29th. Judicial District Court, Parish of Plaquemines.

The District Court convened at Pointe a la Hache Tuesday January 5. Judge R. Emmet Hingle presiding with District Attorney N. H. Nunez and Messrs James Wilkinson, Oliver S. Livaudais and E. C. Kohn attorneys present.

In the matter of the Ostrica Oyster Co. vs. John Barbier et al., Livaudais for plaintiff and Wilkinson for defendants, the exceptions were set for trial on February 2d. as were also the cases of Gabe Michel versus Gus. Bailay, Livaudais for plaintiff and the minors Viard vs. Viard, Livaudais for plaintiff.

The cases of Mrs. Jules Hingle vs. Nicole Jacqueline Nunez for plaintiff and Wilkinson for defendant, and Kacney vs. Ouesard, Livaudais for plaintiff were set for February 2d. The case of the State vs. Henry Clay charged with assault and battery was continued to January 22nd. and that of State vs. Louis Williams charged with threats was continued to February 3rd. In the case of the State vs. Theodore Stafford, charged with rape a preliminary examination was held and Stafford's bond was fixed at \$5,000. The case will come up for trial in April, the next jury term of the Court.

A Native Bird Destroying the Sparrow.

Both the "Agricultural Gazette" of New South Wales and the "Journal of Agriculture," of South Australia record an article by Mr. C. T. Musson, Haykissbury Colie, a New South Wales, on the discovery that a certain bird hitherto a stranger to, or at least unknown in many parts of Australia, is a deadly foe to the ubiquitous sparrow. In the "Lachlander and Condobolin District Recorder" (26th February, 1908), the following statement appeared:

"Mr. A. J. Taylor, of Wheatacre, informs us that during the past few months he has noticed the presence of numbers of large birds, blue in colour, with black heads, which are very destructive to sparrows. In fact since the arrival of these aerial cannibals, sparrows are practically an unknown quantity about Wheatacre.

"We wrote Mr. Taylor for further information, and received the following reply: 'The bird that takes the sparrow, it is quite true that there is not a sparrow left about the place, and there were hundreds of them here. I tried in every way to get rid of them, but since those birds came we got rid of them. We never saw the birds before; they are strangers. There are about four of them in a flock and they keep together. I do not think it is a hawk, though they balance in the air like a hawk. They keep after the grasshoppers, but they are death on the sparrow. The other birds are not frightened of them. They are very quick on the wing, and when flying, spread out the tail.'

"Three days later came a specimen for identification: it is the Ground Cuckoo-Shrike (Pterodopocys Phasianella). The head and neck are dark-grey; breast add lower back dull white crossed by narrow black bars; wings, upper side black; under side white; tail forked; the terminal half black. It is about the size of a small pigeon, but more slender; total length from tip of bill to end of tail, 14 in. Commonly, they make use of their legs a good deal, not flying much. Insects are the chief food, and and we do not hear of them doing any damage.

"This is a most interesting fact, which should be noted by all dwellers west of the range where the bird is found. If this is to become a fixed habit, which probably it now will, it would appear that the sparrow has at least one enemy in its new abode. Sportsmen should take note and act up to the facts stated. Nature would here seem to be coming in, for evidently the cheeky little interloper is no longer to have as peaceful a time as it has in the past. The 'balance is beginning to kick,' and we may congratulate ourselves that at least one cause is in operation which will help in bringing the sparrow down in number to such reasonable limits as will preserve a due balance of life forms, and not allow this particular bird to become unprofitable. Broinowski, in 'his birds of Australia,' says: 'this bird is found in most parts of the interior of Australia, frequenting principally plains and thinly timbered forest country. It is always seen on the ground in small flocks from two to eight in number.'—Queensland Agricultural Journal.

Plaquemines Parish School Board

Proceedings at Pointe-a-la-Hache, La. Dec. 15th 1908.

Pursuant to a call of President Wm. Dymond, the members of the Board of School Directors, in and for the Parish of Plaquemines, recently elected, met here this day. The meeting was called to order by the retiring Secretary, R. Emmet Hingle. The following members answered the roll call and presented their commissions and oaths of office.

First Ward, J. B. Babington, Second Ward, Wm. Dymond, Third Ward, Jules B. Savoie, Sixth Ward, L. Jeanfreau, Seventh Ward, F. B. Giordano, Eighth Ward, V. Treadaway, Ninth Ward, N. B. Cannon, Tenth Ward, W. H. Chauvin. The Fourth and Fifth Wards did not answer roll call.

There being a quorum present and temporary organization being in order on motion of Director Dymond, duly seconded, resolved that J. B. Babington be and he is hereby made temporary chairman. On motion of Director Cannon, duly seconded, resolved that Jules B. Savoie be and he is hereby made temporary secretary. Upon the Chair stating that permanent organization was now in order, on motion of Director Cannon, duly seconded, Wm. Dymond member from the Second ward was nominated for president; there being no other nominations, Director Dymond was elected President by unanimous vote of the Board.

Director Jules B. Savoie, duly seconded, then nominated Edwin C. Kohn for the position of Parish Superintendent, Ex-Officio Secretary of the Board, and Ex-Officio Treasurer of School Funds. There being no other nominations on motion of Director Jules B. Savoie, duly seconded it was resolved that Edwin C. Kohn be and he is hereby declared elected as Parish Superintendent, Ex-Officio Secretary of Board, and Ex-Officio Treasurer of the School Funds. As there was no contrary votes Edwin C. Kohn was declared elected.

President Dymond now stated that the Board of School Directors in and for the Parish of Plaquemines was duly and legally organized with a full quorum present for the transaction of any business that might be brought before it. The District Attorney, Hon. Nemours H. Nunez, at this juncture, addressed the Board in regard to doors on all school houses opening outwardly, in accordance with the provisions of Act 73 of 1908. The President of the Board assured the District Attorney that the provisions of the act would be complied with, wherever required. By Director Babington, duly seconded, it was resolved that the Board adjourn until after dinner.

The Board reconvened at 1 p. m. The same members were present as at the organization of the Board at the morning session. The resignation of Miss Bernice Louderbough, teacher of the Grand Prairie school, was handed in, to take effect at the end of Dec., and was accepted by the Board. In connection with this matter the patrons of said school handed in a petition asking that Mrs. Francis Lee be appointed to succeed Miss Louderbough. On motion of Director Babington, duly seconded, resolved that favorable action be taken on the petition and that Mrs. Francis Lee be and she is hereby appointed teacher of the Grand Prairie school, vice Miss Bernice Louderbough, resigned, to report for duty on Monday, Jan. 4th, 1909.

President Dymond brought up the matter of school desks for the Myrtle Grove school. On motion of Director Savoie, duly seconded, resolved that the Superintendent be and he is hereby authorized to purchase 7 desks for Myrtle Grove school, the cost per desk not to exceed \$5.00.

On motion of Director Cannon, duly seconded, resolved that the salary of the Superintendent be and is hereby fixed at \$1,000 per annum. On motion of Director Cannon duly seconded, resolved that the Superintendent make trips to all of the schools as soon as possible, and report back to the Board what schools need the most attention.

At the request of the retiring treasurer R. Emmet Hingle, Director Savoie duly seconded, resolved that the books of the retiring Treasurer of school funds be examined by a committee composed of the President and two members appointed by the Chair. President Dymond appointed on this Committee, Julius Strack and Jules B. Savoie.

On motion of Director Cannon, duly seconded, resolved that a committee be named to draw up suitable resolutions to be presented to the retiring Superintendent R. Emmet Hingle, to be composed of the President and two members appointed by him. President Dymond appointed on this committee, J. B. Babington and Simon Leopold.

Bill of Strack and Babington for transporting pupils to the St. Clair school amounting to \$50.00 was presented for payment. Director Babington explained to the Board that the team was supplied at the suggestion of former Superintendent R. Emmet Hingle, to run until such a time as the Board met and the bill presented for payment. Director Babington explained further that the outfit included the services of a man, wagon and mule, and that seven children were being hauled daily at the rate of \$1.00 per scholastic day. By Director Cannon, duly seconded, resolved that the bill of Strack and Babington for 50 days at \$1.00, for transporting pupils to the St. Clair school, amounting to \$50.00 be ordered approved and ordered paid, and sent a contract be order ed drawn up with Strack and Babington at the same rates for the remainder of the session.

On motion of Director Cannon, duly seconded, it was resolved that the President of this Board make one trip with the Superintendent to all schools, once every session, actual expense to be borne by the board, and to make a full annual complete report to the Board.

On motion of Director Babington, duly seconded, it was resolved that a committee to be composed of the President and Superintendent and one other member of the Board to be appointed to investigate conditions of the school, incidental to the selection of a site for a site for a new school house.

On motion of Director Savoie, duly seconded, it was resolved that the newly elected Treasurer of the School Fund, Edwin C. Cohn, furnish a bond in the sum of \$5,000, this being the largest amount in the hands of the Treasurer of School Funds last year, in accordance with law.

There being no further business, on motion of Director Babington, duly seconded, it was resolved that the Board adjourn. It was so ordered by the Chair.

St. Bernard News.

The Police Jury of the Parish of St. Bernard held a meeting at the St. Bernard Court House on Saturday Jan. 2, at which considerable business was transacted. A number of applications were made for liquor licenses, 1 or 2 of which were counter to restrictions of the law, being too near to the first ward public school. Judge Nunez, district attorney, called the attention of the police jury to Act 91 of 1908, which provided that the police juries must supply the court houses and public offices with spittoons and post signs on the wall cautioning persons not to spit on the floors and walls. For non-compliance with this requirement the president becomes guilty of a misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine or imprisonment. Judge Nunez called the attention of the police jury also to the fact that the state laws now required that the doors of all public buildings including court houses, must open outwardly.

The rate of the St. Bernard taxation was fixed at 10 mills, out of which the schools will get 31-2 mills. The liquor license was fixed at the minimum rate allowed to the parishes by the state law, which is \$500. Incidentally a license of \$25 was included in the schedule, for moving picture shows. The budget of expense for the year 1909 was formulated and includes an allowance for the direction of a court house and jail for the first justice, which will be located at the Stock Landing. A thousand dollars was also allowed to purchase the land for the N. H. Nunez school. The special road tax of five mills for five years, was ordered to be divided equally between the first and second road districts. The budget-appropriated for roads, however, was to go to the first district. A proposition was received from Mr. Ortha Guerra to grade and build a public road in the sixth ward, beginning at Bois-du-Lac and turning in at Regio Station, on the lines to be established by the parish surveyor, and with a width of 18 feet and under specifications to be approved by the police jury, the contract price to be \$150 per mile. He proposed also to open a road through the Bois-du-Lac section 18 feet wide and to cut all trees and under brush for 10 feet on either side for the sum of \$300 per mile. The police jury accepted Mr. Guerra's proposition.

Judge R. Emmet Hingle held a session of the 29th Judicial District Court at the Slaughter House on January 2, Judge Nunez, the district attorney filed a considerable number of informations against parties violating the oyster law. The accused pleaded not guilty and the cases were fixed for trial on January 16th. Carrying of concealed weapons and assault with dangerous weapons and a little grand larceny constitute the other informations. All of the accused pleaded guilty and were released on bond to appear for trial January 16th. In the suit of the St. Bernard Rendering & Fertilizer Co., against Mathias Reuter for \$10,000 and injunction, the rule for defendant to show why injunction should not be issued was heard and after argument of counsel on both sides, Judge Hingle took the matter under advisement. New rules were adopted by Judge Hingle, fixing the terms of the court on the following basis: one week in each month beginning on each Saturday after the second Tuesday, of January, February, March, May, June, July, November and December, Jury terms beginning the third Monday of April and October.

The Board of Commissioners for the Bayou Terre Aux Boufs Drainage District met last Saturday, January 2, and was advised by the St. Bernard Drainage and Construction Company that had let to two sub-contracts, one John A. Brumbaugh and the other E. Hopedale Improvement Co., who would expedite the work of dredging was now working at Bois-du-Lac in December and it was agreed with St. Bernard Dredging & Construction Co., and that it will continue the work in the work at Bois-du-Lac and that the sub-contractors will be governed by the terms and specifications of the original contract.

Gen. Estepinal, our congressman the first district agreed to make an effort to secure from the War Department its consent to open a street through the Barracks property coming with Royal street. This would be a great benefit to the upper part of St. Bernard Parish but especially to Stock Landing settlement, the residents of which must go to the river for or far to the rear to get tea carts go up town.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF PLAQUEMINES.

BE IT KNOWN, That on this 12th day of the month of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eight and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and thirty-third (133rd), before me, Ernest Alberti, Deputy Clerk of Court of the 29th Judicial District of the State of Louisiana, for the Parish of Plaquemines, and ex-officio Notary Public, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared that, availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana and of the constitution thereof relative to the organization of corporations, they have agreed and by these presents do agree and bind themselves, as well as such persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form and constitute a corporation and body politic in law for the objects and purposes and under the clauses, conditions, stipulations and articles hereinafter set forth and expressed, which they hereby adopt as their charter, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be, THE LOWER COAST GAZETTE CO., and its domicile shall be at Pointe a la Hache, in the Parish of Plaquemines, State of Louisiana. Under this corporate name said corporation shall have the power and authority to exist and enjoy a succession for the full term and period of ninety-nine years from the date hereof. It shall have the power and authority to sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal and the same to break or alter at pleasure; to name and appoint such managers, directors, officers and employees as the interests and convenience of this corporation may require; to make and establish, as well as alter and amend, from time to time, such by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management, conduct and regulation of the affairs of said corporation as may be deemed necessary and proper; to own, hold, receive, lease, purchase and convey, as well as mortgage and hypothecate property, real, personal and mixed; to consolidate or merge with another corporation, or own and hold stock therein.

ARTICLE II. All citations and other legal processes shall be served upon the president of said corporation, or, in the event of his absence or disability, on the vice-president, and in the case of the absence of both the president and vice-president, upon the secretary of said corporation.

ARTICLE III. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are declared to be the printing and publishing of a newspaper, devoted to the agricultural and other interests of the Lower Coast and of the State of Louisiana; to conduct and carry on a general newspaper business, with all things connected therewith, and by the sale of such newspapers and other printed matter published by said Company, to disseminate news and all matters of general information.

ARTICLE IV. The capital stock of said corporation has been and is hereby fixed at the sum of Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars, to be divided into or represented by twenty-five hundred shares of ten dollars each; said stock shall be paid for in cash as it may be called in by the Board of Directors, and the calls for said cash payment shall not exceed fifty per cent. the first year and not exceed fifty per cent. during the second year. Said calls for said cash payments shall not exceed five per cent. per month during the first year and not exceed five per cent. per month during subsequent years until the whole subscription shall have been paid.

ARTICLE V. All the corporate powers of said corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Directors to be composed of nine stockholders. Said Board of Directors shall be elected annually on the first Saturday in May, beginning in the year 1910. All such elections shall be by ballot and shall be conducted at the office of said corporation, under the superintendence of two commissioners to be appointed by the Board of Directors, and of which election ten days' previous notice shall

the Board of Directors at their first meeting following each annual election shall elect one of their number to be president and another to be vice-president, and they shall also elect a secretary. Said Board of Directors may appoint from time to time, and dismit at pleasure, such clerks, agents and other employees that they may deem necessary for the business and purposes of said corporation. Said Board of Directors shall also have full power and authority to borrow money, execute mortgages, issue notes or bonds and generally do all things pertinent to the objects and purposes of said corporation, as also to issue and deliver full paid shares of stock or bonds, or obligations of said corporation at not less than par value in payment for labor done, or money borrowed, or property or rights actually received by said corporation.

ARTICLE VI. Whenever this corporation may be dissolved, either by limitation or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated by three stockholders, to be appointed at a general meeting of the stockholders to be convened for such purpose, after thirty days' previous notice shall have been given by advertisement in a newspaper published in the Parish of Plaquemines and a majority in amount of the outstanding capital stock of said corporation shall be requisite to elect. Said commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall have been fully settled and liquidated and in case of the death of one or more of said commissioners, the vacancies shall be filled by election by the surviving commissioners.

ARTICLE VII. This Act of Incorporation may be modified, changed or altered, or said corporation may be dissolved with the assent of three-fourths of the stock represented by any general meeting of the stockholders convened for such purpose, after thirty days' previous notice shall have been given in a newspaper published in said Parish of Plaquemines. Such changes as may be made in reference to the capital stock of said corporation shall be in accordance with the laws of the State upon this subject.

ARTICLE VIII. No stockholder shall ever be held liable for contracts or faults of said corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due on the shares of stock owned by him, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null, nor of exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the amount due on his stock.

ARTICLE IX. Until the first election to be held under this charter on the first Saturday in May, 1910, the following named persons, or stockholders, shall constitute the first Board of Directors, with all the powers hereinabove enumerated, and shall continue in office until their successors shall have been elected, viz: F. C. Mevers, S. Leopold, Ben Michel, John Dymond, Jr. Joseph Cosse, Marc Coghevich, Joseph Savoie, Dr. V. O. Schayot and Joseph Hingle with the aforesaid F. C. Mevers, as president and Simon Leopold as vice-president.

Thus done and passed, in my office at Pointe-a-la-Hatche, on the day and in the month and year herein written, in the presence of Messieurs L. T. Fontenelle and Gustave Favret, competent witnesses, who herunto sign their names, together with the said appearers and me, Notary, after due reading of the whole, the said appearers declaring they placed affix their signatures the number of shares of stock subscribed for by them, and they likewise adopt this as their stock subscription list.
