

GENERAL NEWS.

E. Harriman, the railroad financier, died Thursday afternoon, September 9, at 2 o'clock.

Lord Northcliffe, owner of the London Times, predicts a war between England and Germany.

E. Lefebvre, a French aviator, was killed by a fall from his aeroplane in France.

L. Sandoz of Opelousas has been appointed assistant traveling auditor in Louisiana.

A boat line will be re-established between Baton Rouge and Morgan City.

The parish of St. Martin has voted a tax to construct a navigable drainage canal from St. Martinville to the Atchafalaya.

Peanut oil will be manufactured this season at Shreveport, La.; some 1200 acres of peanuts having been grown in Caddo and Bossier parishes.

Commodore Peary disputes Dr. Cook's claims of discovery of the North Pole.

Gen. H. C. Corbin died in New York on September 8.

Continued reports from Mexico indicate that the damage wrought in and about Monterey and surrounding villages is much greater than at first estimated. One town, La Ascension, with a population of 2,000, is said to have totally disappeared. The town of Allende is also reported to have been totally destroyed.

Orville Wright made a successful flight in his airship at Berlin, Germany, last week, making twenty-four miles in thirty-six minutes.

Leading financiers of Berlin and Frankfurt, Germany are reported to have subscribed the necessary capital to float, financially, not aerially, a projected air line navigation company.

St. Louis capitalists, interested in the reclamation of Louisiana lands, are visiting in St. Bernard with a view of establishing some colonies of German families in that parish.

Hotel Dieu graduated a class of seven trained nurses last week.

Archbishop Blenk arrived in New Orleans Wednesday morning, Sept. 8, from his trip abroad. While in Italy the archbishop was received by the pope who sent a papal blessing to the archbishop's diocese.

Twelve barrels of new molasses have been shipped to New Orleans from Breux Bridge by Numa Tauzin.

J. Pierpont Morgan offers to back up Dr. Cook with any money needed to prove his claim to the discovery of the North Pole.

The Union Veteran Legion, in session in Washington last week, unanimously passed a resolution favoring the raising of the wreck of the battleship Maine in Havana Harbor, so that the truth of its sinking may be definitely known.

The trial of Wyatt Ingram, defaulting trust officer of the Hibernia Bank, has been set for October 20.

Judge Robert S. Lovett has been elected chairman by the board of directors of the Union Pacific R. R., to succeed the late E. H. Harriman.

The Louisiana Anti Tuberculosis League has received a gift of \$5,000, to wards its desired fund of \$50,000 to establish a sanitarium in New Orleans. The donor requested that his name be not given.

The republic of Mexico seems to be getting more than its share of disastrous floods and another one is reported from the state of Oaxaca, one of the sugar districts of Mexico. Sugar plantations are reported damaged, cattle lost and a number of persons drowned.

Dr. Frederic Cook is willing to submit his proofs to the Geodetic Survey for confirmation of his claim to have reached the North Pole.

J. Pierpont Morgan is reported to be desirous of gaining control of the Union Pacific Railroad.

Prof. Adolph Struempell, the Vienna specialist whom F. H. Harriman consulted while in Europe, is quoted as saying that Harriman had cancer.

The two Barracas, suspected of shooting into the Giagona residence in New Orleans last week, were arrested at Sarpy, La.

The buildings for the Immigration Station at New Orleans, which will be constructed on the Algiers side of the river, will be completed in about a year's time.

Six garbage stations will be arranged for at intervals along the river front, where the city's garbage will be taken and then dumped into cars and carried out to fill the low lands in the rear of New Orleans.

The parish of Washington will expend \$100,000 on good roads, the police jury having passed an ordinance to that effect. The work will be supervised by the Board of State Engineers and the labor furnished by the state convict force. Certificates of indebtedness will be issued bearing 5 per cent. interest and maturing annually until 1918.

A seven story fire proof building will be put up by the Metropolitan Bank on Camp Street, New Orleans on the lot occupied years ago by the old Morque Building, which was destroyed by fire.

The Municipal Affairs Committee of the New Orleans Board of Trade has recommended that the fire insurance rates should be reduced forty per cent. that the state should have control of the fire protection bureau and a reorganization of the Board of Fire Commissioners.

An immigration conference will be held in New Orleans during the sessions of the Waterways Convention.

It is stated that the price of coal will be much lower this winter.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has issued a valuable bulletin, Farmers' Bulletin 369, entitled How to Destroy Rats, prepared by David E. Lantz, assistant in the Bureau of Biological Survey. The bulletin covers means of repressing rats, rat proof building, keeping food from rats, natural enemies of rats, destruction of rats by traps, poisons, domestic animals, fumigation, micro-organisms and organized efforts to destroy rats. Considering the enormous annual loss incurred annually in the United States from rats, this bulletin should be procured by every farmer and householder, carefully studied and acted upon.

President Taft started on his tour of the West and South on Wednesday, the 15th. Thirty states will be traversed during the trip and 12,579 miles covered. On October 16 the president and his party will reach El Paso, where the meeting between President Diaz and President Taft has been arranged. From El Paso the presidential party will tour various Texas points, arriving in St. Louis, Mo. October 25, and beginning the trip down the Mississippi that same evening, arriving in New Orleans the 30th.

Col M. J. O'Brien, president of the Southern Express Co., died in New York of pneumonia on September 11.

A shipment of five thousand sheep has recently been made from Lake Charles, La., to the 101 Ranch in Oklahoma, belonging to the Miller Bros.

La Paz, in Lower California, was destroyed by a cyclone last week. La Paz is said to be the oldest settlement in the California.

The church of St. John the Baptist on Dryades Street, New Orleans, was struck by lightning early Monday morning and practically destroyed by fire. The church was built in 1869.

The battleship Louisiana breaks the world's record at target practice off the Virginia Capes. The gunners made sixteen hits out of sixteen shots, the target being two thousand yards distant and twelve by twenty feet in size. The ship averaged more than two hits per gun a minute.

John W. Castles, at one time president of the Hibernia Bank of New Orleans, but who removed to New York to accept the vice presidency of the Guaranty Trust Co., committed suicide in New York on the 12th. His health is said to be the cause. He was a son in law of the late Col. B. F. Eshleman.

The body of Lieutenant James N. Sutton, concerning whose death such a controversy has arisen between his mother and the U. S. authorities, has been exhumed and examined by experts and it is declared by the doctors and lawyers representing Mrs. Sutton that the wound in young Sutton's head was not self inflicted. After the autopsy the body was reinterred in consecrated ground in Arlington Cemetery.

Halley's comet, which is reported at large after seventy years absence, has been reported by Prof. Wolff of Heidelberg, Germany, to the Harvard Observatory as having been visible the night of September 11.

The New Orleans Board of Health is keeping vigorously after the festive milkman and his too profuse use of water in his milk and is daily making affidavits against offenders.

The Navy Department having abolished the use of figureheads on war vessels, the U. S. Government has given the figureheads of the various battleships to the states whose names the ships bear. The figurehead of the battleship Louisiana has just arrived in Baton Rouge and will be given a place of honor somewhere in the state house. The figurehead weighs 7300 pounds and arrived packed in five cases.

The Mississippi Rice Growers' Association was organized at Lake Providence in East Carroll Parish this week. The idea is to make this organization include all the rice planters of the Mississippi River and its tributaries in Louisiana, Mississippi and Arkansas.

Tuesday, Sept. 14, was the anniversary of the day when in 1873 New Orleans shook off the carpet bag rule.

The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition in Seattle, Washington, which is the first exposition on record that opened with all its buildings complete, is also making a financial record for itself and reports that the exposition has paid every cent of its floating indebtedness, has retired nearly all its bonds and that the daily receipts are increasing.

The four torpedo boats that will escort President Taft down the river from St. Louis to New Orleans, passed up the river from the Passes Monday evening.

Infant paralysis seems to be epidemic in St. Paul, Minn., and the health department reports 170 cases, with 36 deaths.

The New York public schools have opened and the attendance is so congested that sixty thousand children were denied admittance to the full course. They will need to be contented with half sessions.

BEFORE ME, Ernest Albert, a Clerk of Court and Ex-Officio Recorder, duly commissioned and qualified, in and for the Parish of Plaquemines, State of Louisiana, aforesaid, therein residing and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned.

PERSONALLY CAME AND APPEARED, the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declare, each for himself, that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State, relative to the organization of corporations for the objects and purposes hereinafter mentioned, they have covenanted and agreed and do by these presents, covenant, and agree to bind themselves to and with each other, as well as such others as may hereafter become associated with them.

ARTICLE I.
