PLATFORM

OF THE
AMERICAN PARTY,
OF LOUISIANA.

1. We advocate an amendment of the National Laws, with proper safeguards to preserve the purity of the elective franchise.
2. We advocate the passage of such laws as will prevent the immigration of paupers and criminals to this country.
3. We oppose any interference in the vested rights of all persons, whether they be of native or foreign birth.
4. We are in favor of non-interference with slavery by the Federal Government, except for the protection of our constitutional rights.
5. We advocate a high National Policy, such as will afford stern and unwavering protection to the American name abroad, and will follow and guard the American citizen wherever he moves.
6. We believe that America should be governed by Americans, effecting the same through the ballot-box alone, the only legitimate instrument of reform in this country.
7. We believe that the office should seek the man, and not the man the office, and that the distribution of office among office-seekers, or as a reward for political services.
8. We will maintain and defend the Constitution of the United States, and the Union as it now exists, and the rights of the States without diminution, insisting upon a faithful performance on the part of the General Government of all the duties enjoined upon it by the Constitution.
9. While we approve of the platform adopted by the late National Council of the American Party at Philadelphia, we reject the application of the principles of the eight article to American Catholics, as unjust, unchristian, and entirely unworthy of our country. We shall forever continue to protest against any abridgment of religious liberty, holding it as a cardinal maxim that religious faith is a question between each individual and his God. We utterly condemn any attempt to make religious belief a test for political office, and can never affiliate with any party which holds sentiments not in accordance with these.
10. We war with no party as such, but shall oppose all who oppose us in the advocacy of these great American principles.

- A constitutional organization of the Swamp Land Commissioners.
- A more efficient administration of the Internal Improvement Department, with a view of improving our inland navigation.

PROCEEDINGS OF A PUBLIC MEETING HELD IN THE COURT HOUSE AT CLINTON, LA., DEC. 22, 1855.

CLINTON, LA., Dec. 22, 1855.
At a meeting held in the Court House on this day, Mr. W. East, Chairman. Mr. M. G. Mills, Secretary—A committee nominated and appointed for the purpose of drafting resolutions, and if such resolutions were adopted, intended to, and see that such resolutions were carried out, and acted upon forthwith.

The undersigned gentlemen forming such Committee,
Messrs. B. M. G. Brown, Chief of Patrol, Henry Marston, H. S. Descheno, G. W. Munday, R. W. Favre, A. W. DeLee, M. Frank, M. G. Mills, H. B. Chase, J. W. Cleveland, L. Sturges, Wm. Patterson, Preston Pond, Wm. Sedler.

Resolved, That the Planters and all owners and employers of slaves in the parish of East Feliciana, be requested to keep their slaves upon their own places as much as possible, during the Christmas week, and that if they do allow their slaves to come to Town, a pass from sunrise to sundown, shall be the extreme limit for such pass.

Resolved, That in every instance, planters shall make themselves acquainted with the nature of such produce as their slaves may have to dispose of, and name the same on their pass, likewise directing them of whom to make their purchases, but on no account permit them to buy of any person or persons, or deal in any place, where slavery has been known to have been disposed of to slaves.

Resolved, That the Citizens of this Parish, be required to organize and maintain an efficient Police or Patrol, to be continued during the Christmas week, or as long as it may be deemed necessary.

Resolved, That the Patrols of the respective Wards, shall put themselves in communication with, and from time to time report to the Central Patrol, (B. M. G. Brown, Chief) such proceedings as may be deemed worthy of reporting.

We, the undersigned, hereby recognize the Committee named above, as nominated by ourselves, and cheerfully bind ourselves to support them in their action, knowing them to be men of firmness, and relying on their judgment and character to carry out our wishes in a proper spirit; and we also pledge ourselves to report and prosecute, in every instance we meet with, or are informed of a violation of any part or portion of the 23d and 24th sections, Black Code of Louisiana.

This document has been numerously signed, and is now lying for signatures, at Beecheno's Drug Store, in Clinton.

[From Louisiana Black Code.]

Sec. 23. Be it further enacted, &c. That any person who shall buy, sell, or receive of, to or from any slave, any corn, hay, fodder, meal, spirituous liquors or other produce or commodity whatever without the consent, in writing, of the owner, overseer or employer of such slave, shall be held guilty of a high misdemeanor, and shall on conviction thereof, be fined in a sum not less than fifty, nor more than five hundred dollars, and shall be imprisoned in the parish jail, not less than one, nor more than twelve months, one half of the fine to be paid to the informer, and the other half to the parish.

In the indictment, or information for the offence specified in this section, it shall not be necessary to charge the kind or quantity of the produce or commodity so bought, sold, or received, nor the name of the slave, nor the name of his owner, and on the trial of such indictment, it shall not be necessary to prove the name or ownership of such slave, but it shall be deemed and held sufficient to prove that such buying, selling, or receiving was of, to or from a slave, if he be a person of color.

Sec. 24. Be it further enacted, &c. That if any slave shall be seen or found in any storehouse, warehouse, tipping shop or other place fitted up or kept for trading, unless sent by his owner, overseer or employer, after the hour of nine o'clock at night, or before day-break in the morning, or on

the Sabbath day, or if any slave shall be found at any time in any the aforementioned places unless sent as aforesaid, where he shall have been permitted to remain for the space of five minutes with the door of the place closed; or if any slave shall be seen to carry into the afore mentioned place any article or commodity supposed for sale, and not bringing the same out, or if he shall bring out of such place any article or commodity which may have been purchased or received therein, or if any slave being a teamster or driver of any team wagon, cart, or other vehicle, shall be seen to leave his team before or near the door of any such storehouse, warehouse, tipping shop, or other place fitted up, or kept for trading, and enter such place, and there remain for the space of five minutes, at any hour of the day or night, without the consent of his owner, overseer or employer, and shall be seen to carry into the aforesaid place, any article or commodity, supposed for sale, and not bring the same out, or if he shall bring out of such place, any article or commodity, which may have been purchased or received therein without the consent aforesaid, or if the owner of the aforementioned places of trading, or slave, or any person of whatsoever description is seen to go to the aforesaid teamster's vehicle, be it of any description, and take or receive therefrom, or receive from it, by the teamster, or any one else, any article or commodity whatsoever, supposed for sale, and take the same into the aforesaid place for trading and not bring the same out; or if they bring out of the place of trading, any article or commodity supposed to have been purchased or received therein, and put the same into or upon the vehicle, or deliver to the teamster in any manner whatever; the same shall be taken as presumptive evidence against the person owning or keeping such storehouse, warehouse, tipping shop or other place fitted up or kept for trading of the offence described in the two preceding sections, to be rebutted however, like other presumptives.
