecast was correct. F. H. Andrews, secretary of the Vicksburg Board of Trade and a very close student of the river and all its vagaries, stated in his Review of the Week, that the Cairo gauge is a good index, agreed with the Herald, and yesterday afternoon reiterated his belief that 51 feet will be the minimum.

Mayor J. J. Hayes, formerly a well known river man, and who continues to observe things in connection with the Mississippi and its tributaries, was present when Secretary Andrews made the statement, said that it is pretty sure to go to 51 feet on the local gauge, and that the Cairo crest will be repeated here.

Mayor Hayes added that on account of the frequent rains in the several months the lowlands are covered with water, and the land pretty well saturated. Furthermore, when the land is dry and the rains infrequent, the crest this far down is about 2 feet or two and a half lower than at Cairo but this time the people can look for the same stage at this point.

The rainfall in Vicksburg yesterday amounted to 3.71 inches, and it was pretty general.

Arkansas River. A Pine Bluff, Ark., special dispatch of Tuesday says that:

"Heavy rains south of Little Rock today, combined with the high stage of the Mississippi at the mouth of the Arkansas river, causing water to back up the Arkansas river, have increased the danger of serious damage by floods in the lower Arkansas valley. Fear is felt for the levees at the state negro convict farm at Cummins 30 miles down the river where several convicts were drowned in the high water of 1915.

The river here was stationary today at 23.5 feet but thousands of acres of farming land already is under water. Flood stage here is 25 feet. The rains today are not expected to materially affect the river here but will cause further rise south of Pine Bluff."

Former service men, holders of Uncle Sams War Risk Insurance, have received from the Bureau of War Risk Insurance an identification card, bearing their name and insurance number, for ready reference, such as they carried while in the service, states Director R. G. Chomeley-Jones of the Bureau.

This card will enable the men to give their correct insurance number when communicating with the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, and also serves for identification in case of sickness or accident.

Many of these cards are being returned to the Bureau by former service men instead of being retained. The Director requests all former service men who received these identification cards to keep them.

IT PAYS TO READ THE ADS

"Besides," spoke up father, who had come to know the publisher of the Record, "the editor tells me that the advertisements are what pays for the paper, and that he could not run it from the subscription money alone. Of course, he wants all the subscribers he can get. But when Aunt Emily Lucas stops her subscription because the new size of the paper doesn't fit her pantry shelves, she shouldn't be surprised that the editor doesn't go out of business."

APPRECIATE GOVERNMENT INSURANCE

That the ex-service men appreciate their Government Insurance is borne out by the fact that the records of the Bureau show that over one-half billion of War Risk Insurance has been converted up to the present date. The daily conversion for the past week averages over \$5,000,000.00. This information together with the fact that the number of pending applications for conversion, which recently showed 16,000 unacted on, has been reduced to 7,600 and that number lessening every day, shows that the conversion applications will be responded to immediately.

It is only a question of a short time before the New Government Policies will be released from the printers and forwarded to the men. These policies are of a very beautiful design, the front page containing the war activities of the Government in alluring colors, arranged by one of the most prominent artists.

One of all the applications for conversion of War Risk Insurance into permanent form, only two hundred forty have been rejected. The actual amount of insurance now carried by ex-service men with the Bureau of War Risk Insurance makes this national institution, which is owned by ex-service men, three times larger than the largest private Commercial Company.

The Bureau has extended the time limit for reinstatement to July 1, 1920, and it is only necessary for the ex-service men to pay two monthly premiums covering the amount of insurance they desire to be reinstated. The policies may be converted at any time within five years into one of the regular contracts, which contains cash surrender values, loan values, and other attractive benefits. In case of where the men desire to reinstate and convert their insurance, this may be accomplished by the payment of only one premium on their War Risk Insurance and the first premium on the converted policy on whatever amount they desire to convert.

A NEW LOUISIANA HARDWOOD OPERATION

Tallulah, La., March 22.—The Evans & Stinnett Hardwood Lumber Company, a concern composed of Kentucky lumbermen and capitalists, are erecting a 9-foot band mill at this place, which it is planned to have in operation within the next sixty days. The principals of this firm, while new to this section, have prominently been connected with the hardwood industry for the past thirty years, during that time having been engaged in some extensive operations in Kentucky and Tennessee. They have disposed of their holdings in those states, however, to concentrate their activities upon a large acreage of hardwoods, which they recently acquired in this section.

The new corporation is capitalized at \$300,000 and its officers are W. A. Stinnett, Whitesville, Ky., president, P. A. Evans, Louisville, Ky., vice-president; L. B. Evans, Whitesville, Ky., treasurer, and L. L. Basham, Owensboro, Ky., secretary. Executive offices will be maintained at this place and in the Speed building, Louisville, Ky.

With its strong financial backing and extensive holdings of virgin hardwood timber, this concern, under the guidance of men thoroughly conversant with every phase of this business, is expected to soon become a factor in hardwood circles.


